IMPORTANT MISSION

T IS UNFORTUNATE the Minister of Trade and Industry, Hon. Leslie H. Eyres is unable to accompany the officials of the Post-war Bureau of Reconstruction and Rehabilitation and Canadian National Railways who are to visit this city among others in central British Columbia for the purpose of learning facts about industrial opportunities in each place or area. Mr. Eyres is an energetic minister and his appearance would have added to his information and knowledge of what this part of the province has to offer in opportunities for legitimate investment and skills. In any case, we are glad that the minister has not permitted the ideas and plans of those who initiated the Post-war Bureau to fade entirely away. Those plans envisaged not only the regional planning which got well under way but regional development. Committees of provincial officials were formed in each region to gather such information as was required. The first task was to find occupational opportunities in each place in each region. This compilation proved extremely valuable to the Dominion representatives dealing with re-establishment of veterans and enabled hundreds of veterans to establish themselves.

come here) and the large crane left here by the Americans which one would expect the Dominion government or the C.N.R. to hold on to for future use at this port. Pulp, paper, lumber, mines, land and fisheries are of course our obvious natural resources.

But there are openings it would seem for several small manufacturing lines not entirely connected with our basic resources. Furniture factories should prosper here as should plywood plants for these would be close to the source of their raw material of which there is at present an abundance.

Brickmaking and brickyards are badly needed and ample clay is available.

If the C.N.R. will not put in coal bunkers to enable coal to be shipped in thousands of tons on boats and barges from this port, perhaps some investor might put them in and fix such charges as will give a satisfactory return and so render a splendid community service.

Freeing Graduates For More Specialized Work

By KAY REX Canadian Press Staff Writer TORONTO (P) - That word 'career" spells practical nursing to many a Canadian girl just out of the Army, Navy, or Air Force and in search of a job.

Not only novices but women veterans with years of experience are taking the nine-month Practical Nurses' Course offered by the Ontario Training and Reestablishment Institute. Approved by the Ontario Registered Nurses Association the classes are conducted by Jessie Young, Acton, Ont., and Jean Bates, Shelbourne, Ont., both graduate nurses and former members of the R.C.A.F. (W.D.).,

"Throughout Canada the shortage of nurses has created a serious need for such assistance as the practical nurse can give," said Miss Young. "She is being trained to supplement rather than replace the registered nurse in caring for certain types of patients . . . her duty will be to take over the minor jobs thus freeing the graduate for more serious work." Fort William Sanitorium will be the spot for Marie Furyk, Port Arthur, just as soon as she has finished her course. "I worked there as a ward aid before I joined the Navy," said Miss Furyk. "This course is giving me the experience and training need to do more important work.' Dorothy Jones, Windthorst, Sask., had three years in the Air Force as a hospital assistant, and plans on returning to a hospital just as soon as she finished.
