### MAJESTIC JUSTICE

DRECEDENT in international justice was set in Nuernberg on Tuesday when sentences were handed down on more than a score of Nazis in connection with their war guilt. Whether or not everyone agrees with the prison sentences and acquittals given in some of the cases by the court is less important than the fact that the men were tried and sentenced individually for crimes against humanity while leaders of a nation.

The important fact, and the one which will cast its shadow on future history, is that the culpability of criminals on the grand scale has been recognized and leaders of a nation which hurled the world into war has been judged guilty, even as common murderers would be judged guilty.

When they engage to close the stores of a city on Wednesday afternoons they all close; no small group of chislers remain open for business. They are a law-abiding lot. When they pass a law they do so with the intention of observing it, and they have won the respect of the world in so doing. Self-discipline is one of the unmistakable marks of culture. A casual view of the apparently light sentences handed to some of the leaders and the acquittal of three of them has inspired criticism of softness in the judges of Britain and the United States.

However, while it is regrettable that any of these men escaped punishment, the fact that justice, and not revenge, was the aim of the court must be applauded. If bald and unconsidered revenge for the miseries of Europe had been the prime object, there would have been no need for a trial at all. The men could have been hanged forthwith. But revenge was not the conception. Justice on an international scale was the motive for the trial, and if justice and the desire for revenge did not co-incide it is better that the difference lay on the side of restraint, rather than in excess.
