THE CURRENT DEMAND for good and willing workers far exceeds the available supply. There need be little unemployment but many people are idle because the available work is "unsuitable" to them. Many employees are exasperating their employers by their indifference, inertia and unwillingness.

Economic progress can be made only by increasing production and value. Economic disaster is ensured by restrictions which compel the division of less and less among fewer and fewer. Improved methods, advancing skills, progressive co-operation, increased production, and free exchange, can make a new earth tomorrow if men will use them. They will make a new Canada today if we will use them.

Despite the economic condition of the world, Canada could improve immensely the earnings of every Canadian, if each Canadian had character enough and sense enough to do what he or she knows to be right. Only the common people, each discharging a personal duty, can give effect to their common sense through implementing the Golden Rule, thus making and maintaining prosperity.

NORTHERN HIGHWAY

A COMPREHENSIVE resolution on the Northern Trans-Provincial Highway to be presented by the Prince George Board of Trade at the Associated Boards of Trade convention at Terrace next week covers the difficulties and problems at present all over the route and proposes reasonable methods of procedure to meet them.

It is not parochial but shows a broad understanding of the situation not only regarding the gap between McBride and Sinclair Mills that awaits construction but of those delicate problems of ownership of the right-of-way where portion of railway property are being used between McBride and the Alberta boundary and between Prince Rupert and Terrace.

It also takes into consideration that the Dominion has a certain responsibility to subscribe towards the

cost of an interprovincial highway and urges the provincial government to pursue its efforts to secure financial support therefrom as was indicated as a possibility by the Dominion at the Dominion-Provincial conference last August.

And it also emphasizes that it is the chief responsibility of the provincial government to undertake the completion of the highway.

It also recognizes that in the transfer of title to the province of portions of its right-of-way the Canadian National Railway Company has a just claim for compensatory adjustments.

Such an eminently reasonable and fair resolution should merit the unanimous support of the convention.

TERRACE CONVENTION

WITH THOSE ASSEMBLED including important public officials led by at least one cabinet minister, a dozen prominent business men from Ketchikan and Juneau and representatives from among the leading lights in public affairs from all communities between Prince Rupert and Prince George and possibly beyond on either end, the annual convention of the Associated Boards of Trade of Central British Columbia at Terrace next week promises to be one of the most imposing gatherings representative of this district which has ever been held. It will be the united voice of all central and northern British Columbia and what it says on various matters will warrant attention from all and sundry. Resolutions, committees all along the line have been busy preparing representations on various matters pertaining to the welfare and development of the great rich and largely undeveloped hinterland encompassed by the sphere of the people who will be assembled. By this time considerable enthusiasm is developing in the united determination to put forth the case on behalf of this area as it has never been put before.

Apart from what may be gained as a result of the united and comprehensive representations of the delegates and the useful ideas that may be developed which might well lead to useful local action, there will be the benefit to be derived of the community leaders from various parts of the country getting together and promoting better understanding of individual problems to the end that reciprocal strength and action may be developed. One will know what the others are doing and there will be no pulling apart because of lack of such understanding.

We can hail the gathering as one of the most important and potentially beneficial that has ever been held in this part of the country.

HOT WEATHER DRYING CROPS

General Rain Needed to Complete Filling

WINNIPEG—Weather over the whole prairie region has been extremely hot and dry during the past week and is causing the crop to ripen very rapidly. Late sown grain is suffering and not filling completely. A general rain would be welcome to complete filling of all crops, according to the weekly report of the Department of Agriculture of the Canadian National Railways. Early harvesting has commenced and general harvesting should be underway in a week to ten days. Report of last week's frost damage are difficult to assess but vary from five to fifty percent in the areas affected.

Hot dry weather and a bad hail storm Monday in the Okanagan Valley have reduced prospects of prunes, peaches, apricots and apples by ten percent and peats by fifteen percent.

WASTE PULP MILL
PCRT ALBERNI—Toward an estimated annual production of 50,000 tons being derived from sawmill surpluses, Bloedel, Stewart & Welch Ltd. is constructing a 165-ton kraft pulp mill here dependent entirely for raw material on the by-product of sawmills under the same ownership and management.

ATTENTION FOR NORTH

Associated Boards of Trade to Ask For Development of This Part of British Columbia

Institution and continuation by the governments of British Columbia and Canada and the Canadian National Railways of a more aggressive policy of development of the north and the port of Prince Rupert as the terminus of the northern line of the government-owned railway will be urged in a resolution to be presented to the Associated Boards of Trade of British Columbia convention at Terrace next week by the Prince Rupert Chamber of Commerce. An expression of opinion and a statement of policy on this matter will be requested from both governments and the railway company.

The resolution, in support of the request, declares that there is unmistakable evidence of over-population in a few large Canadian cities with consequent danger of unemployment and hardship whereas the northern two-thirds of British Columbia while known to be rich in a great variety of natural resources such as mineral, lumber, agriculture, coal and fish and capable of supporting in comfort many times its present population, has never been systematically or properly developed.

NEW DELHI — The war years witnessed a steady improvement in labor conditions in India. During the five years from 1939 to 1944 wages rose steadily to a 1944 peak.

LAND OF PROMISE

RIFLE CLUB AT TERRACE

Pacific Coast Militia Rangers Carry on in New Sphere

TERRACE—At a well-attended meeting in the Oddfellows' Hall on Tuesday evening the Pacific Coast Militia Rangers were re-organized as a rifle club. The meeting was fairly well attended and the new organization is now formed. It will be known as Pacific Coast Militia Rangers Association and will be non-military.

Seasonable Ideas for Housekeepers

Meal on Porch - Getting Out Doors - Tray for Each

Getting out of the house even in the middle of winter is the ambition of many people. Those who have worked all day want to see at sunset and enjoy the cooling breeze. The porch, particularly if screened, is a most desirable place to enjoy a meal. If there are trees near the house the family may prefer to gather for supper.

The tray system is excellent for outdoor eating, it is wise to remember that the male members of the family will fall in with the plan with much more enthusiasm if the whole course is served on one plate and the servings are very generous, as fresh air stimulates the appetite.

Home economists suggest the two following Supper Porch menus with recipes.

No. 1—
Fruit Juice
Potatoes in Green Peppers
Tossed Salad
Fresh Berries with Custard
Buttered Bread Beverages

No. 2—
Consomme (hot or jellied)
Fruit Salad with Cottage Cheese
Gingerbread Peach Shortcake
Buttered Bread Beverages

The Experts Say - -

BERRIES—Raspberries on the table twice a day during their short season but raspberries can extend through the winter.

Home economists say raspberries canned by the "icing" method are superior and shape and they are good for rhubarb but it is better for more solid raspberries by the "icing" method, pack the berries in sterilized sealers. Cover with boiling syrup to within 1/2 inch of the top. Place rubber cap of sealer, adjust top completely. Place several newspapers in the tub or large preserve can. Put the sealers on a flat surface being sure that the sealers do not touch. Carefully pour water into the tub. The sealers are covered to a depth of three inches over the top. In pouring boiling water should be taken care to pour directly on the sealers. Use more papers and finish with a heavy blanket or rug. Place the tub or kettle. Leave the tub overnight or until the water has cooled. Remove from water, wipe dry and store. Do not tighten the tops. A thin syrup—1 1/2 cups sugar and one cup of sugar recommended for berries can be used in this method. A pint will require about 3/4 cup

lengthwise and remove seeds. Parboil, uncovered, in salted water until tender but not soft. Drain. Melt fat, add flour and blend well. Add milk, stirring constantly until mixture thickens. Add salt, pepper and cheese. Stir until cheese is melted. Add potatoes and heat over low heat until hot. Serve in green pepper cases. Six servings.

Gingerbread Peach Shortcake
1/2 cup fat
1/2 cup sugar
1 egg
3/4 cup molasses
2 1/2 cups sifted pastry flour or 2 cups sifted all-purpose flour
1 1/2 teaspoons baking soda
1/2 teaspoon cloves
1 1/2 teaspoons cinnamon
2 teaspoons ginger
1/4 teaspoon salt
1 cup hot water

Cream fat until fluffy, gradually cream in sugar. Add beaten egg and molasses and beat well. Mix and sift dry ingredients, and add alternately with the water, combining lightly. Bake in a greased cake tin in a moderately slow oven, 325 degrees F., for 50-55 minutes. Makes gingerbread 8x8x2 1/2 inches. When baked, split, fill with sliced raw peaches, sweetened. Six servings.

CEREAL RATION LOW IN INDIA

NEW DELHI — The vital long-term problem facing India in the matter of food supplies has been elucidated by D. R. Sethi, the government of India's agricultural commissioner, who says that with an increasing population and unexpanding production, consumption of cereals has progressively deteriorated so that the lowest level now has been reached.

The present Indian ration of cereals is 12 ounces or 1,500 calories per person per day, which is about half of the amount considered necessary to healthy life.

India's production of food-stuffs is in almost all cases much below the demand. India produces 60,000,000 tons of cereals annually, but needs 66,000,000; milk production is estimated at 23,000,000 tons, while 92,000,000 are needed; and the output of meat, fish and eggs must be quadrupled if the people are to have their barest needs.

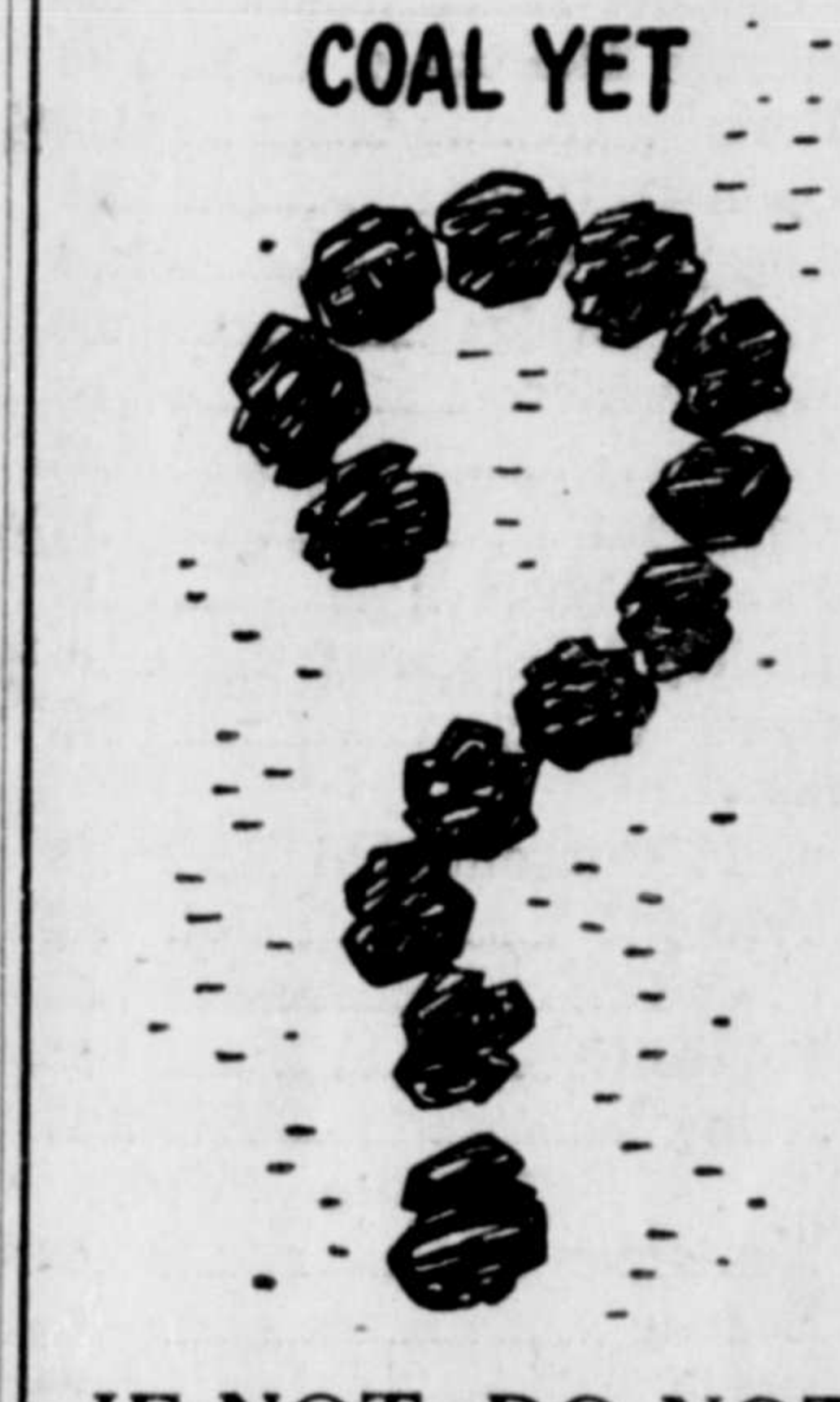

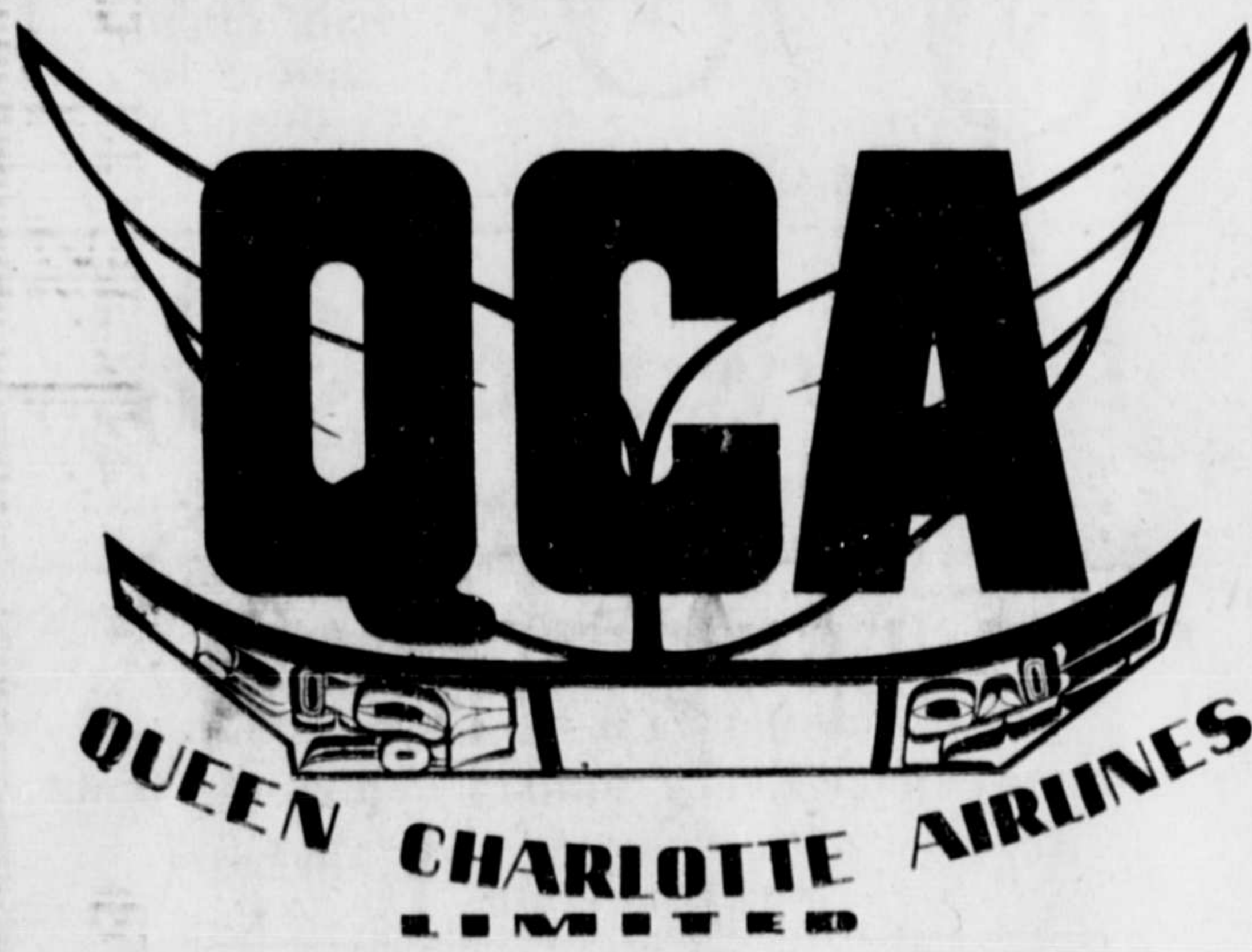

guns were placed at Tye and the navy patrolled the Skeena off Port Essington.

"I know the men would have loved to patrol the Skeena on railway speeders but we knew that it would add up to a lot of casualties," Col. Johnston commented.

Battle Headquarters Were Opened Here

"The Canadian Army practically opened battle headquarters at Prince Rupert, and was going to turn the post office and customs office out of the Federal building," he continued. "I sincerely believe that they were hoping to see action here so that they could say they had seen action before General McNaughton."

On May 20, 1941, two Japanese cruisers, two transports and escort vessels were lying 400 to 600 miles off this coast and the crisis was considered so grave at local defence headquarters that the American Army commander turned 980 of his service troops over to Col. Johnston's command. However the Japanese turned

north and struck at Dutch Harbor in June. American army military police took a dominant part in patrolling the city at that time because there were 250 American provosts posted here and only eight Canadian provosts, Col. Johnston said. Col. Johnston emphasized the importance of documentation of the men's records of army life. Meticulous documentation of soldier's records often meant the difference between a man being able to prove legitimate casualty claim after he left the army, he pointed out.

ALASKA WANTS NORTH HIGHWAY HARD SURFACED

TERRACE—The Terrace and District Board of Trade will present a resolution at the annual convention of the Associated Boards of Trade here next week "practically demanding" that the northern transprovincial highway be hard surfaced immediately. George McAdams, vice-president of the Associated Boards of Trade, said here last night.

"Our resolution is not so far fetched as it might seem," he declared at the organizing meeting of the Terrace branch of the B.C. Automobile Association. "Several Alaska Chambers of Commerce have submitted identical resolutions to the convention to which they will send delegates." Several of the Alaskan resolutions expressed the belief that, if the Canadian or British Columbia governments showed a determined effort to have the road surfaced, the American government might go so far as to put up half the money required for the job.

"The Alaska chambers of commerce emphasize that they would like to see the hard surfacing begin at the Prince Rupert end of the highway," Mr. McAdams asserted.
