

Canada's Economic Picture . .

THE CLOSING YEAR 1946 brought on Canada's reconversion worries in a rush. At the year end conditions are taking a more definite peacetime form, but war's hangover still leaves its imprint on the lives of Canadians.

There are still shortages necessitating continued rationing of some foods—sugar, meat, butter; many other goods are in short supply; but employment and income are at a high level and, on a domestic plane at least, Canada's outlook for 1947 is bright.

Inflation remains a major government worry and is slowing down the gradual decontrol policy adopted immediately after the war. Expectations are that as production can be accelerated with the possibility that few, if any, will remain at the end of the year.

Housing difficulties, present throughout the war, reached new heights as veterans returned and sought homes. Particularly in larger centres the problem is acute.

Construction of new homes is hampered by shortages of skilled workers and materials, with strikes contributing to the material shortages. Nails have become as precious as though they were made of valuable metal. The 1946 target of 60,000 new homes fell short by between 5,000 and 10,000 but Reconstruction Minister Howe predicts 1947 will bring the greatest building activity the country has ever seen.

The high level of income that was maintained in 1946—more than double that of 1939—adds to the inflationary threat with a shortage of goods to soak up the available spending power. High production holds promise of the best protection.

Price control has been eased during the year, particularly on goods regarded as non-essential. and living costs have risen noticeably but there is no evidence of an immediate abandonment of price control. Wage control, on the other hand, is on the way out.

Winding up tag ends of war business was a major government activity of the year. War contracts were reviewed to determine whether profits had been xecessive and re-negotiation of contracts returned \$400,000,000 to the Dominion treasury.

Sale of surplus war materials will have passed its peak by the end of the year but is continuing at the rate of \$20,000,000 a month, with total sales in excess of \$300,000,000. Thus, with the year of reconversion ended, the way seemed paved for concentration in 1947 on shaping Canada's war-found strength for its first real test in a competitive world field.

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
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Gyros In Business Luncheon With Two Visiting Leaders

The Workmen's Compensation Act NOTICE TO EMPLOYERS

Effective January 1st, 1947, any employer engaged in the HOTEL BEER PARLOUR or CATERING BUSINESS and having any employee or employees (other than members the family of the employer) employed at such work i deemed to be engaged in an industry under the Workmen's Compensation Act provided that:

(a) The employer in the hotel business operates a hotel, lodging house, club or other place where lodging is turnished and having in any case ten or more bed rooms, or

(b) The employer has a licence to operate a beer

(c) The employer in the catering industry operates a restaurant, cafe, eating house, dance hall, cabaret, banquet hall, cafeteria, tea-room, lunch room, lunch counter, dining-room or kitchen in connection with an industrial or commercial establishment, or office building or school or any other place where food is cooked, prepared and served and for which a charge is made.
