Welcome H.M.C.S. Crescent

Prince Rupert became very much used to the presence of naval vessels in port during the recent war but the fact that the strict rules of censorship made it impossible to recognize their presence in any public way had the effect of diminishing interest. In fact, as far as the public was concerned, the pleasant, intimate contact which we used to enjoy to large extent disappeared. However, with the return of peace, this is all changed again. We can tell about the navy being here, we can entertain the personnel openly and visit back and forth freely between ship and shore. All of which is a very happy return to the old times. H.M.C.S. Crescent, Canada's fine new destroyer, is the first naval vessel we have had visit us since the navy moved out last fall following the end of hostilities. It is fitting, therefore, that we should make this welcome an especial one. It will be but the first of several further visitation of similar character. Later on H.M.C.S. Charlottetown, another of Canada's fine new naval ships, will be here and, in due course, it is to be expected Prince Rupert, due to its important location, will receive and welcome other Canadian fighting vessels of the Royal Navy as well as friendly Allied warships.

merchant. He addressed envelopes in a room next to the office of George Brown, a famous editor of The Globe, and was there when a discharged printer shot Brown to death in 1880. Ten years later Macklin had become cashier of the paper and was

sent to Winnipeg as business manager of the Free Press. He was made its general manager in 1910 and its president in 1912. He held the general managership until 1935 but retained the presidency.

He was the moving spirit in organizing the Western Associated Press of Canada in 1907, modelling it after the Associated Press.

Those were boom days in the western Canadian prairies. Cities were springing up almost overnight and with them daily newspapers.

The new organization brought to the papers of western Canada their first comprehensive Canadian news service. Like its prototype across the border, the report was non-partisan, handled co-operatively and without profit motive. Its success resulted in formation of similar bodies in central Canada and in the eastern maritime provinces, the links of these organizations being with Buffalo, New York, and Boston. Unity was achieved under the pressure of the World War on September 1, 1917, when the Canadian Press inaugurated a coast-to-coast co-operative news service. The new body was incorporated under a special act of the Dominion Parliament as a non-profit making organization. Macklin, whose missionary efforts had been chiefly responsible for amalgamation of the sectional associations, was named first vice-president for the west. He held that office until 1924 when the office of honorary president was created for him. By that time the Canadian Press membership embraced virtually all of the nearly 100 Canadian dailies. Macklin's hobbies marked him, too. He claimed he played poker best after he began wearing a gopher tail as a watch charm. He shot most of the golf courses of the Dominion and won fame on links from Halifax to Victoria for a power of expression which a friend once described as Viscount Alexander Welco med as Governor-General

This afternoon at 4 o'clock it is expected that a trial run will be made with a Bendix Marine Supersonic Depth Sounder. Capt. Charles Hann's boat, Zenardi, is now at the Dry Dock where the Bendix representatives and the installing agent, Magneto Sales, Vancouver, are installing the instrument.

Supersonic Depth Sounder is a new type of equipment not available during the war and was primarily designed as an aid to navigation. The information it gives enables it to be used as a fishermen's aid. Edward H. Macklin

"Father of the Canadian Press" was the title bestowed by his fellow members in that organization upon Edward Hamilton Macklin, for many years picturesque publisher of the Winnipeg Free Press, whose death occurred this week. The acknowledgment of his leadership in building up co-operative newsgathering in Canada came at the 1937 meeting of the Canadian Press when he retired from its directorate. It was recorded that in his 20 years as a member of the board, he had never missed a meeting. His other enduring monument was the Winnipeg Free Press. He directed it form 40-odd years, building it up through the development decades of the prairie provinces until it was one of the outstanding papers of the nation.
