## Huge Black Market Found

Hundreds of Thousands of Dollars of Goods Involved in Huge Waterfront Thefts at Halifax

HALIFAX — A huge waterfront theft ring stretching from Halifax docks into inland Canada and involving hundreds of thousands of dollars worth of merchandise has been uncovered by the Royal Canadian Mounted Police, it was disclosed today.

Existence of a black market organization which specialized in wool and almost exclusive in sensitive British textiles was revealed by an intensive six weeks investigation by Royal Canadian Mounted Police officers in Halifax, Toronto, Montreal and intermediate centres along the focal point of the probe in Halifax.

Value of loot in textiles alone amounts to "several hundred thousand dollars," the R.C.M.P. says.

No arrests have been made. The police said they have obtained evidence pointing to involvement of a considerable number of persons in the ring. A booty was obtained from ships landed in Halifax by business firms in Halifax and Montreal are among those named to be implicated but the identities of the firms involved being withheld for the time being.

Another resolution passed by the meeting supported the "Jobs for All" Association in its picketing of Canadian National offices in demand for continued activity at the local shipbuilding plant.

## SCORE PERISH IN BLAST IN NEW ORLEANS

Apartment Building Levelled By Blast in Residential Area of Southern City

NEW ORLEANS — A terrific explosion followed by fire levelled a three-storey apartment building in a downtown residential area here today, killing an undetermined number of persons and injuring a score of others.

It was estimated that 20 or more of the persons, all Negroes, lost their lives in the blast or fire while a score of others were injured.

Cause of the explosion is not determined.

## STEEL MILLS ARE REOPENING

NEW YORK — The steel strike officially ended for more than 380,000 C.I.O. steel workers Monday but only a handful were back in the mills, beginning a slow process of re-reading the furnaces for full-scale production. Meanwhile, negotiators, trying to find common ground between General Motors and the C.I.O. United Auto Workers, were balking during the weekend by the union security issue.

A United States Steel Corporation spokesman said it will take three or four weeks to attain full production after a four-week stoppage by 750,000 steel workers.

The firms, which settled with the union on a basis of an 18 1/2% hourly wage increase, are compensated by a \$5 a ton boost in the selling price of steel.

## NEW YORK PAPER WANTS TO KNOW

NEW YORK — The New York Times demanded to know Monday what the United States government was doing in regard to checking espionage activities in North America. It charged that American influence had been brought to bear on Prime Minister Mackenzie King of Canada to discourage him from taking action along these lines in Canada.

When the Grand Trunk, Canadian Northern, Grand Trunk Pacific and Intercolonial railways were brought together to form the Canadian National system it moved a number of what were main lines off the map.

## ARREST NUMBER STILL SECRET

Round-up of Conspirators With Russian Government Spreads to Various Cities

OTTAWA — The exact number of those being held in custody as a result of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police countrywide investigation into the espionage conspiracy of a foreign power corrupting Canadian officials still remains an official secret. The Associated Press says that one of those arrested is an official of rank close to that of deputy minister.

It is also reported that one of the suspects arrested in the R.C.M.P. roundup last Friday was a young woman on the staff of the cipher branch of the external affairs department. The report comes from an Ottawa newspaper, the Morning Journal. Police are said to have taken a large amount of papers from the woman's room, leaving behind a copy of Tolstoy's "War and Peace" and a Russian-English dictionary. Authorities at the R.C.M.P. barracks have refused to confirm or deny that a woman is among persons held for questioning.

At the same time, the Associated Press in an Ottawa dispatch declared that one of the men held in the probe is one of the highest top-ranking civil servants in the land.

Rumors are that the arrests have spread to various cities and Washington dispatches said that the capital was "intensely aroused" by the Ottawa exposure of leakage of secret information.

Both United States and British governments are still silent.

## JEW CRISIS IS FORESEEN

VIENNA — A United States member of the Anglo-American Palestine Inquiry, Bartley Crum, is predicting a wave of suicides if European Jews are not permitted to leave refugee camps and settle and rehabilitate themselves. Crum declares that a grave emergency exists and tension is so high that the Jews may even try to fight their way into Palestine.

## BIG INCREASE POLICE BUDGET

Vancouver Commission Is Asking for Almost a Half Million Dollars More

VANCOUVER — The Vancouver police commission yesterday called for an increase of police estimates for the year of \$467,000 over last year, a total of \$1,600,000 being budgeted. The commission calls for 166 additional members on the police force, a special policemen's division, new cars and motorcycles and a new police boat. The police commission receives its appropriation from the city council in its estimates for the year.

**STORM IN VIENNA**  
VIENNA—Four persons were killed and 200 were injured as a 90-mile gale swept Vienna. Buildings were blown down and many persons were rendered homeless.

**MISSING FROM BOAT**  
VICTORIA—Roy Davies of Ganges in the Gulf Islands has been missing since he disappeared on Sunday from his 38-foot cruiser from which he was fishing.

**U. B. C. PLEBISCITE**  
VANCOUVER—A plebiscite is being held among students of the University of B. C. as to whether political parties should be allowed to organize as clubs on the campus. The Labor-Progressives had sought to organize.

**LONG JAP JOB**  
TOKYO—Premier Shidehara said today it would be 1966 before Japan could be rebuilt. Foreign trade restoration was essential, he declared.

**STORMY CAMPAIGN**  
BUENOS AIRES — Shots rang out and rotten eggs were hurled at a boisterous campaign meeting here last night.

**FELL FROM FERRY**  
VANCOUVER—A Chinaman fell overboard from the West Vancouver ferry at 10:30 this morning and was fished out unconscious after having gone under twice. He was taken to hospital where he was later reported to be doing well.

**OLD GLORY TORN DOWN**  
BOMBAY—A mob of Indians Monday night tore down an American flag from the United States information service in Bombay and burned it in the street. The official in charge of the office says he is awaiting instructions concerning filing of a protest to the Indian and British governments.

**MADE CHURCH PRINCES**  
VATICAN CITY—The Roman Catholic Church yesterday created 32 new cardinals—the largest and most cosmopolitan group ever raised to the purple in 1900 years of church history. Among the new princes of the church is James Cardinal McGuigan, archbishop of Toronto and first English-speaking church dignitary to represent Canada in the College of the Cardinals.

**CIVIL SERVICE SALARIES**  
OTTAWA—A royal commission is being appointed to study salaries in the federal civil service. It has been said that a range of \$5000 to \$10,000 is not high enough for top-ranking civil servants.

## IRAN TURNS TO RUSSIA

Cabinet Minister Resigns And Pro-British Chief of Staff Dismissed

TEHRAN—One of the Iranian delegates to the Moscow conference between Iran and Soviet Russia has resigned from his post as a cabinet minister. Meantime, the chief of staff of the Iranian army, General Arfa, has been dismissed. Arfa is described by left-wing publications as being pro-British and is accused to reactionary tendencies.

## SPY RING ROUND-UP

No members of the Department of External Affairs, past or present, are involved in the spy ring, it was stated authoritatively in Ottawa today.

Prime Minister Mackenzie King is informing Progressive Conservative Leader John Bracken of particulars of the investigation.

Minister of Justice St. Laurent said today that a public statement on the progress of the investigation would be issued as soon as it was possible to do so.

The Royal Canadian Mounted Police throughout Canada are checking up particularly on quarters sympathetic to the Communist party.

An official at Ottawa said that there had been contact from Canada with a French Communist organization which had planned the establishment of a base on the east coast.

Plans, having to do with plans for the establishment of an atomic research plant in Britain have been removed from Montreal.

## RUSSIA QUITE NON-COMMITTAL

MOSCOW — The Moscow radio has broadcast the statement made last Friday by Prime Minister Mackenzie King telling of a leakage of information in Ottawa. No comment was made. Ottawa observers declare the Moscow radio likely to be off-broadcasting the statement until it was definite that Russia would be named as the power involved.

## COUNTER CHARGE IN HOTEL CASE

Former Accountant Says He Was Ordered By Proprietor To Falsify Books

VANCOUVER — Frederick Whyte, former book-keeper of the Grosvenor Hotel here, testified under protection of the Canada Evidence Act at his own trial yesterday that he had been ordered by the owner of the hotel to falsify the books of the hotel. He told an Assize court jury that he had been instructed by E. G. Baynes, under an implied threat of losing his job, to alter the books so that Baynes would not have to pay such a high income tax.

Whyte is accused of stealing \$28,000 from the hotel company between January 1944 and December of last year. The money was allegedly taken in the way of shortages on daily cash returns.

## UNITED NATIONS APPOINTMENTS

Important Posts Are Filled—Announcement by Secretary General

LONDON — Secretary General Trygve Lie announces four appointments to the United Nations secretariat as final items of business disposed of following adjournment of the security council.

The new appointees are Abraham H. Feller of New York who will be general counsel for the secretary general with the rank of director; Arkady A. Sobolev of Soviet Russia, assistant secretary general in charge of the department of security council affairs; Adrian Pelt of the Netherlands, assistant secretary general in charge of the conference and general services; and A. D. K. Owen of Britain, executive assistant in the office of the secretary general with the rank of director.

## INFORMATION LEAKAGE CORRESPONDENCE SUBJECT

LONDON (CP)—Prime Minister Mackenzie King has been in communication with Prime Minister Clement Attlee of Britain regarding leakage of secret information in Ottawa but the British government leader does not intend to make a statement on the matter he told the House of Commons today.

## LEAKS ALARM UNITED STATES

WASHINGTON, D. C.—United States Army sources expressed alarm Monday at the manner in which secret information in regard to atomic energy was leaking out. The leakage, becoming most widespread during the past four weeks, might endanger this country's economic leadership.

## NEW GOV'T IN BELGIUM

Head of Catholic Party Takes Over Reins After Election

BRUSSELS — The Socialist premier—Achille Van Acker—has resigned to make way for the formation of a new government by the Right Wing Catholics—who are pledged to return King Leopold to the throne—won the largest number of seats in Sunday's election.

## PUBLIC ASKED TO SUBMIT IDEAS ON INDUSTRIAL DEVELOPMENT HERE

Strong Delegation to Be Sent to Victoria to Press For Attention—On Various Important Matters

All people in Prince Rupert who are interested in the industrial development of the port and district and who have any constructive ideas to offer as to how that development may be more efficaciously brought about are being invited to present their suggestions in writing to the Prince Rupert Industrial Committee. These representations are to be in the hands of the mayor by February 28 in preparation for a general meeting to be held March 5 by which time they will have been consolidated for consideration by the gathering. Following the general meeting it is planned to send a delegation to Victoria before the opening of the next session of the Legislature to present the strongest possible case for the implementation of recommendations having in view the postwar industrial development of this area.

Among the matters upon which it is suggested representations from the public at large might deal are shipping subsidies, aids to navigation, removal of Ripple Rock, export of grain, coal export facilities, utilization of warehouse storage space, dockage, dry dock contracts, highway development, survey of Groundhog coal fields.

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### Indians and Liquor

If general talk around the city is to be credited, and some rather serious incidents attributable to liquor getting among the natives have occurred to bear the talk out, it is time something was done about tightening up on the situation as regards the supplying of liquor to Indians. We know that it is difficult for the police to obtain convictions in these kind of cases which depend to large extent for evidence upon native informants themselves, who are often unwilling. It is nevertheless serious that there should even be deaths, the underlying cause of which might have been malnutrition in spirits by the poor victims themselves. Certainly, if anything can be done to stop a situation in this regard which is generally said to be deteriorating it should be done.

One thing that might be done would be the restoration of a Dominion police officer attached to the Indian Department such as we formerly had for many years. Sometimes the Indians themselves claimed undue prosecution under such a set-up but, be that as it may, conditions were probably better in those days than they are now.

### Emergency in Alaska

Alaska is, apparently, as badly if not worse off than the British Columbia coast in shortage of shipping tonnage. The loss of the steamer Yukon makes the situation even the more serious. Added to that the big liners Aleutian and Columbia, formerly operating to Alaska, are on the Hawaiian run.

The outlook for pleasure travel, or even for business travel, to Alaska, during the coming summer and fall, is far from bright.

To relieve the situation and to obviate a raising of tariffs, Alaskans are urging the government to build new ships and turn them over at half price or thereabouts as Alaska carriers.

Meantime, another means of meeting the situation, temporarily at least, is receiving a large measure of support particularly in southeastern Alaska, namely the further suspension of the Jones Act which would enable Canadian vessels to help Alaska in its current shipping emergency.

### Wrong Symbol Is Best

Now someone discovers that there is no such thing as the United Nations Organization. The San Francisco Charter says just "United Nations." No one seems to know who tacked on the generally accepted organization. But there is a slight effort afoot to change the designation from U.N.O. to U.N.

We confess an allergy to the current and inevitable alphabetical designation of practically everything. But, if we must choose, we will take U.N.O. in preference to U.N. Certainly the Spanish word for one is a more appropriate symbol for the United Nations' goal than the Anglo-Saxon prefix of negation.

### TRYING TO OPEN ROAD

Clearing Snow From Western Part of Prince Rupert Highway

A Public Works Department bulldozer, clearing snow from the Prince Rupert Highway, is approaching the Rainbow Lake summit about 15 miles east of the city with the immediate objective of opening up the road as far as Tye and possibly Telegraph Point, District Engineer J. C. Brady said this morning.

Snow conditions on the highway east of Telegraph Point, particularly at Kwintus, where a 400-foot snowslide has covered the right-of-way, with the momentary possibility of more slides coming down the mountainside, make it doubtful if that part of the road will be cleared in the near future.

However, the department is making progress in clearing the western section, where snow depth ranges from a foot to three feet.

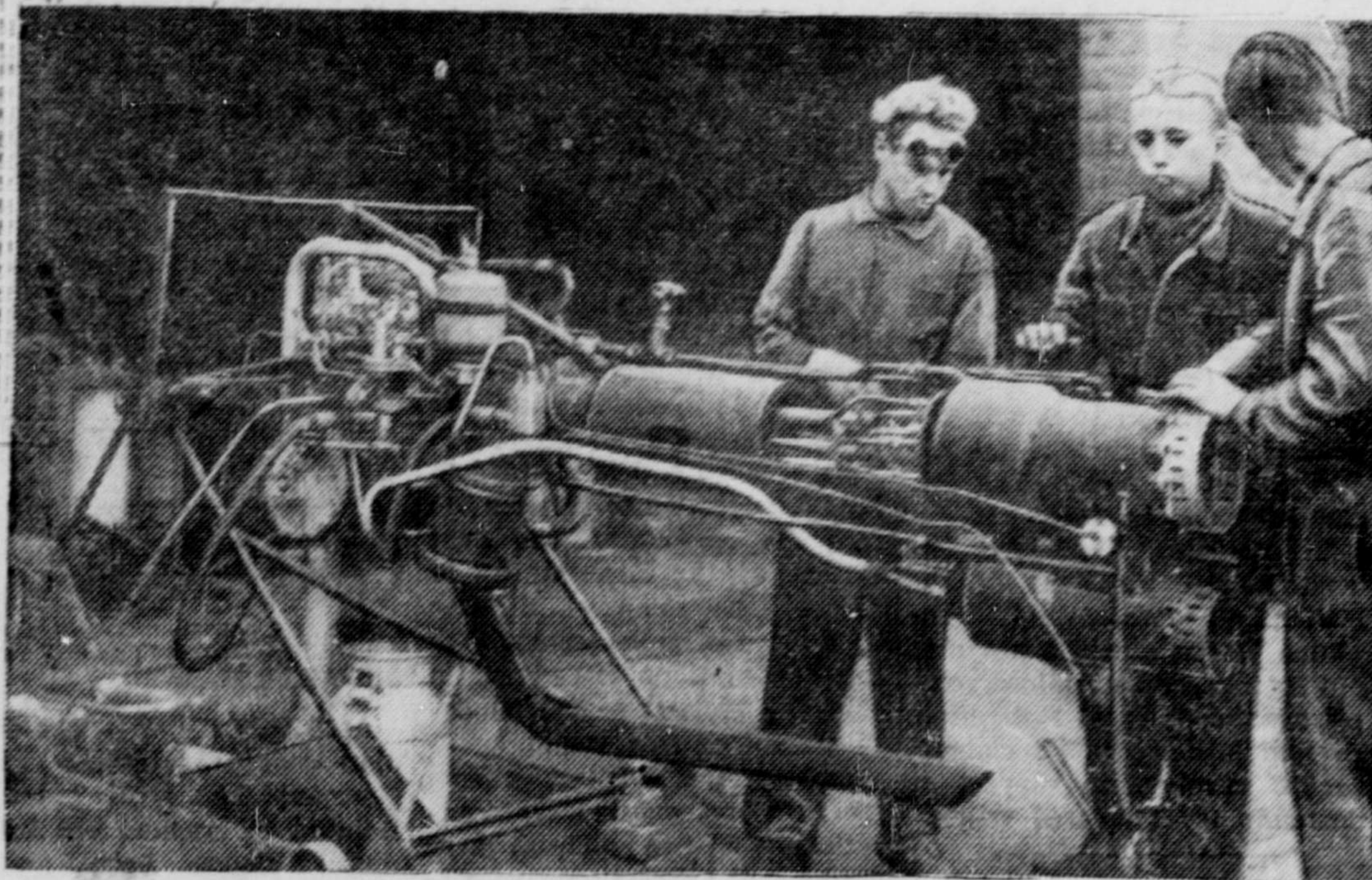
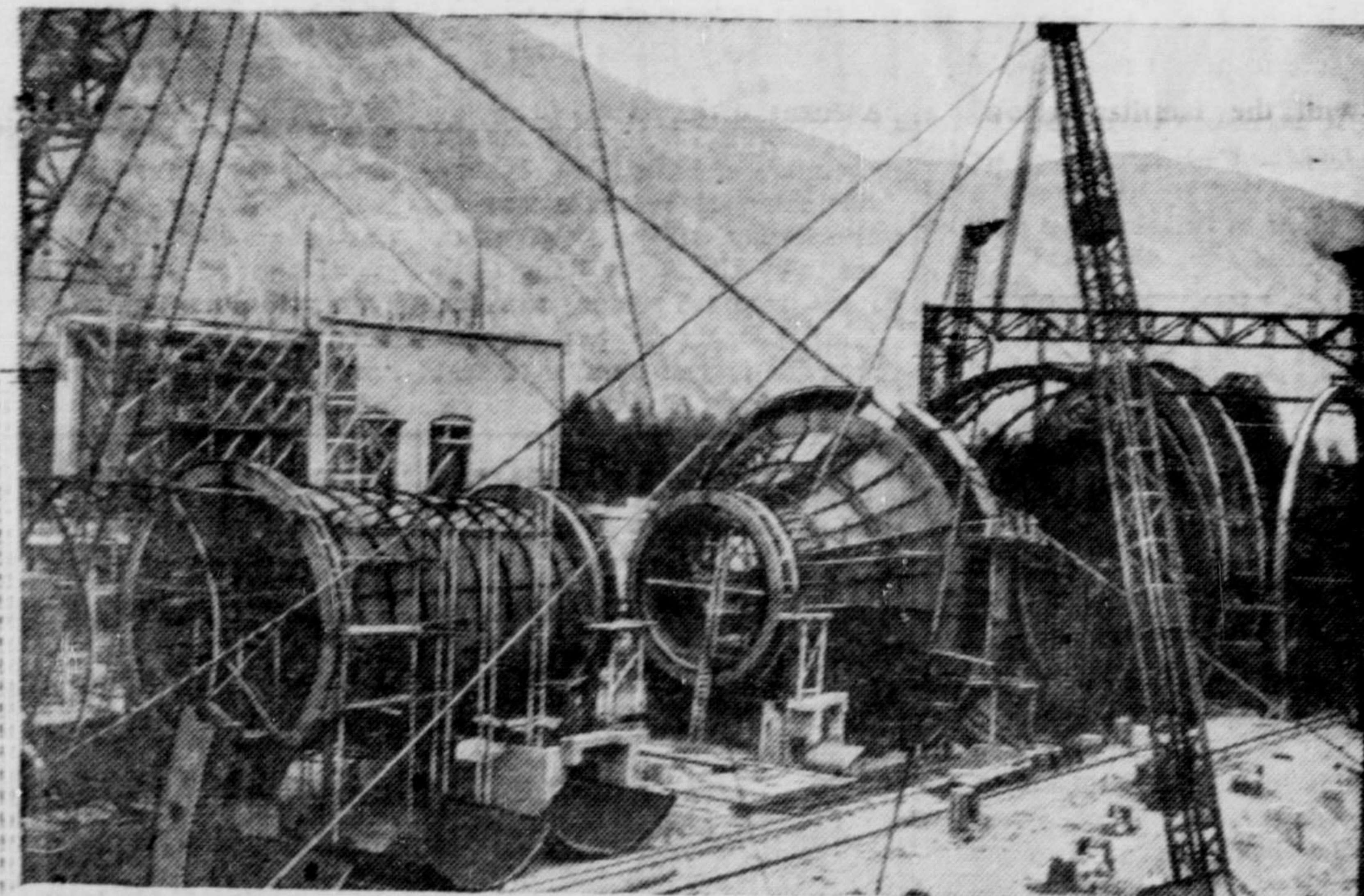

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## Goering's Aeronautical Research Plant Undetected by Allies Until End of War



Cleverly hidden from the Allies throughout the war, the Hermann Goering Aeronautical Research Plant was visited by four of the 40 Canadian scientists sent by the Department of Reconstruction to assess the advancement of Germany's scientific research. The four square miles of plant hidden in a forest was found intact by Dr. J. J. Green, Chief Aeronautical Research Engineer of the Air Transport Board. Greatest advances were made by the Germans in V-bombs, high-speed aircraft, rocket power and wind tunnels for testing new designs. When Germany surrendered the above wind tunnel was being constructed by the Nazis in the Otztal Alps. The working section is 26 feet in diameter, corner sections, 74 feet. This 100,000 h.p. tunnel was to be driven by direct water power and speeds equal to that of sound would be possible. Below is the Walther bi-fuel (liquid) rocket unit as used to power the Messerschmitt 163 aircraft.

### HOME WAVES CAUSE HARM

### AMATEUR RADIO SYSTEM FORMED

Being Organized in Canada To Co-operate With Royal Canadian Air Force

OTTAWA — Air Minister Gibson has announced plans for the organization of an air force amateur radio system. The new system—to include so-called radio "hams"—will comprise a trans-Canada radio network.

The amateurs will use loaned equipment and be a practical radio auxiliary of the R.C.A.F. The organization will consist of groups of amateurs affiliated with R.C.A.F. auxiliary squadrons and in radio contact with squadron signals personnel.

Air Commodore A. H. Keith Russell of Toronto, formerly commanding officer at No. 4 Wireless School at Guelph, Ont., has undertaken organization of the system from the civilian end.

### ARE QUITTING WEST INDIES

Canadian Troops Being Withdrawn From That Area This Spring

OTTAWA — After a vital but colorless static defence role in the British West Indies, Canadian troops will be withdrawn from there this spring. Department of National Defence headquarters announced today.

Last Canadian troops in the West Indies are the First Battalion, Brockville Rangers, and two special infantry companies of Pictou Highlanders. The Winnipeg Grenadiers and the First Battalion, Irish Fusiliers, Vancouver, also served there.

The presence of Canadian troops kept at strength of about 1200 ensured against the use of the area for U-boat and spy bases. It also served as a sort of advanced training base for Canadian troops who eventually saw action in Europe.

### GRIM TALE OF TERROR

Sole Survivor of Small Nova Scotia Freighter Tells of Harrowing Experiences

DIGBY, Nova Scotia — Capt. Arthur Ellis of Port Granville, Nova Scotia, the sole survivor, told a grim tale of how 12 persons lost their lives from exposure to frigid weather conditions as they huddled in an open lifeboat in the Bay of Fundy after their ship—the 265-ton coastal steamer Robert G. Cann—foundered on Saturday eight miles off Swallowtail Light, Grand Manan Island, New Brunswick.

Mountainous seas and a raging gale drove the open boat into the sea and it was 19 hours after the order to abandon ship before the 17-foot craft grounded at isolated Riley's Cove.

### LITTLE EXCITEMENT OVER NYLONS

Prince Rupert Women Taking It Easy In Hosiery Buying

There was little excitement on the "nylon front" in Prince Rupert today. Women of this city were nonchalant as the new type of hosiery, so greatly coveted in many places, went on sale for the first time. Since stocks were scarce at this time, the most of the local women, apparently, decided to bide their time until it is easier to shop.

At that, there was a line-up at one store where cards were being issued for future delivery with only a limited number on actual spot sale. For a short time after opening the doors were closed at periods as the store became too full.

Vancouver reports there was a rush of buying today and some of the stores were hard-pressed to cope with crowds.

### FIRST LIME FOR FARMERS

Home Needs Will Be Taken Care of Before Export

VICTORIA — The Pacific Lime Co. of Texada Island has undertaken to supply three thousand tons of dehydrated lime to Fraser Valley farmers by March 15. Hon. Frank Putnam, minister of agriculture has been notified by the Prices Board. He said Monday that the company will supply seven thousand tons of crushed lime rock.

Last Friday Mr. Putnam had asked the Board to cancel the company's export permits to assure that the lime be delivered to Valley farmers first.

### LEGISLATURE MEMBER DIES

James Paton of Vancouver-Point Grey Passes Away Suddenly

VANCOUVER — James Alexander Paton, member of the Legislative Assembly for Vancouver-Point Grey, died suddenly today. He was 60 years of age and had been a member of the legislature since 1937, being first elected then and re-elected in 1941 and 1945. He was a former member of the Kerrisdale municipal council and a former alderman. He was a member of the Perry committee on post-war rehabilitation council.

Born in Ontario 60 years ago, Mr. Paton came to Vancouver in 1905. His mother died only two days ago.

### LOAN TALKS PROGRESSING

British and Canadian Representatives Getting Down to Brass Tacks at Ottawa

OTTAWA — Loan discussions between Great Britain and Canada have passed the stage of formal meetings and now have reached the point where some details are being worked out, it was learned today.

It is understood that talks have not reached the stage where a definite amount can be set. Before then it was learned that representatives of the two governments will have to calculate how much Britain owes Canada as a result of the termination of mutual aid last September. The amount Canada owes Britain for services and supplies to Canadian troops overseas also will have to be determined.

British food contracts with Canada are also said to enter the picture.

It was indicated that Britain will keep her food imports from Canada on a practically wartime level if a satisfactory loan from the Dominion can be concluded and satisfactory prices for foods maintained.

### SLAUGHTER WAS HASTY

Russian Prosecutor Tells of Frenzied Killing of Civilians

NUERNBERG — The Russian prosecutor described to the international military tribunal today the frantic haste with which retreating Nazis are charged with having slaughtered thousands of Russian civilians and prisoners of war in 1943.

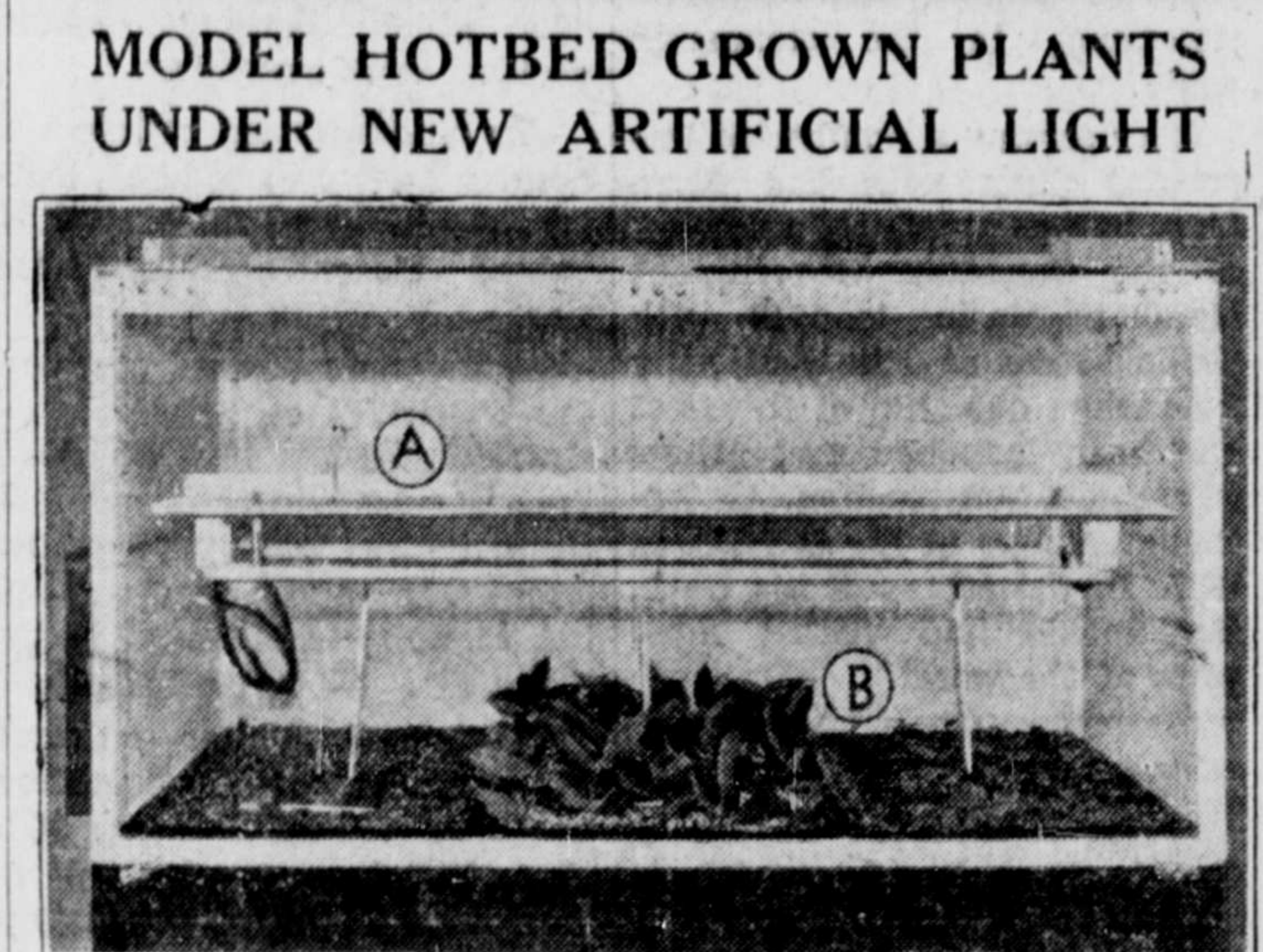

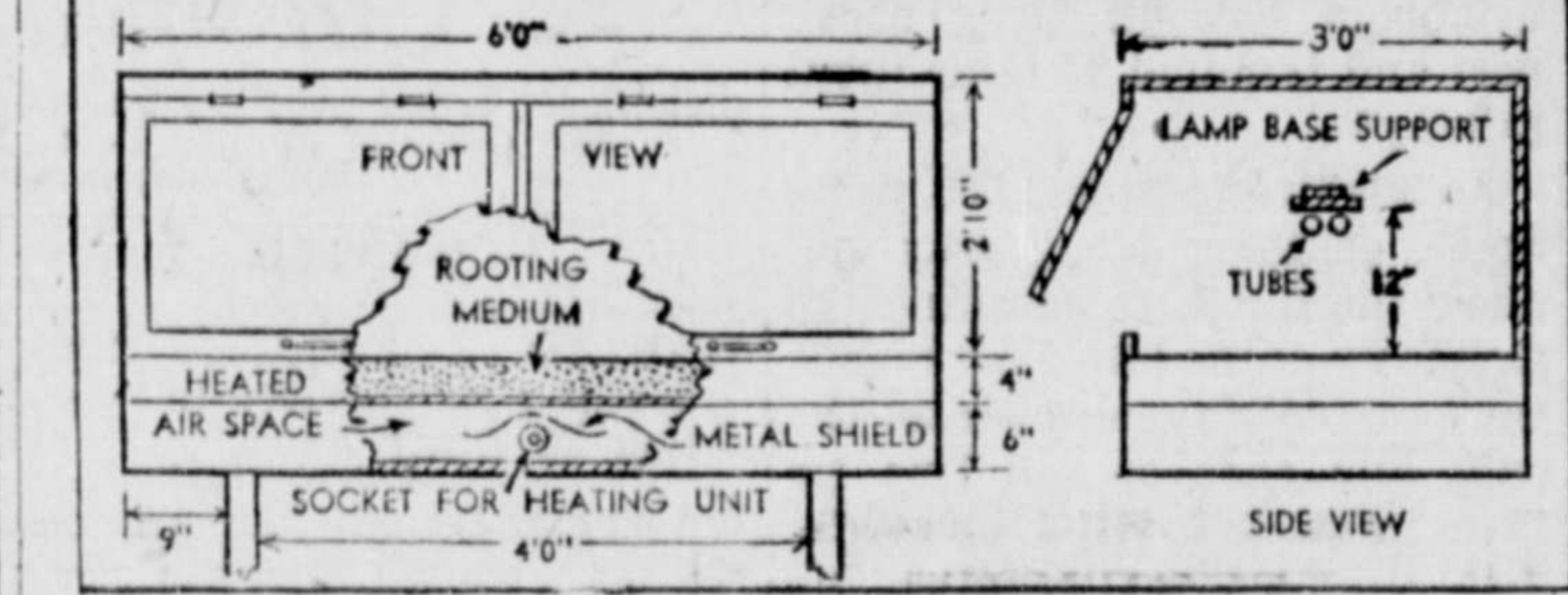

A hot-bed in which plants for next spring's garden can be started this winter in the basement or any room of the house, and grown to transplanting size under artificial light, is illustrated.

Model shown uses fluorescent lamps to supply light. Until now it has been impractical to supply sufficient light artificially without also developing too much heat.

The fluorescent lamp makes it possible to provide, without too much heat, sufficient light to germinate seed and develop plants to the proper size for moving to the outdoor garden.

As shown, the hot-bed consists of a box, resting on a table or on legs, in which trays or flats filled with sphagnum moss or vermiculite are placed, with an air space containing a heating unit beneath them, and fluorescent lamps above. Two 40-watt fluorescent tubes—either blue tubes or daylight type—with reflectors are suspended a foot above the flats. They are kept burning continuously. An air space above them prevents excessive heating.

Below the flats is a space which is heated by a sealed heating unit which fits into an ordinary lighting outlet, or by

Winnipeg and what should be our port on the Northern Pacific. But, while we are lost in wonderland trying to find just why we are balled up as we are, we would do well to turn our attention to other sections of Canada and observe how they have fared since completing the amalgamation which created the railway position we are now in.

We have just heard of the reduced train service now on the six divisions between Jasper and Prince Rupert. We also know that the former Canadian Northern main line between Winnipeg and Port Arthur, that was once travelled by the crack trains—the "Superior Express," is now served by a tri-weekly schedule.

May I suggest to our western M.P.'s on their next trip to our capital they might go by what was to be the despatch route between Winnipeg and Quebec City, and check up the class of train they would be on, and they might write and tell us as to the hotel accommodation at such points as Nakina, Hearst and Cochrane where they are obliged to stop over night in transit.

May I say I am citing these facts to demonstrate the overshadowing interest of both our railway systems in Montreal and Vancouver, and the main lines between. We are only continuing to waste valuable time expecting either of our railway systems to build our Pacific railway and establish our port on the Northern Pacific for they just will not do it.

When the G.T.P. was in the making some 40 years ago, the Trans-Siberian railway was the talk of Europe and Asia. That railway established its port at Vladivostok on the Japanese Sea where the Japanese current came from. The late Charles Melville Hays was the driving force in the G.T.P. project. Mr. Hays' great ambition was the establishing of a line of fast boats between Prince Rupert and Vladivostok — thus the \$3,000,000 shipbuilding plant and floating dry dock at Prince Rupert, now idle, or nearly so.

Here it might be well to remember Russia is no more the land of the Czars. The Russia of today is a new-born nation and she has received a wonderful baptism in European and American ways of commerce. When Russia was wrapped in a life and death struggle with the foe of the world she knocked on our door and our door was opened. When she asked for bread, we did not hand her a stone. When she asked for planes, the planes winged away. When she asked for tanks, the tanks went rolling on. When she asked for guns they were soon belching destruction on the enemies of the world—nor did we tarry to discuss the odds. Having established that mound

Career of New Manager of Canadian National Steamships

Captain R. A. Clarke, new general manager of Canadian National Steamships, was born at Brigus, Newfoundland, in 1893. As a youth he spent his summer vacations at sea with his father who was both shipbuilder and ship's captain. Shortly after the outbreak of the First World War, he joined the Royal Naval Reserve, serving in the Atlantic.

Coming to Canada in 1920, Captain Clarke joined the C.G. M.M. He served as master on a number of the Canadian government merchant vessels and in 1930, was appointed assistant marine superintendent at Kingston, Jamaica. Returning to Canada in 1933, he served successively as captain of the Lady Hawkins, the Prince David, the Lady Drake and the Prince Henry. He was appointed assistant general manager of the line in August 1940.

R. B. Teakle, retiring general manager, a native of Quebec City, has had more than fifty years of general and executive experience in the steamship world. After serving a number of important posts with the Allan Line, he was appointed manager of the Canadian Government Merchant Marine in 1919, with headquarters at Montreal at a time when one ship of the fleet had been launched and others were under construction. He became manager of the C.N.S.S. in 1937. In the course of his work, Mr. Teakle had visited most parts of the world.

of friendship with our neighbor beyond the waters of the Northern Pacific, which is a strong nation today and will be mighty power of commerce tomorrow, does it not behoove us to cultivate that friendship by extending our trade with our neighbors through their ocean port and terminal of their great railway?

As Vladivostok is 1,000 miles north of Hong Kong why not allow the C.P.R. to continue the monopoly of the latter port while we proceed to consolidate the odds and ends of rail line we have referred to into thoroughfare through our country including the south terminal of the Hudson's Bay railway and procure a few of the government's surplus ships and establish a complete and independent transportation organization between and including Vladivostok, Prince Rupert, our Peace River country, Prince Albert and Winnipeg, and thus boost all our country out of the "back-concession" stage and place us on a par with other parts of this North American continent.

### SUBWAY HIDES ART TREASURES

Shirt Worn by Charles I Part of Cache Stored During War

LONDON — Buried under London in an underground railway tunnel is a treasure hoard over which thousands, unsuspecting, walk every day.

The underground railways of London have provided safe hideouts for many of Britain's most valued treasures during the war.

Scattered in disused corridors are a variety of treasures, including the shirt that Charles I wore at the Whitehall scaffold, stained glass windows from St. Margaret's and priceless antique jewelry which survived the Great Fire of London in 1666.

Not one item has suffered damage. Many are back on show in the museums but War Office officials state it will be some time before the treasures from the British Museum can be restored.

### INTERIOR WAGE NEGOTIATIONS ARE TERMINATED

PRINCE GEORGE — There was abrupt termination of negotiations between Local 1-424, International Woodworkers of America, and the Northern Interior Lumbermen's Association when union representatives insisted on changing from a year-to-year wage scales to one allowing only 30 days' notice by either party.

The operators contend that it would be no agreement at all and that the 30-day provision would constitute a constant unknown factor in predicting costs and would prevent them from determining in advance programs in the woods and milling operations.

Union Representative Ernie Dalskog pointed out that since negotiations got under way, federal controls have been lifted on 300 items of consumer goods and that it would be unfair to tie some 900 unionists to a year's agreement with the fear of inflation to be recognized.
