### Railway Is Under Water

Skeena River Is Rising Rapidly  
Warm Spell Continues

Unseasonable heat in the interior for the last 48 hours has caused the Skeena River to rise rapidly and at one place, near Courtenay, 35 miles west of Pacific, it has already flooded the Canadian National Railway tracks. No immediate concern, however, is felt by railway officials.

Continuation of the warm spell could mean a repetition of the disastrous flood of 1936 when the railway along the Skeena Valley and which is blocked by a snowslide.

It was learned at the office of regional superintendent C. A. Macdonald, this afternoon that no immediate fear is felt but, that the warm spell continues, the situation could become dangerous. No official bulletins on the level of the water are being issued here which is considered a good sign.

HAMILTON—Tim Buck, national leader of the Labor-Progressive party, declared here in a May Day speech that there is a conspiracy on foot on a world basis to prevent the United Nations from establishing world peace.

**PALESTINE TENSE**  
JERUSALEM—A tense situation continues in Jerusalem, Jaffa and Nazareth as Arabs make dire threats of outbreak in protest at the 100,000 Jewish migration proposal to Palestine. All schools, shops and restaurants are closed. Buses are not running.

**N.W. TRADE ASS'N**  
VICTORIA—Kemper Freeman of Seattle urged at the Pacific Northwest Trade Association meeting here today that a new highway be built northward from Prince George to connect with the Alaska Highway. Freer border regulations to expedite tourist travel was urged by the Association.

**PARIS CONFERENCE**  
PARIS—Reporters were told by an authoritative spokesman today that "no progress whatever had been made on any controversial issues" at the Big Four foreign ministers' conference which may shortly adjourn.

**NO PLEASURE PERMITS**  
EDMONTON—There will be no permits for pleasure seeking tourists on the Alaska Highway this year, it is announced.

**PROPOSALS REJECTED**  
CHUNGKING—The Chinese Nationalist government today rejected General Marshall's proposals to end the strife in Manchuria. Marshall suggested that a domestic government be set up in Manchuria with an early general election, that Manchuria have national sovereignty and that both Nationalist and communist forces withdraw from the country.

**FEWER VETS WORKLESS**  
VANCOUVER—The number of workless veterans drawing benefits in British Columbia dropped from 4400 at April 1 to 3900 on May 1.

### DUPLESSIS TO QUIT PARLEY

Tension Expected to Abound At Today's Session of Ottawa Conference

OTTAWA—Tension will abound at today's session of the Dominion-provincial conference in Ottawa because Premier Duplessis of Quebec has threatened to quit the conference unless some agreement is presented consistent with "the principles of Confederation."

So far neither Dominion nor provincial governments have budged from their basic positions at the Dominion-provincial conference. Meanwhile, C.C.F. Leader M. J. Coldwell expressed belief that the Dominion government should arrange agreements with seven provinces. He said that the refusal of Ontario Premier Drew and Quebec Premier Duplessis to accept the Dominion proposals is "an example of national disunity and sectional selfishness."

### TRIALS FOR ESPIONAGE

Will Feature Session of Montreal Assizes Opening On Friday

MONTREAL—The spring term of the Court of King's Bench assizes, opening here today, will be highlighted by the trial of an espionage suspect, Fred Rose, the Labor-Progressive member of parliament for Montreal-Cartier. Another Montreal man scheduled to appear on similar charges is Dr. Raymond Boyer, a professor at McGill University.

### Bad Food Was Mutiny Cause

BOMBAY—Four Indian sailors who took part in last February's mutiny in Bombay testified at the naval inquiry that the uprising resulted from very bad food and particularly offensive treatment by British officers. More than 250 persons died in rioting touched off by the mutiny.

### Arabs Aroused by Jew Moving Plan

LONDON—The British-American inquiry committee's report which recommended that 100,000 Jews be admitted into Palestine has stirred up a tempest in the Middle East. The Arab higher committee, in protest, has called for a general strike today of all Arabs in Palestine.

## Desperate Convicts in Break at Alcatraz Island

SAN FRANCISCO (CP)—Desperate convicts, armed with rifles and tommyguns, are fighting a murderous battle for freedom from the American penitentiary on bleak Alcatraz Island. At stake are the lives of some of the prison guards who are held as hostages by the rebellious convicts. Two guards already have been killed and 14 others have been wounded. At the outset of their riot, the convicts seized the gun gallery and captured most of the prison guards.

Guards had pinned the embattled convicts in a cell-block corner at Alcatraz today and temporarily silenced the desperadoes' guns which had made an inferno of the federal prison island in a night of bitter warfare.

Six of the United States most desperate criminals led the attempted break and held ten prison officers as hostages for at least seven hours.

One dead guard, Harold B. Stites, was killed by machine gun fire at close range.

A second guard was fatally wounded as the rioting by the desperate convicts continued into a second day. Guard William A. Miller died in hospital as a new attack was launched to dislodge the still resisting convicts.

Shafts of white smoke streamed into the sky followed by explosions as the new attack was begun.

A guard at the prison reported by telephone to Associated Press that he hadn't time to talk but "we are sure going after them right now."

### THERMOMETER HITS 73, FOR 8-MONTH HIGH

"Phew!" Perspiring Prince Rupert gasped under its second straight day of summer weather today as temperatures hit a heat record untouched since last August. At 2 o'clock this afternoon the thermometer nudged 73 degrees under a cloudless sky and with no wind.

Street tar melted and starched clothing wilted. Not since August 11, 1945 has the temperature risen so high. On that date it reached 80 degrees. On May 27 last year, 75 degrees was recorded. This month is beginning similarly to cloudless May of last year, a phenomenon which most people hope will continue.

At least one Prince Rupertite was in style—Rev. A. P. MacSweeney who sports a straw hat which he brought from the Peace River.

### Operation Muskox Due in Edmonton

EDMONTON—Officials here are getting ready to receive the 47 members of the Army's Operation Muskox. The expedition, which started its 3,100-mile Arctic trek on February 15, is scheduled to arrive in Edmonton Sunday, May 5.

## CONFERENCE AT OTTAWA MAY RISE WITH PREMIERS IN DEADLOCK

OTTAWA—Finance Minister Ilsley today told the Dominion-provincial conference that the Dominion is standing by proposals placed before the conference by Prime Minister King Monday. It could not agree to change proposals by Ontario. Meantime, Premier Duplessis of Quebec, saying that he could see no point in continuing discussions on their present basis, has left on his return to Quebec. Premier Angus Macdonald of Nova Scotia suggests an adjournment until June to allow further study of Dominion and Ontario proposals.

### LOCAL ROAD CONFERENCE

OTTAWA—Premier John Hart and Finance Minister Herbert Anscomb are going down to Montreal from the Dominion-provincial conference to discuss the question of Skeena River Highway jurisdiction in relation to right-of-way between Hazelton and Prince Rupert over part of which the highway passes.

## PEACE RIVER TO RUPERT RAIL LINE URGED BY ROTARY SPEAKER

While development of the Peace River block is hampered because it is connected with no port at reasonable distance through which to ship its tremendous tonnage of grain and foodstuffs, the city of Prince Rupert is hampered because it has a port and no tonnage to pass through it.

### Seeding Is Advanced

Moisture Is General Need Now on Prairies to Make Good Crop

WINNIPEG—Wheat seeding is well advanced in many parts of Western Canada, notably in the southern sections, with early sown wheat beginning to show above ground in a few districts. Little precipitation has occurred to date and high winds have caused some soil drifting in Saskatchewan and Alberta recently, according to the first weekly crop report of the department of agriculture of the Canadian National Railways. Early moisture is the general need.

In southern Manitoba wheat seeding varies from 20 per cent to completion in some districts, being about three weeks earlier than last year. Indications are that wheat acreage will be increased about ten per cent with little change in coarse grains. Good progress has been made in seeding coarse grains in this area. Moisture conditions are good. In northern Manitoba, wheat seeding is from one to two weeks earlier than last year and weather has been very favorable so far for seeding operations.

Seeding is general around the Regina district, ranging from one to two weeks earlier than last year. Moisture is generally sufficient to germinate crops but west and southwest of Regina there is no reserve and rains are needed immediately. Two bad dust storms occurred during the past week in this section. In central and northern Saskatchewan, wheat seeding has commenced, with top and sub-soil conditions reported fair in the central portion and good in the northern sections.

Seeding will be general north and east of Calgary by May 6, being about a week earlier than last year. Increased wheat acreage is also indicated with other grain acreages remaining about the same as last year.

High winds on April 26 resulted in considerable soil drifting practically over the entire territory. North of Calgary moisture conditions are good, but easterly moisture is only fair. Moisture conditions in north central Alberta are good and seeding will be general early in May.

### North Weather Is Unfavorable

Weather conditions in northern Alberta have been unfavorable to permit field operations on a large scale. Seeding is started and will be general by this week-end. Strong winds and light rains have occurred at various points and moisture conditions are considered good. Seeding throughout this area is somewhat later than normal.

The playful smacks were only part of the antics of Shumei Okawa who long advocated an aggressive war to drive the white race from Asia.

Shouting gibberish that even the Japanese said they could not understand, Okawa had to be pulled forcibly from the courtroom by American military police at the afternoon recess.

Tojo was shocked when slapped on his shaven head and looked up quickly but, when he saw Okawa, he gave a sad, understanding smile.

### MERCY TRIP AT MIDNIGHT

Triple Island Light Keeper Brought to City After Sustaining Injury

After an all-night errand of mercy over the waters of Hecate Straits by Capt. Charles C. Currie of the local tugboat CRC and S. J. Mellor, chief operator of Digby Island wireless station, Jack Leeming, radio operator and acting lighthouse keeper of Triple Island, is resting easily in the Prince Rupert General Hospital today receiving treatment following an accident at the lighthouse last yesterday.

Leeming had caught his hand in the fan belt of the light mechanism and sustained quite painful injuries. He was able to make known his plight by radiophone to Digby Island whereupon Mellor lost no time in organizing relief. At midnight Currie and Mellor were under way and, favored by unusually smooth surface conditions, were safe back at 6:30 this morning.

At the same time Al Hooper of Digby Island station was taken out to Triple Island to relieve Leeming.

### Germany's Future

The German people have been told what they must pay for their attempt at world aggression. Their standard of living will be 30 percent below the prewar level by 1949 and that only by hard work, long hours and on the plainest possible food.

They will have to give up almost half of their prewar industry and return to the standard of living as it was in the depression year of 1932, before Hitler started overrunning and looting the countries of Europe.

There will be a ban on all industries of war-making potentiality. The decision, arrived at by the four occupying powers, strikes a medium between plans ranging from turning Germany into a nation of shepherds and farmers to giving her full rein for a comeback under her own power.

Revenge has not been the motivating thought in drafting Germany's future. The determination that the former Reich shall never again attain an industrial level which is the prime prerequisite for waging war has been the foremost consideration.

Because the entire economy of Europe is closely linked with Germany's ability as an industrial nation, it would not have been practical to have completely smothered her efforts in this field.

The vitally important thing is a constant control for many years to see that the Vaterland does not slyly and unobtrusively regain her former strength. That control will increase in importance as the years go by and the tendency will be to forgive and forget.

### Moral Fitness Needed

A free world cannot survive without America's leadership, and America's leadership depends on her individual citizens' concept of morality. So declares Bruce Hutchison, associate editor of the Winnipeg Free

Press, writing in Maclean's Magazine.

Hutchison's article sees the United States as the first dominant power in history with such huge resources of its own that it has no need to covet those of any other nation. It assumes that America, there, will use her leadership for the world's benefit and not for imperialistic purposes. But the question of American morality overshadows every other, "because the paramount issue of humanity in our time is a moral one, not a political or economic one. . . . History has never before presented such a clear opportunity for the physically greatest world power to become also its greatest moral power."

Examining America's morals as the key to her fitness to lead, the author finds that the world's highest standard of living has failed to bring the highest standard of happiness. Original principles of American's democracy, "inseparable from a deep religious conviction and an individual life of virtue," have been attacked. "Life and liberty so far remain as sacred as when they were written into the Declaration, but the pursuit of happiness has been distorted beyond the recognition of the Founding Fathers." This distortion of the old concept of happiness, Hutchison holds, stems from a glorification of mere things. America has veered from religious belief and inner faith to "the paraphernalia of outer happiness, the glittering, thin satisfactions of unexampled luxury." To produce more goods, to create more things, in the belief that the things will create better men, is today the chief drive of American life and politics. "The national income figure—of which early Americans had never heard—is exalted to an index of national character. The search for truth has become for millions the search for a new kind of bathtub."

The author asks: "Is this to be the philosophy, the way of life, which America is going to export to the world? Are the great ideals of American life to be merely incidentals, shipped as an afterthought with cargoes of machinery and gadgets?"

The answer, he says, lies with the American people—"in the millions of unknown homes in the United States, among the obscure men and women who, almost without realizing it, are the hope of the world."

This custodian must be authorized in writing by the sponsoring organization — and must register at the nearest Local Ration Board or Ration Branch. An official card will be issued to each approved custodian from the Ration Board.

Administration. Custodians may then collect meat coupons from their sponsoring organization and turn them in at frequent intervals to the Local Ration Board or Branch. Receipts for the number of coupons turned in will be given to each custodian. Give your coupons only to authorized persons. Ask to see the official card from the Ration Board.

Douglas Edenshaw of Massett, who has been fishing out of Ketchikan for the past year or so, is at present in the city. He plans on resuming fishing in this area.





Pacific and Churchill on Hudson's Bay. Completion of three gaps in existing rail lines at a cost of \$18,000,000 would bring the line into being.

Not Costly  
After All

"Cost of this economically important route is not so great when you consider that the provincial government is thinking of spending \$32,000,000 to 'complete' the Pacific Great Eastern from Squamish to the Peace River country. It is a small figure in terms of modern government and industrial spending," he declared.

Mr. Applewhite said that his committee feels that it "is

a waste of time to approach the C.N.R. in this regard because the C.N.R. is not interested in the development of the north."

Completion of the northern rail link would decrease by more than 1,000 miles the distance between Hong Kong and Liverpool via Prince Rupert and Churchill under the route via Vancouver and Montreal.

That line has not been built for the sole reason that financial interests in Vancouver and Montreal are afraid that it would divert grain shipments from those two ports," he charged.

Distance between Prince Rupert and Churchill is 1,805 miles, of which 1,280 miles of rail have already been built, he said.

## Bottom of Harbor Is Explored

Capt. Charles Hann's beam trawler Zenardi, first privately owned fishing vessel of the Prince Rupert fleet to be equipped with a supersonic depth sounder probed the bottom of Prince Rupert Harbor for more than three hours Thursday afternoon while expert technicians tested the accuracy of the new instrument which is designed to take much of the guesswork out of fishing.

The really important function of the machine from the fisherman's viewpoint is that it shows

fish schools clearly as well as the bottom.

Aboard the Zenardi during her test run were Mr. Bautzman, J. A. Storrow, technician for Magneto Sales and Service Ltd., Vancouver, provincial agents; E. N. Lursch of Victoria, sales agent for Vancouver Island; Al Colclough, who has been appointed local agent, and A. P. Crawley, local boat builder.

Readings on the depth sounder would indicate that Prince Rupert Harbor has an average depth of about 150 feet. In many places it has a depth of more than 200 feet only a short distance offshore.

## ATTRACTIVE NEW HOUSES

London Dock Workers Having Living Accommodation Vastly Superior to Old Slums

LONDON ©—Renting for \$3.37 a week, the attractive new bungalow houses being built in the blitzed-out dock areas of London are trim and utilitarian with living room, two bedrooms, kitchen and bathroom. A fire in the living room not only provides, hot water but heats the whole house through concealed air pipes. Kitchens are equipped with electric hot water heater and thermostat, electric cooker, large sink and adequate cupboard space. In the small rectangular hallway is a handy drying cupboard and a clothes closet.

Stebondale Street, pleasantly grooved with trees, but disfigured at intervals by gaunt brick shells of bombed houses, is the main highway of the new "prefabs" and in it are many grateful couples, with young children, who never before had a home of their own.

Mr. and Mrs. Tom Donaghy saw their old home on Stebondale St. for the last time when they took the children to a movie in Poplar one evening. It was in ruins when they returned and

their subsequent search for shelter took them as far afield as southeast Clapham.

"I had to travel daily to my work in Poplar," Irish-born Donaghy said, "and it was no picnic during the raids. As soon as we heard of these new prefabs we put in an application and, as old residents of Cubitt Town, we got first priority."

Mrs. Donaghy regretted not having a garden where Tom could "potter about" and grow vegetables.

Other tenants feel the same. They would like a little plot of grass in front and a garden behind whereas the new bungalows have neither. Front doors open onto the sidewalk and back doors face a low wire fence separating

them from the skeletons of old sturdy homes.

Many of Cubitt Town's tenants are engaged in the building trade and some are actually putting up new bungalows similar to their own. Four men put up a "prefab" in one day working an aggregate of 12 man hours, but each structure requires a carpenter, plumber, glazier and painter. And a variety of labor is hard to come by nowadays.

Meanwhile, some 600 bombed-out residents are waiting for homes and 4,000 more, including newly-weds and people bombed out of other east London towns, are still on the council's waiting list.

Modern Producers Act Smartly to Give Novel Twists to Programs

Producers of the Canadian Cavalcade program didn't lose much time in signing June Veronica Buckley for a spot on the Show. The 17-year old stowaway had been in Canada less than a week when she came down from the St. Thomas, Ont., home of her uncle Rhys Edwards to be interviewed on the Toronto broadcast.

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
