Vote Expected Today On Vexed Question of Majority - Canada's Proposal Meets With Approval STILL WRANGLING TODAY

PARIS-The peace conference rules committee rejected today a proposal by Foreign Minister Masaryk of CzechoSlovakia to appoint a sub-committee to study various proposals for voting procedure Foreign Minister Moltov then suggested that two-thirds majority be required in committee to adopt any proposals on voting procedure. Secretary of State James Byrnes of the United States then said that procedure suggested by the foreign ministers' council called for a simple majority vote on procedural matters and said:: "I am really surprised that the representative of the Soviet Union has suggested this."



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PARLEY START SLOW

THE PEACE CONFERENCE at Paris has been under way for just about a week now and it has not got down to business yet. Not even the preliminaries have been disposed of up to today. Procedure has been causing considerable acrimony, culminating today in a bitter clash between Byrnes and Molotov. Considering what has yet to come, the business so far receiving attention might be considered inconsequential. However, this may have been the blowing off of steam. It is to be hoped that the dispatch of the conference's business is not to be guaged by the accomplishments of this first week which appear to have been practically nil. It has not been a very auspicious start, indeed, and there is no denying that wishful thinking enters into the hope that from now on there may be something better in the way of progress.

GOOD PUBLICITY

PRINCE RUPERT is already deriving valuable publicity from the motor trip on which Chief Petty Officer Leslie Paige and his wife are embarked and are now crossing Canada for a handsome gold medal presented by a Prince Rupert jeweler to the Public Relations Council as a trophy for the first car to drive from Halifax to Prince Rupert. Through the instrumentality of the Halifax Herald and the Prince Rupert Daily News the Canadian Press has become actively interested and has its correspondents and the newspapers across Canada looking out for the young motorists.

Meantime, it is fitting that Prince Rupert should make arrangements for a suitable presentation when arrival is made which will probably be during the time of the annual Civic Centre Carnival.
