## Reaction For President Truman

### Bulletins

**"SILLY NONSENSE"**  
 LONDON — Viscount Bennett has recovered fully from a cold with which he had suffered around Christmas time, a statement from his Surrey home said today. That he was suffering from diabetes was denied as "silly nonsense."

**VANCOUVER MEAT SHORTAGE**  
 VANCOUVER — Meat shortage may become critical in Vancouver by the middle of next week. Farmers are refusing to sell to the packers for present prices, choosing to turn their stock out for spring feeding until there is a diffing of ceiling price limits.

**OPPOSE DAYLIGHT SAVING**  
 NEW WESTMINSTER — The Fraser Valley Municipal Association is strongly opposed to daylight saving, the reeve of Sumas describing it as a "nuisance to progress." There will be confusion on Vancouver Island where Saanich municipality has turned down daylight saving while Victoria City is going to adopt it.

**MOVE UNPOPULAR**  
 LONDON — The Labor government's decision to nationalize a large part of Britain's iron and steel industry provoked today a threat of a Conservative party motion of censure, and brought sharp criticisms from sections of the press. Most morning newspapers joined the trade and industry group in criticising the basic nationalization decision.

**LEAGUE PASSES ON**  
 GENEVA — The League of Nations passes formally out of existence at midnight tonight. Discontinuation was finally and unanimously approved by 35 delegates today.

**FISH BOATS MISSING**  
 NEW WESTMINSTER — Two fishing boats — Clare N. and Annabelle — have been missing for several days off the mouth of the Fraser River. It is possible they may be somewhere in the Gulf Islands.

## DEVELOPING PT. EDWARD INTO YEAR ROUND INDUSTRY; PUT UP FILLETS

Developing the policy of rounding out operations from its plant at Port Edward, near Prince Rupert, into a continuous instead of a merely seasonal industry, Nelson Bros. Fisheries Ltd. has been engaged since the middle of February in packing sole, flounder and cod filets, thus providing activity for some of its seine boats and a considerable number of the plant workers during the usually slack period between the time of winter herring canning and the canning and the commencement of salmon canning in early summer.

Trucked in from Port Edward by highway, the frozen filets are stored in the plant of the Canadian Fish & Cold Storage Co. at Prince Rupert whence they are distributed to the market.

Up to mid-April two seiners — the Cummings and Jessie Island — had been engaged in beam trawling for the flatfish of Dundas Island in Chatham Sound. The B.C. Pride and Sea Biscuit are being added to the fleet next week.

Nelson Bros., like other salmon canning plants along the British Columbia coast, is being held up in preparation of nets for the salmon canning season by the netmen's strike.

Meantime, the company has without delay started building operations for the replacement of a large residential structure for native workers at Port Edward which was destroyed by fire this week. Instead of the solid 48-family residential block which was burned, five-family living units are being put up.

**MINE STRIKE OVER**  
 BUTTE — There was a sudden termination of the strike against the Anaconda Mining Co. last night when the union agreed to accept the company's wage terms and the miners went back to work.

**TRAPPER IN HOSPITAL**  
 FORT ST. JOHN — Suffering from an infected hand and partial paralysis, Len Hope, trapper of Watson Lake, has been flown to hospital here.

**PARTY AT WINDSOR**  
 LONDON — For the first time since 1938, the public will be admitted to Windsor Castle grounds on Easter Sunday when the Royal Family has a house party to celebrate Princess Elizabeth's 20th birthday. London is planning for its greatest Easter holiday exodus since before the war. All accommodation will be jammed.

## ALASKA CANNERY STRIKE COMING

SEATTLE — The \$5,000,000 Alaska salmon canning industry will be strike-bound at midnight Saturday, the Alaska Cannery Workers' Union (C.I.O.) announced last night. Although spokesmen for management said that negotiations are continuing, union officials said that negotiations had ended and "further attempts are useless in view of the employers' refusal to discuss our demands for a 30 per cent wage increase."

## COMMONS ADJOURNS

OTTAWA — Commons today stood adjourned until April 29 for the Easter recess after a quiet debate on the pros and cons of government control and operation of Canada's developed and undeveloped mineral resources. No action was taken on the motion before the adjournment.

## SAM CARR IS MISSING

OTTAWA — Crown counsel in the espionage hearings said last night a subpoena has been out for Sam Carr for some time but he has not been located. Carr is the national organizer of the Labor-Progressive Party. Igor Gouzenko has asserted that he is a Russian agent.

## Air Line Executive Is Awarded Trophy

OTTAWA — Air Minister Gibson has announced the award of the McKee Trans-Canada trophy for outstanding service to civilian aviation to a one-time bush pilot, G. W. G. McConachie of Edmonton. He is general manager of Canadian Pacific All Lines' western lines.

## TOOK HIS OWN LIFE

A verdict of "death by self-inflicted gunshot wounds" was brought in by a coroner's jury Wednesday afternoon following an inquest into the death of William Lysak, whose charred body was discovered Tuesday afternoon in the burned ruins of his cabin on Cemetery Road.

Evidence of three witnesses indicated that Lysak had been seen before noon Tuesday near Fairview Cemetery and that his actions had caused the witnesses to doubt his mental stability.

Constable W. W. Deans of the city police detachment presented a quantity of lead pellets and cotton wadding which he said he had seen Dr. R. E. Coleman remove from Lysak's skull during the autopsy. Deans also introduced the barrel of a .410 shotgun which he said he had found in the ruins beside Lysak's body. The stock of the gun had been burned away. There was an exploded shell in the chamber.

Dr. Coleman told the jury that in his autopsy he has found a hole in the roof of Lysak's mouth passing to the brain. The lead pellets and cotton wadding were found behind the left eye.

Vic Preston, caretaker at Fairview Cemetery, said that he had been accosted about noon by a man whom he knew lived in Lysak's cabin and that the man had said: "You can dig me a grave. I am going to commit suicide." The man, Preston said, was carrying a naked hunting knife.

About 30 minutes after the man left, Preston said he saw a fire at Lysak's cabin but believed that someone might have been burning rubbish.

Clifford Abercrombie told of meeting a man near Fairview Cemetery about 12:30 and that the man asked him to "drive beyond Port Edward."

"He said there were 200 men in the bush waiting to 'get' him," Abercrombie said. "He offered to trade a gun and a radio for his fare."

The man had also told Preston that the police and 200 men were after him. He carried a pack sack when Preston first saw him on the road.

Jack Hendricks, a neighbor of Lysak, said that Lysak had told him Tuesday morning that he was going away and asked Hendricks to look after the chickens on his small place.

Fire Chief H. T. Lock told of hearing about the fire from the police and of calling the fire department. The cabin was already burned to the ground.

Apparently Lysak had set the cabin afire before he took his life sometime after 1 o'clock.

Jurors were Allan Morgan, foreman, Andrew Aanes, Bernard Charles Mundy, James MacKinnon and Mike Postuk.

## APPEALS FOR FRENCH UNITY

PARIS — In an effort to avert the threatened resignation of Foreign Minister Bidault and other members of the cabinet belonging to the Movement Republicain Populaire, President Felix Gouin today appealed to the constituent assembly to forget party differences in debating France's proposed new constitution. He told the assembly that the government as a whole would abstain from voting on the constitutional issue dividing M.P.R. from the other two members of the coalition government — the Socialists and Communists.

## Refuses To Talk Again

Capt. David Gordon Lunan Once More Declines to Testify At Espionage Trial

OTTAWA — Capt. David Lunan left the witness stand today in the espionage case of Prof. Israel Halperin of Queen's University after objecting to answering questions on the ground that it violated his oath of secrecy before the royal commission on espionage. The alleged head of a ring of Russian agents said to include Halperin, Lunan balked when the crown asked him if he had met Lieut. Col. Rogov, former assistant military attache at the Russian embassy.

Magistrate Glenn Strike said there were reasonable grounds for Lunan's stand and permitted Lunan to leave the witness box and consult with his counsel.

Lunan previously had been committed for contempt for refusing to testify. Earlier Igor Gouzenko had testified against Halperin. Gouzenko, former cipher clerk at the Soviet embassy, identified a number of documents which he said he had taken from the embassy's secret files.

## Newsprint Ceiling Has Been Suspended

OTTAWA — The prices board has announced the suspension of the price ceiling on newsprint. It also says that tourists visiting Canada for seven days or longer may apply for special temporary ration cards.

## SALAD \$16.20 — PRODUCE PRICES HIGH AS RESULT OF ALASKA

ANCHORAGE — The shortage of produce in Alaska has tied up shipping at most Alaskan ports, resulting in weird prices for foodstuffs. Here in Anchorage a woman had to pay \$16.20 for the ingredients of a salad. Lettuce and bananas are selling for 75c a pound and cucumbers and tomatoes at \$1.10 each.

## New Greek Gov't Is Formed Today

ATHENS — A new Greek government was formed today with Konstantin Tsaldaris, head of the Populist party, as premier and foreign minister. Tsaldaris, foreign minister in the cabinet of Premier Poulitass, who resigned yesterday, is a strong proponent of an immediate plebiscite on the question of returning King George II. to the Greek throne.

## CONDITIONS ON ROAD ARE "BAD"

Snow conditions on the Prince Rupert Highway between the city and Terrace make the road impassable and in at least two places near Telegraph Point washouts have ripped out the grade.

Road conditions in the Kwinitsa area are reported on by Gordon Little, East Kwinitsa sawmill operator, who says that from East Kwinitsa to Salvas there are three or four miles of "impassable" snow, the rest of that sector being bare.

Carl Pohle, Terrace sawmill operator who is working at Salvas, is going to try and drive from Salvas to Terrace at Easter time according to Mr. Little. Snow conditions at Estevan are said by Mr. Little to be "questionable."

## Highway Still Impassable At Many Points

He estimates that it will be about two weeks before the stretch of road between Kwinitsa and Salvas is open to free passage of cars, and one bridge in that sector is badly undermined.

It is understood that Len Griffiths is plowing open the road from his logging operation to the Shames bridge.

In the western end of the highway from the summit to Tye the road is impassable because of snow. It is reported, and near Telegraph Point two washouts have left gaps in the grade.

The big Kwinitsa slide still covers the highway.

## Seamen Are Asking For Intervention

OTTAWA — The Canadian Seamen's Union has asked Prime Minister Mackenzie King to help settle the dispute between the union and the operators of coastal S.N.K. lake ships. The union seeks a 46-hour week in place of the present eighty-four hour week.

## Damnation For Spain

Franco Regime Should Be Morally Condemned, Says Polish Delegate — Moscow Adds Its Voice

NEW YORK — The Polish delegate to the United Nations security council today called for the moral condemnation of the Franco regime in Spain. Dr. Lange told the council that Spain is a dangerous remnant of the Axis, that it did everything in its power to aid the Axis. He said Franco's regime has given "aid and comfort to Japan."

The Moscow radio has charged that German scientists, in hiding in Spain, are working on secret weapons of destruction possibly even more terrible than the atomic bomb. The Russian broadcast declared that Nazis had fled to Spain by the thousands after the defeat of Germany, and asserted that determined measures must be taken against the Franco government.

## BALL PLAYERS MAY ORGANIZE

First Steps Are Taken at Boston Towards Forming Union

BOSTON — The first steps were taken today at Boston in an attempt to organize a professional baseball players' union. A group listed as the American Baseball Guild was recorded at the Boston city clerk's office by Robert Murphy of the Guild. Murphy said the purpose of the Guild was "to right the injustices of professional baseball and to give a square deal to the players."

## WILL STAY ON AGENDA

Committee of Experts Makes Report Today to U.N.O.

NEW YORK — A majority of a special committee of experts of the U.N.C. Security Council is said to have decided in favor of retaining the Iran-Russian case on the agenda. The source says that the committee split 8-3 on the question and will state the majority findings today to the council.

## NATIONALIZE IRON-STEEL

British Government Embarking on \$747,000,000 Program

LONDON — Britain's iron and steel industry is to be bought largely under public ownership, John Wilmot, minister of supply in the Labor government, told the House of Commons yesterday.

Wilmot said the government had reached the decision after studying a report by iron and steel industrialists who had outlined a five to seven year program of reorganization at an estimated cost of \$747,000,000.

Wilmot said that, "after full consideration, the government has reached the conclusion that the position of the industry and its importance in national economy necessitate a large measure of public ownership and legislation for this purpose should be passed."

Former Prime Minister Winston Churchill pressed the government to give the House an opportunity to debate the proposal as soon as possible but Prime Minister Attlee declined to commit himself. This led one member to shout, "Hitler."

## Guilt 'Terrible' for Nazis

Polish Governor of Poland Throws Himself on Court's Mercy

BERNBERG — Hans Frank, German-occupied Poland, told the International Military Tribunal today: "I feel a terrible guilt within me" for the atrocities of the Nazi regime. Claiming that some of the crimes only recently became known to him, Frank declared to the witness stand: "Speak to me from the depths of my emotion after five months of this. I have gained insight into what was committed in the way of terrible atrocities. I feel a terrible guilt within me."

Frank held the court with his bold admissions of guilt as he actually threw himself on its mercy.

## Attorney-General Now at Portage

PORTAGE LA PRAIRIE — Following another riot last night among women in the jail in Portage La Prairie, the attorney-general of Manitoba, J. O. McLaughlin, is in the town to investigate the demonstrations. He is believed to be the result of complaints from two women prisoners who claimed lack of medical attention.

## OVERSEAS LIST GETTING LOWER

Only 37,000 Canadians Now Left Abroad — 768 Conchie's Left Active

OTTAWA — Defense Minister Bennett says that less than 37,000 Canadian army men were left overseas at the beginning of this month.

Labor Minister Mitchell reported that a total of 768 conscientious objectors volunteered for active service during the war.

## BERNBERG MANOEUVRE

Press Defence Attorney Would Have Two Secret Protocols Admitted

BERNBERG — The attorney general, Rudolf Hess and Hans Frank at the Nurnberg trials insisted that the court accept the alleged texts of two secret protocols signed by Germany and Russia in 1939. The attorney told the court that the protocols provided for the partition of eastern Europe and the occupation of the Baltic states. The Russian prosecutor told the court that he had submitted a written argument against the German lawyer's manoeuvre.

Canada now has a national food policy. As announced by Prime Minister King, the program calls for maintenance of wartime maxima in production of foodstuffs plus a campaign to reduce home consumption by the elimination of waste.

Production is to be guided on a

scientific basis. If possible, even greater quantities of wheat are to be made available for export. Studies will be made to improve the transport of commodities to a hungry world.

Our wartime record has been remarkable. To continue it on into peace will earn Canada the gratitude of millions. Reductions in home consumption, economical use of what is available to every Canadian will be no sacrifice.

On the home front the stress is on voluntary action. It will be up to each and every Canadian to determine the extent to which he will participate. The amount of food we normally waste is outrageous in these times.

### CHURCH DRIVE BEING PLANNED

Local Presbyterians Consider Participating in National Campaign

To consider a plan of the session for participating in a national church "advance" campaign, a meeting of the congregation of First Presbyterian Church was called for last night and adjourned with a view to obtaining a larger and more representative attendance.

Rev. A. F. MacSween discussed the campaign from a national standpoint, telling of the objectives of church reconstruction in Europe where the Christian church had suffered sorely in the devastation, extension of the church in Canada, improvements in training of the ministry and re-development of foreign missions.

W. W. C. O'Neill described the session's plan for local participation which was based on two points—increased activity and interest in church attendance and church affairs generally and the raising of \$2000 for repayment to the church head office on the local building debt.

THE MAGNETIC POLE

Editor, Daily News:  
An article appearing in the Daily News some time ago stated that the magnetic pole had been discovered some 300 miles from its accustomed place over the geographical pole. Is it possible that the magnetic pole is playing hide and seek with our aviators? Surely these aviators are not trying to make use of humans believes that the pole is turned into a jack-o-lantern.

No those aviators made no mistake and their compass needle pointed to where they said for the simple reason there is no such thing as a pin-point north magnetic pole.

The lines of magnetic force are constantly flowing over the surface and penetrate everything on this earth up to a depth of at least 60 miles away from the earth.

What makes people believe that there should be a mysterious spot over the earth's pole forcing the compass to point to? There is nothing there to create a force such as iron as some believe.

The lines of magnetic force are created by the cosmic waves flowing towards the north polar star and, as the earth happens to be in the path of these waves, the waves create a friction due to the pressure of the different gases pressing upon the body of the earth. powerful vortex and, when the radio waves enter this force, they are swept into space before they are delivered to your radio.

The lines of force are subject to be gathered into powerful electric motive forces by a large whirlpool in the water and some times they cause shipwrecks at sea, forcing the compass to point to the whirlpool, instead of the pole. The revised act, passed by the last sitting of legislature which closed recently, became effective yesterday. Last night the Prince Rupert school board was joined by representatives from Digby Island and Port Edward to adjust itself to the requirements of the new Schools Act.

The new School Board now consists of seven members who will hold office on a "temporary" basis until next December, when a "permanent" board will be elected to sit for the following year. The board went through the formality of "electing" itself into office last night.

Added to the Prince Rupert school board as regular members of the enlarged board are Mrs. William Glass, representing the official trustee at Port Edward, and Julius Hadland Jr., representing the Digby Island school.

Last night's meeting was called by Inspector of Schools E. E. Hyndman to get the local district functioning under the new Schools Act as quickly as possible. The enlarged board elected Dr. R. G. Large, as chairman. Dr. Large is chairman of the Prince Rupert School Board.

Mrs. M. Roper, former secretary of the Prince Rupert board on a part time basis, was elected secretary-treasurer of the enlarged school district on a full time basis.

Mrs. Earl Becker was named chairman of the finance committee and Dr. Large, Angus Macdonald, Mrs. Glass and Mr. Hadland were approved as the buildings and grounds committee.

To Handle Own Funds  
A major difference under the revised Act will be the fact that the enlarged board will be responsible for handling school funds and will have its own accounting system. Formerly school funds in Prince Rupert were handled by the city's accounting department.

A special school fund will be set aside to cover education costs and it will be handled by the school board.

According to Inspector Hyndman, Prince Rupert stands to gain "considerably" under the consolidation, while the rural areas embraced by the new district will experience increased cost under the new set up.

"The fact that the outside areas are taking on increased costs means that we must think about improving the standards in those outside schools," Mr. Hyndman told the board.

He said that, while the new financial set up would mean a gain to Prince Rupert of about \$20,000 over last year, the gain largely would be dissipated through increased equipment costs now in effect. He cited a \$2 increase in the price of desks as one instance.

Under the new Act, Mr. Hyndman said, the Board has authority to borrow money if necessary. This is an authority that former school boards never had, funds being handled by the municipality.

Complete membership of the new board is as follows: Dr. R. G. Large, chairman, Mrs. M. Roper, secretary-treasurer; Mrs. W. Rothwell, Angus Macdonald, Mrs. Earl Becker, Mrs. William Glass, Port Edward, Julius Hadland Jr., Digby Island.

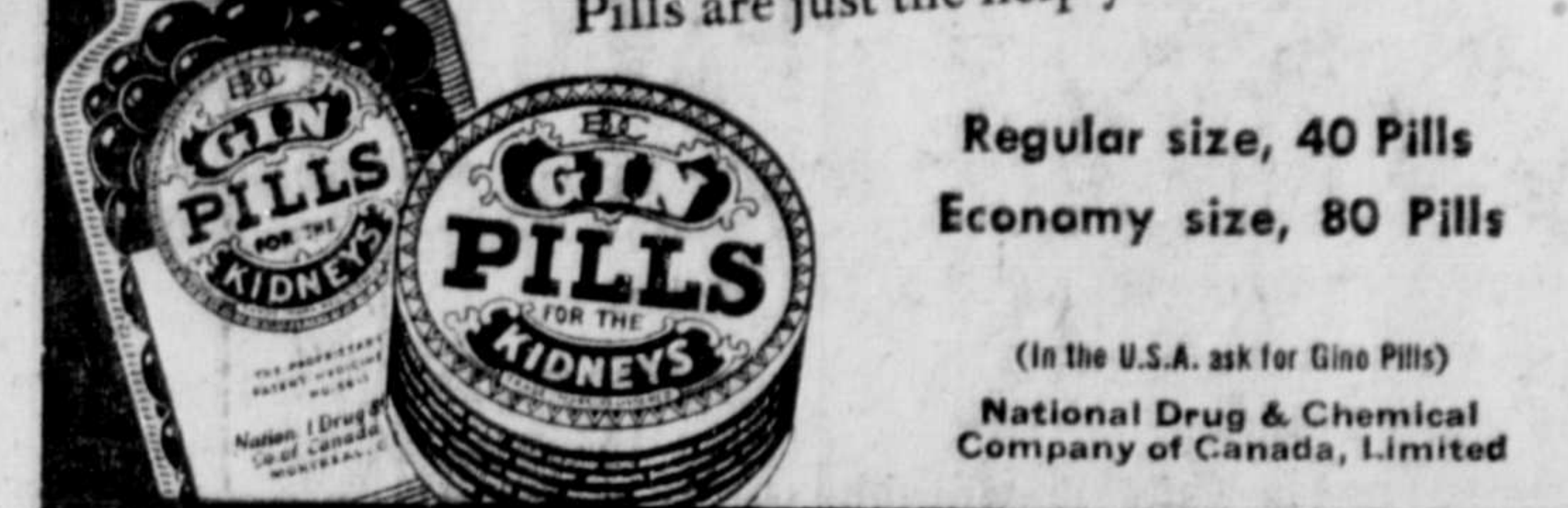

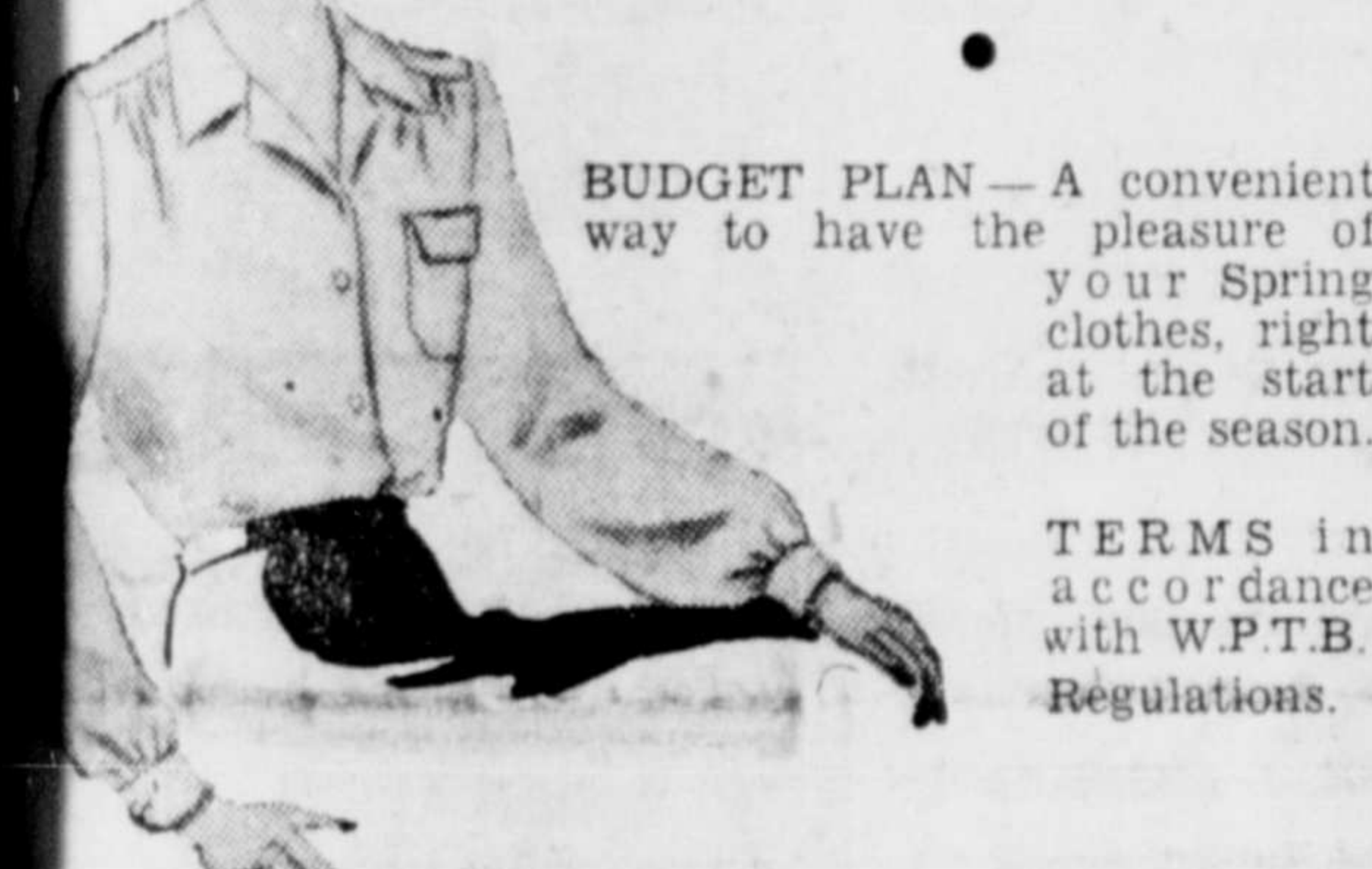

### 300 TONS OF LIVE HERRING ARE IN POUND

A 300-ton mass of herring was caught by McFadden Brothers at their live bait herring pound at Hunt's Inlet, the best catch made in at least two years. At \$5 a barrel, the price sought by the pound operators with the halibut fishermen, the impounded herring will be worth about \$15,000. An earlier run about three weeks ago came into the inlet and departed so fast that the pound operators were unable to get their seines in operation.

Threat of a strike among the halibut fishermen would mean a considerable loss to the pound operators because of the mortality rate among the impounded herring.

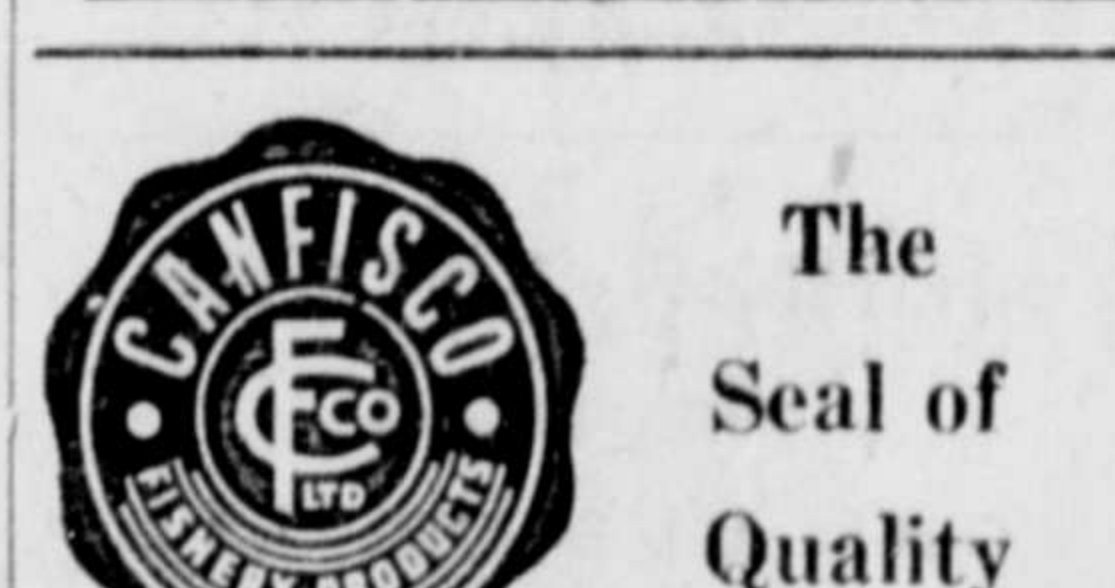

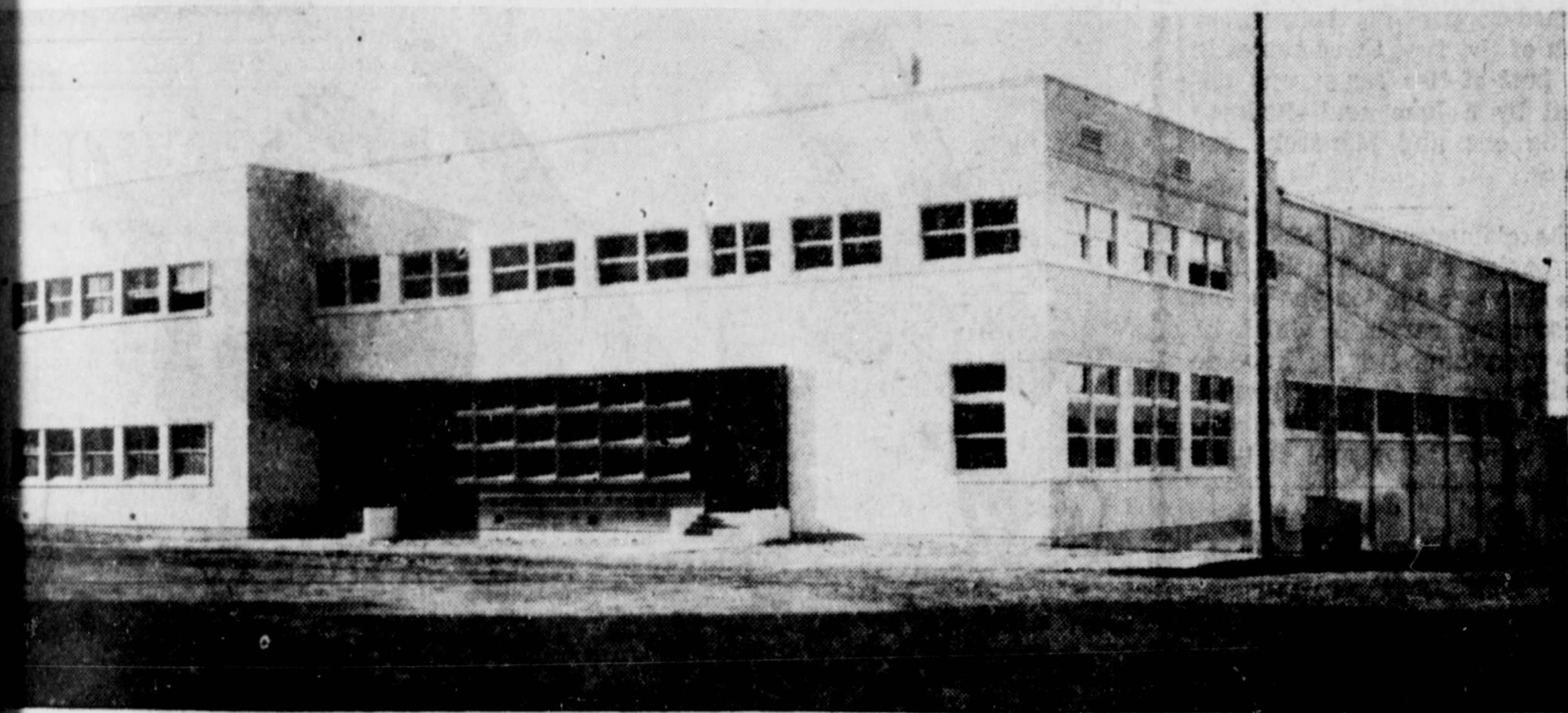
