Minister Talks-

Says Flatly That Canadian Officials Gave Away Secrets Involving Country's Safety

OTTAWA - For the first time the Canadian government has stated flatly that foreign powers obtained secret and confidential information from Canadian public officials. In a statement in the capital yesterday, the justice minister, Louis St. Laurent, said that public officials had given away the information-"to the prejudice of the public safety or interests of Canada and of friendly powers."

The minister also disclosed the scope of the inquiry when he released the text of an order-in-council passed last October This gave the Royale Canadian Mounted Police the power to enter and search any premises occupied by a suspect, and the power to search everyone found there. Congratulations, Prince Rupert

Congratulations to our good old friend of the coastal service, the veteran but still sound and faithful steamer Prince Rupert, on being the first British Columbia vessel to be equipped with the wonder new navigational device of radar. It has now been in operation on the Rupert for a week or so and the master, Capt. Ernest Caldwell, is highly enthusiastic about the valuable aid it renders him and his navigating officers in the operation of their ship.

It is satisfactory to see this move on the part of the operating company, Canadian National Steamships, to keep its sole remaining unit on the coast modern and up-to-date in spite of her age. In any criticism we may have indulged in as to the steamship policy of the Canadian National it cannot be directed at the way our popular namesake ship has been handled and maintained through her long years of good and consistent service and that is why we are doubly glad to see that she is the lead ship in this latest development.

Red Cross Fights On

Fighting disease, death and the elements is all in the day's work of Red Cross nurses who serve at British Columbia's Outpost Hospitals. With three of these institutions already operating in this province at McBride, Cecil Lake and Bamfield, a fourth is now being opened at Kyuquot while others are being planned for remote areas in this province. Red Cross emergency service centres, which number eight at present, will also shortly be increased to take care of the growing population of the hinterland.

Last year forty-one babies were born at Red Cross Outpost Hospitals, 285 patients were treated in hospital, 688 outpatients were served and two of the Red Cross nurses travelled 4,500 miles to look after these people.

Being a nurse in an Outpost requires not only physical strength, but mental courage. These Florence Nightingales of the woods must be able to handle any emergency, to ride a horse over snow-covered trails, to man a boat to visit patients on Vancouver Island's rocky west coast and in remote interior spots. They have to deal with epidemics, childbirth under primitive conditions, logging accidents, as well as the routine calls of ordinary nursing.

Life is never dull, for in their work they are always dealing with some new emergency that must be solved by their training and ready wit. This is only one of the services which members of the Red Cross keep operating in this province. With only 5 deaths recorded in 1945 at these Outposts, it might well be said that the Red Cross supplies lifesaving services.



Locked in a dark, tiny cabin on the boat deck of the steamer Prince Rupert, a Daily News reporter today viewed Prince Rupert harbor - on the display screen of the ship's radar mechanism. 




