Double Murder and Suicide Appears Evident in Deaths of Mr. and Mrs. Lemieux and Family

VICTORIA, D-Bodies of John P. Lemieux, 25-year old former Canadian naval rating; his wife, Laura, 23, and two-year old daughter, Caroline May, were found Wednesday in their modest Doncaster Drive cottage. Police sald it was apparently a case of double murder and suicide. All had been shot through the head and a shotgun was found in the blood-stained bedroom the bodies were discovered.

Ayluk, gallant young Eskimo from Canada's Arctic, managed to summon a smile when the Bristol Freighter, British aircraft on this side of the Atlantic for a demonstration tour, rushed him to Edmonton from Yellowknife, northern gold mining centre. Donald was aboard a vessel in Cambridge Bay, 600 miles north of Yellowknife, when an explosion occurred. In spite of his own burns, the brave Eskimo held his brother and sister over the side of the boat in an effort to save them. Reports state father was killed in the explosion. Five weeks after he was taken to Yellowknife Donald lay in hospital there unable to be moved because of his injuries. Should be End to "Rationed Freedom," Says Diefenbaker-To Introduce Legislation

OTTAWA, (P)-A bill of rights for Canada was demanded las night by John Diefenbaker, Progressive-Conservative member of Centre.

In a nation-wide broadcast, Mr. Diefenbaker said he would introduce at the next session legislation for a Senate-House Makes Attack committee to meet with provincial representatives to evolve a comprehensive bill of rights.

There would have to be an end to "rationed freedom," Mr. Diensenbaker declared. Canadians were entitled to freedom of religion, speech, radio, press and habeas conpus.

IT IS A GRACIOUS GRANT that the provincial government has made in its offer to pay one-third of a proportionate cost up to \$25,000 of the new Pioneers' Home building here. It is fitting enough that the city fathers should appreciate it. On the other hand, the province might be considered to have a sufficient enough interest in the old timers to make the grant fully justified even if there might have been nothing to compel them to make it.

And, as the council emphasized, the fact of this gift having come, should not in any way discourage any other help to the project, all of which will be needed and will go to the end of making life a little more easy and comfortable for worthy although possibly not so very well fixed older citizens.

AUTO RACKET IN AUSTRALIA

Black Market Flourishes With Car Shortage

SYDNEY, Australia, (P-Officers of the Australian Prices Commission are waging war on used car dealers and private individuals who sell automobiles for more than official prices pegged at pre-war levels.

For such price control violations l'iere have been a number of convictions in special courts and fines of more than \$300 have been imposed.

Australian newspapers have given publicity to the black market in used cars, but the price control authorities say that sales at illegal prices are still being made because people with money in their pockets are willing to pay considerably more than offical rates because of the acute shortage of motor vehicles.

One estimate is that Australia needs at least 300,000 new automobiles and 125,000 trucks of various types. Only a trickle of new vehicles is coming from Britain and North America and Australian automobile plants are not operating at capacity.

Distribution of new cars is controlled by Australia's state transport departments which give priority to doctors, nurses, clergymen, commercial travellers. farmers in remote areas. and servicemen who need motor vehicles in their rehabilitation.

Racketeers in New South Wales have attempted to get their hands on some of the new cars by various means but have been foiled by ownership certificates required by the state authorities.






