## .N. PRESIDENT HAM'S LETTER

An explanation of Canadian National Railways policy in reducing train service on their line from Jasper to Prince Rupert to three time, weekly was received this morning by Alderman Clifford Ham, president of the Prince Rupert Junior Chamber of Commerce, from R. C. Vaughan, president of the Can-

adian National Railways. The letter, Mr. Ham said, was t "very frank and friendly" and explained the railway's position regarding the cut in train ser-

Reduction in train service from six times to three times weekly is scheduled to begin on this line next week.

The letter came on the heels of an outburst at the Junior Chamber meeting Thursday night when members objected to what they termed a "lack of courtesy" on the part of Mr Vaughan in failing to reply to a letter sent to him by Mr. Ham shortly after the announcement of the train reduction was made some weeks ago.

"It looks as if we were a b hasty." Mr. Ham admitted th morning. "It was less than month since I sent the letter Maybe we should have waited a bit longer for a reply."

However, he said that he plans to prepare a brief giving reason's why daily train service should be continued and send it to Mr. Vaughan.



Grown in the wheatfields of the prairies and other sections of Central Canada, it required 48,603 C.N.R. cars to transport more than 2,500,000 tons. The greatest number of cars, 12,800, were unloaded into ships holds at Montreal, which set a 17-year record for grain exported from that port. Halifax followed with 8,497 carloads, Sorel with 6,072, Quebec with 2,126, Saint John, N.B., with 712 and Pacific Coast ports with 9,245. Shipped via the United States, 9,151 cars went to Portland, Maine. In almost every case the quantity shipped from these ports in 1945 showed a big


increase over 1944. In addition, during the year the Canadian National Railways carried 3,200,000 tons of other grains. To bring it to the ocean ports required 64,037 cars.

### Developing Travel Industry

If travel is to be made a major industry-or we might say an industry of even greater importance in Canada—there are several vital requirements which seem elementary enough.

Canada's railways must be modernized very extensively - the Dominion has lagged behind the United States in planning this, it seems.

The highways must be extended and improved, particularly in the northwest where again they compare very unfavorably with the United States.

Steamship companies must make speedier and better plans for the replacement of their coastal passenger fleets which have been badly depleted by war and were getting antiquated anyway.

A new feature of coastal steamship service which must be developed will be that of car carrying facilities, particularly along the Pacific Coast northward from Vancouver through Prince Rupert to Alaska so that full use may be made of the transcontinental highway systems without long stages of return driv-

Air services and facilities, too, are capable of expansion in furtherance of the vast strides that were made in aircraft development during the war.

Provision of new and up-to-date hotel accomodation and organization of the country's great outdoor hunting and scenic resources to make them available to the travelling public should also loom largely in the development of the travel industry.

There is no suggestion that the witness intended to commit perjury, but apparently he was fastidious about putting his lips to a court-room Bible. In any event, as the learned judge pointed Minister: Rev. R. A. Wilson, M.A. out, the witness could not escape a charge of perjury if he was trying to avoid taking the oath. As he might have pointed out, the oath is binding even when a Bible is not used.

#### HOW CAN I??? By ANNE ASHLEY

Q. How can I improve homemade bread?

A. If one cup of thick cream is used when mixing bread, it improves the bread, makes the crust moist, and avoids the necessity of buttering the bread when taken from the oven.

Q. How can I hang out all the wash if the yard is very small?

A. Try using coat hangers for the larger garments. They will take up less space, as they can be hooked sidewise on the line, and they will also dry in better shape.

Q. How can I remove indelible ink stains?

A. Indelible ink stains can sometimes be removed from fabrics by sponging with equal parts of ammonia and turpentine.

# FOR SEED BOX IN GREEN HOUSES

Tests have shown that plants watered in this way make maximum growth because water always abundant, and yet not in excess; and since water never applied to the surface, there is no washing, and compacting of soil, which would check aeration.

With such a seed box, in a sunny window, hot-bed or coldframe, you can give your favorite varieties of vegetables and flowers several weeks' head start this spring, and insure an earlier harvest of food or beauty.

Soil used in a seed box should always be put through a sieve. The coarse soil may be used in the bottom, the fine on top. Florists' potting soil is the best, or a fine garden loam, about half sand.

Sphagnum moss should used to prevent damping-off, which is a fungus disease that frequently attacks seedlings. Rub the moss through a coarse sieve or colander and place a layer of this shredded moss over the soil in the flat to the depth of 1/4 to 1/2 inch Firm and saturate soil and moss. Drop the seeds on the moss, and cover very lightly with a thin layer of sphagnum. Proceed from this point on as with soil culture.

Seed may be broadcast one variety to a flat; or sown in rows, which allow several varieties to be grown in the same box, each row being labeled. Seeds which are broadcast are usually less crowded than those in rows. If you sow in rows, use the edge of a ruler to make shallow indentations in the soil; sow thinly, cover lightly, and firm the soil with a block of wood.

Keep the box in a dark place until sprouts appear, then place in the sunniest window you own. A kitchen window is good, because humidity is always greater there.

LONDON. (P)-German "autobahnen"-wide, straight, concrete surfaced highways reminiscent of the Roman roads which left their mark in Britain-will now serve as a model for this country's post-war road system. A. J. Barnes, Minister of War Transport, discussing road improvements in the House of Commons, said:

"Our roads must be designed and hiker not only to reach their destination swiftly, easily and in comfort, but to enjoy every moment of the journey."

This involves preservation of the amenities, with sweeping curves that bring the traveller in sight of beauty spots; the continued passage of roads through some romantic villages instead of bare countryside; the planting of shrubs along the highways and a firm determination to avoid choosing road sites by drawing a straight pencil line on a map between two points. Mr. Barnes, with these qualifi-

cations in mind, received house approval of a trunk roads bill. In 1936 the trunk roads act transferred to the national government the responsibility for 4.459 miles of road and the new bill adds an additional 3,685, including 754 miles in Scotland. Before 1936 responsibility for the roads was vested in a large number of local highway authorities with inevitable difficulty in maintenance, improvement and extension.

tion with a trunk road, construct bridges or tunnels over or under navigable waters and take responsibility for the condition of bridges on the trunk roads.

Opposes Meandering

The trunk roads under national control represent only a small fraction of the Britis road mileage-180,000-and some members said in debate they believed the government should take charge of a far greater share. They noted an estimate that these roads would be carrying 12,000,000 motor vehicles by 1963. The government should enforce some uniformity in surfacing as motorists often found themselves to enable the motorist, cyclist in a skid before they knew the road surface had been changed. A member said the London-Birmingham road, 110 miles long, had 23 types of surface.

Maj. R. H. Turton, Conservative member for Thirsk and Malton, objected to any suggestion that roads should be allowed to meander.

"As I see it, the modern road, the trunk road, is not the road our ancestors made, that dawdled from village to village, that wound around the little village streets, and which, if now used as a trunk road, congests traffic, endangers the lives of our children, and does not succeed in bringing t he produce from the factory to the port quickly," he


