ceiling hope of escape. As the long record of history shows, continued political unrest fed constantly by economic despair ultimately creates a disposition to fight. No international organization of nations, dedicated to keeping the peace, can hope to be permanently successful in maintaining its objective if it has to cope continuously with conditions of economic frustration, especially in key countries. The Canadian purpose, as expressed in the British loan agreement, is to employ our financial power to restore economic health in nations where it has been shattered by war. In accomplishing that purpose, we expect to create conditions of financial strength and industrial revival that will enable the nations of the world to trade with each other and us on a basis that spells fri dom from the artificial hinrances that existed between the two wars.
