He reports that from Paris to Berlin, millions of people in Europe are seriously concerned over the possibility of war between the Russian group and western nations. Scores of people, some in responsible positions, seem to accept the inevitability of war with the Soviet.

Reg Lavigne 'New Broom' Party Candidate, Is Teen Town Mayor

Teen Town's "New Broom" party did a partial job of clean sweeping at the Saturday night civic elections when it succeeded in whisking Reg Lavigne, its mayoralty candidate, into office as Chief Magistrate by a margin of nine votes over former Mayor Mel Thompson.

RED CROSS APPEAL

TORONTO—Plans for a \$5,000,000 national Red Cross appeal next March for its peacetime work throughout Canada were announced by Arthur L. Bishop, chairman of the society's national executive committee.

However, it lost the other two key seats on the Teen Town administration set-up to the previous "Old" party incumbents, when Miss Mickey Murray was returned as City Clerk and Bob McChesney retained his authority as Police Chief.

Closing of the polls in the Civic Centre at 10 o'clock Saturday night, terminated the liveliest political campaign in Teen Town's brief history. Culminating a 10-day electioneering spasm in which radio speeches and bill posters proclaimed the fitness of the candidates, a total of 291 voters cast ballots.

B.C. MAN ON WORLD FLIGHT

VANCOUVER—With as little concern as if he were purchasing street car tickets, a Vancouver businessman, Edward F. Gundry, fishing net manufacturer, stepped into the local Trans-Canada Air Lines' ticket office recently and picked up tickets that will take him around the world by air.

As far as is known it is the first trans-world air passage sold in Canada.
Mr. Gundry is well known in fishing circles in Prince Rupert and on the Skeena River, having visited here on business several times. He was a guest speaker at the Prince Rupert Rotary Club a few months ago.

Mr. Gundry's itinerary is studded with names made famous by the war. He left Saturday afternoon for San Francisco for the initial over-water hop to Honolulu. Then comes Canton Island, Suva, New Caledonia and Auckland. A few hours takes him to Sydney.

BUFFALO STEAKS \$1.75 PER POUND

MINNEAPOLIS — Buffalo meat—10,000 pounds—was bought up here in a few hours by meat-hungry residents. One man phoned 1,500 miles to have steaks put away for him but was refused. The bison steaks sold for \$1.75 a pound; while buffalo burgers were cheaper at \$1 a pound.

EXCOMMUNICATE YUGOSLAVS IN BISHOP'S TRIAL

VATICAN CITY, Italy — The Vatican has announced the excommunication of all Yugoslavs connected with the trial of Archbishop Alojzije Stepinic. The Archbishop was sentenced to 16 years imprisonment at forced labor after being found guilty of collaboration with the Axis.

A rupture between the Vatican and Yugoslavia may possibly result.

Several Italian newspapers interpreted the announcement of excommunication for all government officials of Catholic faith responsible for the trial and conviction at Zagreb included Marshal Tito, head of the Yugoslav government.

However, authoritative Vatican quarters said Tito's exact status was not known. It was not known if Tito is a Catholic.

Baseball—Brecheen Carried Off Field By Team Mates; Cards Win Games 4-3

ST. LOUIS—St. Louis Cardinals won the World Series today by a 4-3 victory over the Boston Red Sox to send home-town fans into a frenzy.

Cards, behind the sparkling performance of Harry Brecheen on the mound, chalked up a second win in two days over the Sox to end the series 4 games to 3.
Brecheen "The Cat" was in top form, despite his heavy and successful pitching duties yesterday.

ST. LOUIS (CP)—Harry (The Cat) Brecheen hurled St. Louis Cardinals to world championship today with courageous job of relief pitching for 4-3 decision over Boston Red Sox in the seventh game of 43rd World Series.

Thus Brecheen joined eight other pitching greats with three decisions in fall classic, first since 1920.
A huge throng of 36,143 fans practically mobbed crafty left hander as final out was recorded to give the Red Birds upset victory over the favored American champions.

In thrill packed finale Cards pulled it out of fire with an eight-inning run engineered by Enos Slaughter's daring base running, run that meant \$3,736.45 to each of underdog Red Birds.

After the teams traded runs in first and second innings, Sox scored first and Birds tying it up in second, St. Louis apparently put the game in ice box with two-run outburst in fifth that sent Dave (Boo) Ferris to early shower.

Only Alfred Rosenberg Refuses to Return to Religion For Solace

NUERNBERG (CP)—Official reports circulated today said that hangings of the 11 condemned Nazi ringleaders would begin in Nuernberg prison yard at 12:01 a.m. Wednesday (3:01 p.m. P.S.T. Tuesday).
Previously it had been expected that the executions would start at Dawn.
Executions are expected to take about three hours altogether.
The Four Power Commission made it plain there would be no official announcement until after the last man had gone to the scaffold.

France Accepts New Constitution

PARIS (CP)—France voted to accept its new constitution Sunday but the feature of the plebiscite was the failure of 30-odd per cent of the electorate to cast ballots.

CANADA HAS 33 VIOLENT DEATHS

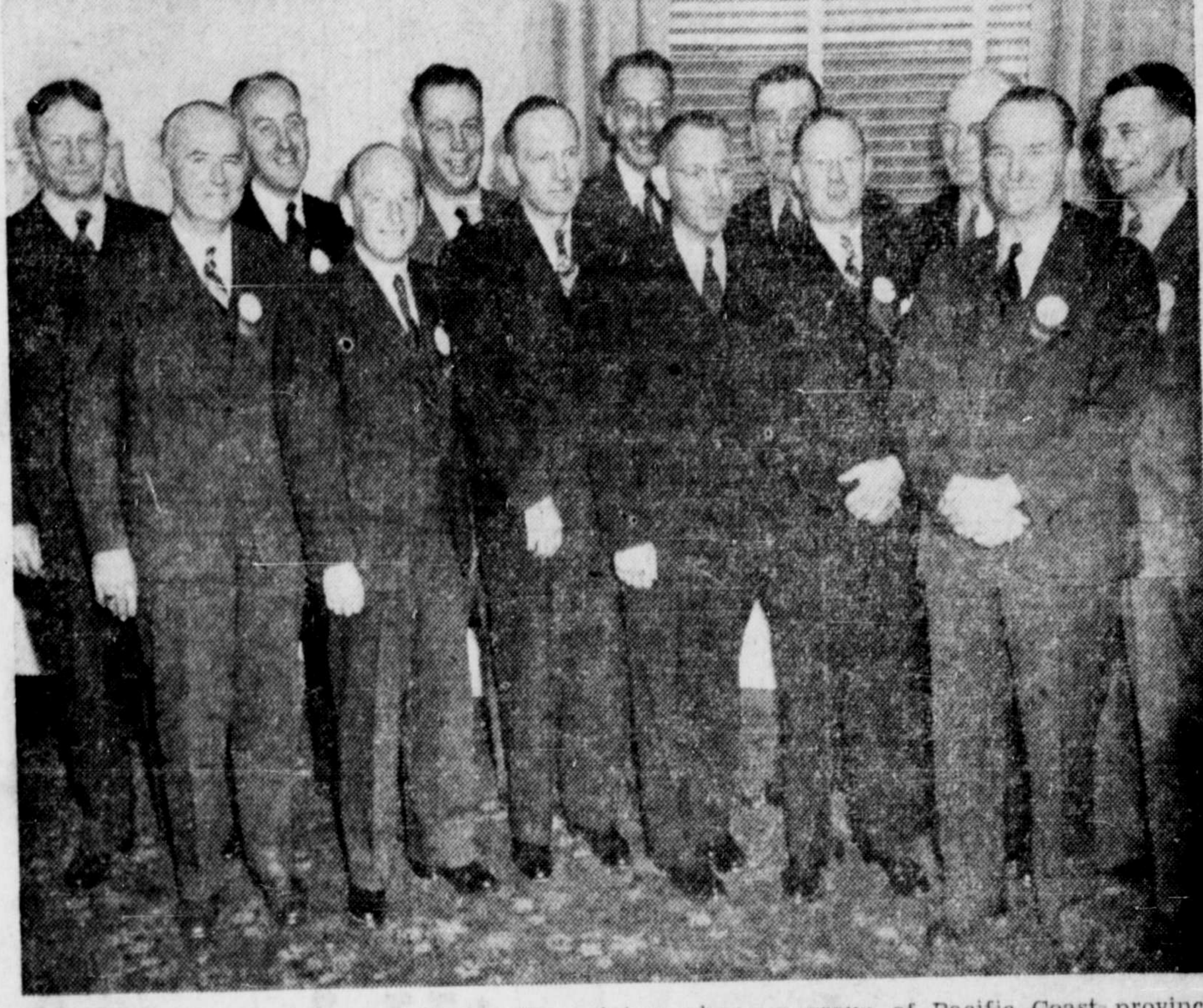
TORONTO (CP)—Canadian observance of Thanksgiving Day was saddened by a heavy list of 33 violent deaths, among them 22 highway fatalities.

Yugoslavia Quits Peace Talks In Strong Protest Over Trieste

Not Participating In Final Approval Conference On Decisions of Nations

PARIS—Paris Peace Conference officially ended late today.

PARIS (CP)—Yugoslavia withdrew officially from the Peace Conference today as delegates of 21 countries conducted the final session.

The YugoSlav delegation, which had contended but without success for the Italian port of Trieste, declared the country would not participate in the final approval of conference decisions and would not associate herself with recommendations.

CLAIM SLAV AND ALBANIAN BANDS ATTACK GREEKS

KOZANE, Greece—Officials reported today that three northern Greek villages were attacked and one was burned by bands "directed by Communist agents" from Albania and Yugoslavia.

A Greek post on Yugoslavia frontier fought off a band of 500.

DREAMBOAT HIT BY MECHANICAL DIFFICULTIES

PARIS — Pacusan Dreamboat returned to Orly Field today when mechanical trouble developed a few hours after it took off in an effort to break the transAtlantic speed record between Paris and New York.

The Dreamboat had hoped to make the flight in 11½ hours. The present record is 14 hours, 39 minutes.

To span the 3600 miles, the Dreamboat would have to race at 313 miles per hour. The former record required a speed of 284 miles per hour.

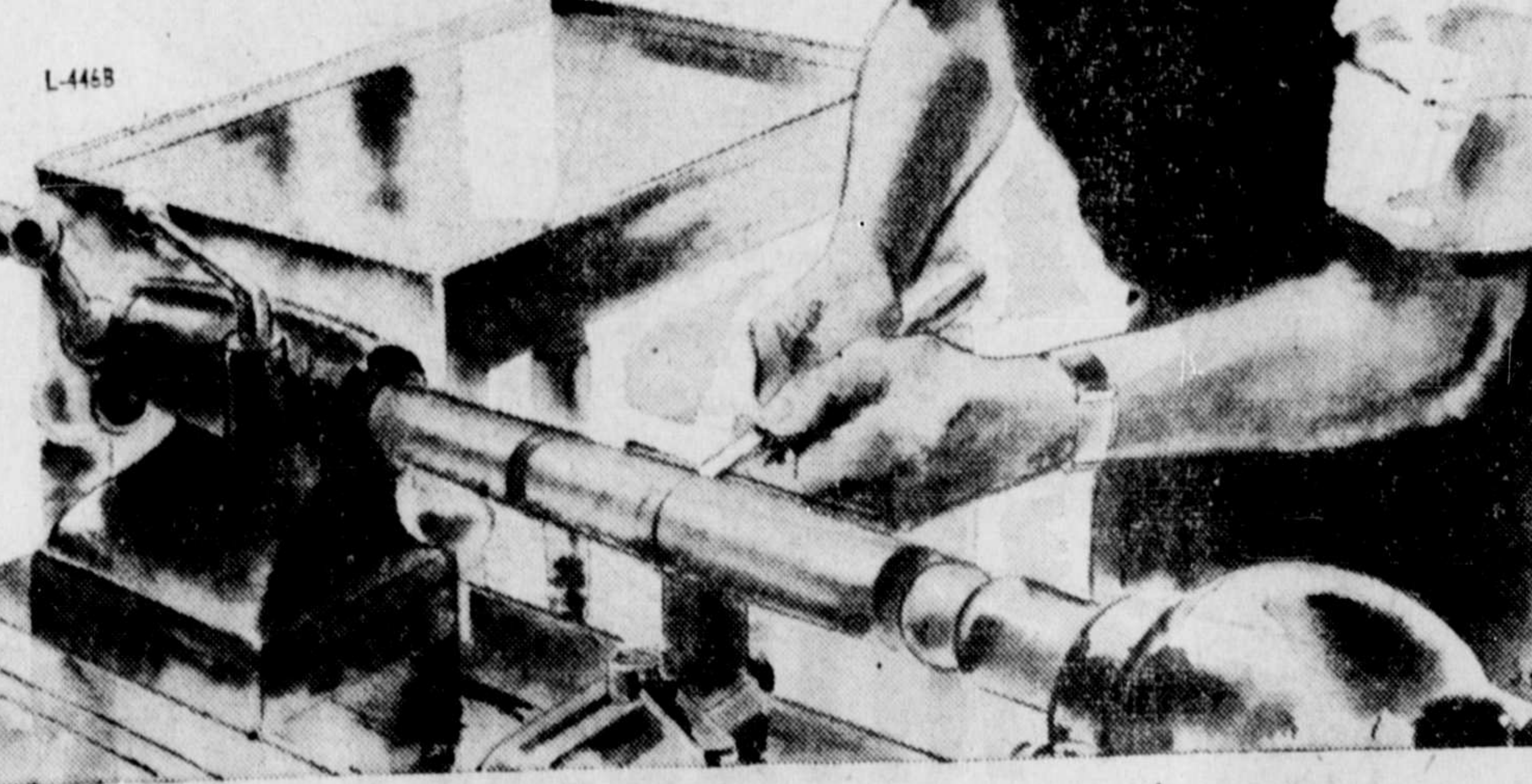

UNRRA IMPORTS RAIL PROBLEMS

ROME—So great is the increase in UNRRA shipments arriving in Italian ports that emergency measures are now being taken to prevent bottlenecks and to secure the most economical use of the very limited number of freight cars at present at the disposal of the Italian State Railways. All ports are to be brought into fullest operation and more use is to be made of road transport, coastal shipping and inland waterways. A central transport committee has been formed representative of all ministries, the UNRRA Italy Mission, European Central Internal Transport Organization and the Allied Military Forces, which will examine all demands for transport and co-ordinate them with available facilities.

Coal shipments are the greatest problem, with some 77 ships loaded for Italy cleared for U.S., while some 30 ships sailed from Denmark and Sweden ports. War losses and losses due to war have left Italy's servicable fleet by more than 30 per cent from 125,956 before the 1946. In spite of intensive activity in the railway shops, it has been possible to attain only a small rolling stock available.

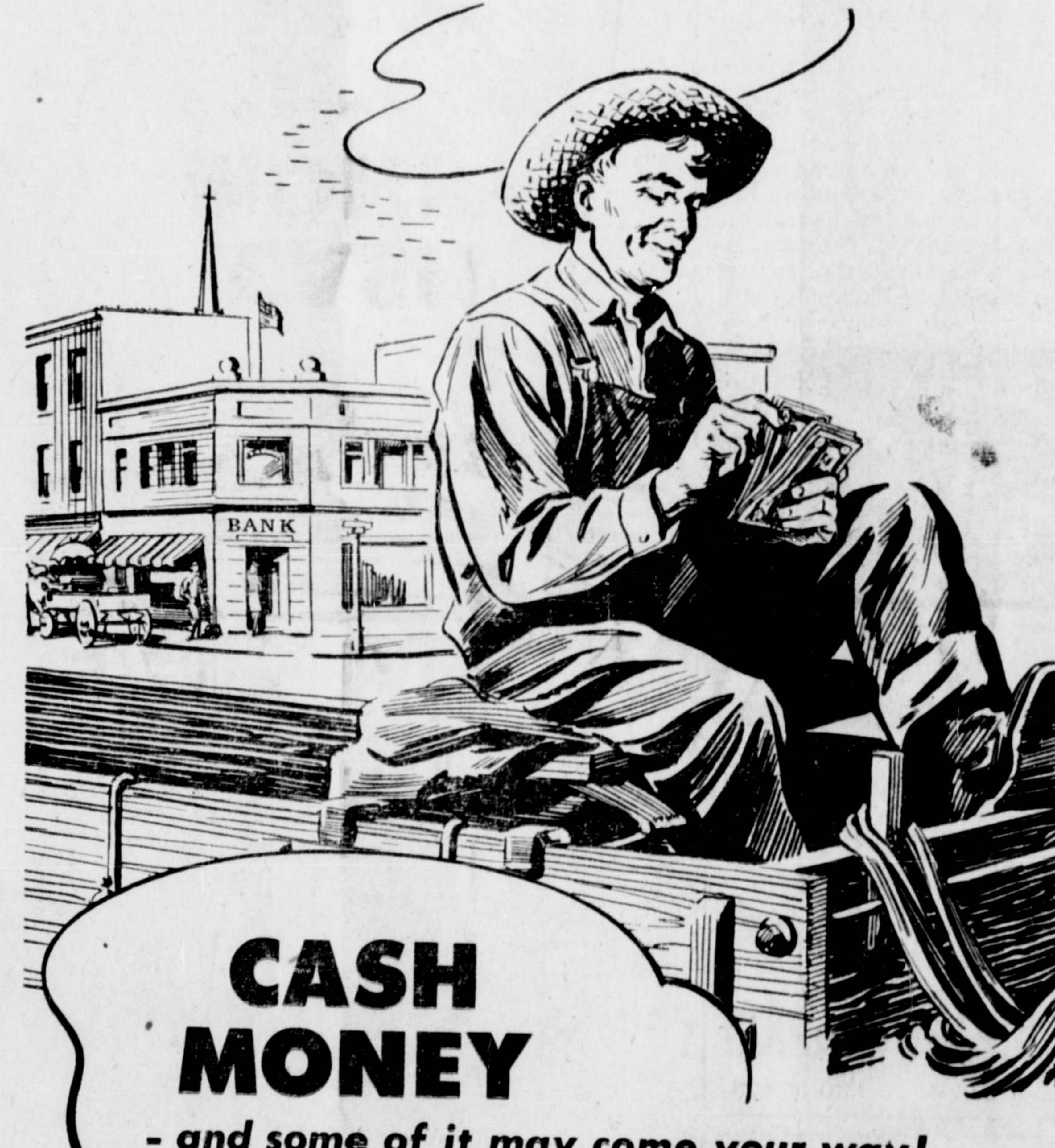
