Let's Clear the Air

Too much has been said by labor on generalities as compared with the too little said by the who meet the payrolls in the basic industry which gives this community its existence and who are in most cases but one step removed from the men they hire, says Prince George Citizen editorally.

"Fair and adequate wages" has a resounding appeal worthy of fullest support. They should ensure the worker a square deal. But when higher than "fair and adequate" wages are sought, the employer's position and that of the consuming

to show how higher wages per hour and less hours per week will increase production, demonstrate the mechanical improvements that are desirable in industry for the same purpose, and ensure that disciplinary action would be taken against loafing and slacking union members, their stand could be made much firmer.

If the "boss man" would become a little less stiff-necked and show the problems he wrestles with, such as costs, the break-down of what is entailed in operations, the effect of reduced hours and increased wages, there would be a better understanding and appreciation.

At present there is a measure of intolerance which denies the public a clear picture on which to form an unbiased opinion. A good deal of the uneasiness which has crept into the public mind over present labor disputes might well be despatched if both parties to the dispute would lift the veil.
