If the idea of advancing education appeals to the people, then they must be prepared to pay teachers salaries which compare favorably with industry. An analysis of teachers' salaries in the Dominion shows that 74.9 per cent received less than \$1,223 per year; 49.9 per cent less than \$782 per year, and 24.9 per cent less than \$537 per year. Situated at 735 Third Avenue West, the Hollywood is designed to be one of the city's best patronized pleasure spots, for, in addition to a standard a la carte menu, it will specialize in Chinese foods. Its dance floor also will constitute an important attraction.

Due to open on Monday, April 1, the Hollywood is operated by the Kwong Sang Hing Company, and will be managed by Alfred Chow. Mr. Chow promises that Monday evening will be a gala night and that special dance music will be provided by Andy McNaughton at the piano. Latest dance music will be provided thereafter by a standard record player.

Adding much to the smart, modern appearance of the Hollywood is the natural birch finish of the booths and lower walls. This joiner work is a product of the local workshop of Northwest Construction Co. Ltd. The upper walls are done in pale green, and are decorated with relief likenesses of wild geese in flight along the length of the spacious room. Painting and decorating was by Leo Oyer.

The room is lighted by zeon lighting tubes which run in parallel slender lines along the ceiling giving off a soft, restful glow. The effect blends smartly with the atmosphere of the cafe. Lighting was provided and installed by Northern B. C. Power Co. One item that will definitely catch the eye of the patron is the finish of the dance floor which takes up a good portion of the space at the rear of the restaurant. Of eastern birch, its coloring ranges from dark brown, almost black, to pale yellow, and the variations are laid together with clever effect.
