Body of Indian Girl is Found in Ninth Avenue Shack Sunday

The body of an 18-year-old Indian girl was discovered by city police on a bed face downward with head into a pillow in a cabin at 208 Ninth Avenue East shortly after 2 o'clock Sunday afternoon where the girl died allegedly after a drinking party Saturday night, and two white men are in the city iail today charged with supplying liquor to Indians.

The dead girl is Ethel Shanoss, age 18, of Skeena Crossing. An inquest into her death is scheduled to begin at 2 p.m. tomorrow. Pending inquest, the police are not speculating on the cause of death.

Held on charges of supplying liquor to Indians as a result of the alleged party are Robert Gordon Robinson, who occupies the cabin at the rear of 208 Ninth Avenue East. and John Wing.

The fourth member of the party, according to the police, was Effie Johnson, 17year-old native girl of Kitwanga.

At 2 o'clock p.m. Sunday Constables Anderson and Cowgill, in response to a call to the Ninth Avenue address, found the body of the Shanoss girl on a bed in the cabin. There were indications that she had been ill. A bruise was noticed on the forehead. Robinson, who was said to have made the call, was taken into custody a short time later. Dr. W. S. Kergin was called and pronounced the girl dead. The body was still warm but death had probably been a little time previous.

According to the police, the two girls had arrived in the city Saturday night from Port Edward on a C.N.R. way freight, and had met John Wing down town. They were taken to Robinson's cabin about 11 o'clock where they were joined a short time later by Robin-

The party was said to have consumed a quantity of gin before Wing left the place at 3 o'clock a.m. on Sunday. Robinson and the two girls stayed in the cabin.

According to the police, Robinson said that, when he and the Johnson girl awakened about noon Sunday, the Shanoss girl was

An autopsy was held by Dr. R. E. Coleman last night, and Coroner M. M. Stephens has set 2 o'clock Tuesday afternoon as for the inquest.

The dead girl's mother is said to be working at Port Edward.



International Limelight

The publicity that thas been given British responsibility in Greece and Indonesia as a result of Russian and Ukrainian complaints is so much to the good from the British point of view for Britain's actions in Greece and Indonesia have frequently been obscured and distorted by the emotions surrounding these issues and for political reasons.

UNO has much to gain by refusing to evade delicate issues such as these and the United Kingdom has nothing to lose from an international inquiry into their motives and actions.

In fact Foreign Secretary Bevin in his cards-on-the-table speech to the House of Commons in November invited just such action. "Great Britain," he asserted, "will not be afraid and will not in any way decline to have anything it does or wants or seeks to promote discussed in open assembly, at the United Nations, if necessary."

It may be pointed out in passing that the cases of Greece and Java are by no means parallel to that of Iran. In the letter, the question was raised not by the United Kingdom government or any third party, but by the Iranian government itself. In fact the United Kingdom government attempted to get the U.S.S.R. and Iran to settle the matter out of court. In the case of Greece and Indonesia, the question was raised by the Soviet and Ukrainian delegations respectively without consultation with the Greek or the Dutch governments and without attempting to get these governments and Britain to settle out of court. And indeed, Mr. Sophoulos, the Greek prime minister, issued a statement that United Kingdom troops are in Greece at the invitation and with the full co-operation of the Greek government for the purpose of maintaining order.

Canada's Decontrol Policy

In outlining the process of decontrol, Prime Minister Mackenzie King summed up the government's position in these words:

"There is a great deal of difference between a gradual and planned policy of adjustment to post-war conditions, which may involve some modest increase in prices; and a policy of rapid removal of anti-inflation controls. The objective of the government's policy is to continue to protect the people of Canada from a sharp upswing in prices and living costs, and from the inevitable aftermath of deflation, unemployment and distress. Its purpose is to protect the value of wages and wartime savings. It is aimed to help open larger markets both at home and abroad, and thus hasten progress toward the high level of peacetime production and employment which is our leading economic objective. With the intelligent support of the

Canadian people Canada's anti-inflation program will achieve its aim. It will bring our country through the most destructive war in history and its aftermath without the economic and social disruption which has bee nthe sorry heritage of past conflicts."




