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DAY AND NIGHT SERVICE
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Hopes Raised For Missing Plane

Signal Fire is Believed Lighted on Mount Rainier

SEATTLE—Hopes have been suddenly raised there may be survivors from the United States line Corps transport plane which has been missing in the vicinity of Mount Rainier since last Tuesday. A signal fire has been sighted in that area. It is thought that it may be being fed by gasoline. Search, which had been abandoned, is being resumed. There were thirty-two men aboard the missing plane.

NO SNOWFALL BUT BLIZZARD

Big Wind Blew Drifts Around In Southeastern Saskatchewan

REGINA—Southeastern Saskatchewan last night experienced what was described as the worst blizzard in 30 years but little snow actually fell. Instead, wind, which reached 50 miles an hour velocity, picked up snow lying in three- to six-foot drifts and cut visibility down to 200 yards, blocking roads at the same time.

OTTAWA—Reports reaching here from New York indicate that External Affairs Minister Louis St. Laurent may be president of the next General Assembly of United Nations.

EPIDEMIC AMONG BABIES
LONDON—Fear that widespread extension of a mysterious epidemic which has already taken the lives of 23 newborn babies and has affected five hospitals in England has resulted in the closing of three maternity wards for disinfection purposes. The mysterious epidemic, which attacked 48 other persons, followed prevalence of gastroenteritis in maternity wards.

JEWIS THREATEN CANE STROKES FOR OFFICERS
This Punishment May be Inflicted on British Army Officers, Palestine Underground Says

JERUSALEM—British Army officers in Palestine were threatened last night with "punishment in strokes of the cane" by the secret transmitter of Irgun Zvai Leumi, illegal Jewish underground organization.

Workers at the Prince Rupert Fishermen's Co-operative plant at Fairview Bay were taken to the job this morning on fish packers from the Cow Bay floats, because of the impossibility of traversing the Cemetery Road. Water transport was the Co-op's only transportation link with the city up to noon.

AT GERMANS—Frau Brigitte Frank, widow of Hans Frank, former Nazi governor of Poland who was hanged as a war criminal at Nuremberg, is shown with two of her five children, Brigitte, 11, and Norman, 17, in their Munich home. Since the execution of her husband Mrs. Frank has grown bitter, but not against the Allies who hanged him, but against the Germans who punished the children for the sins of their father. The children are ostracized by former comrades. Most recent blow to fall on the Frank family was when a gang of armed thugs broke into the home of Mrs. Frank's married daughter and cleaned it out of furs, jewels and clothing to the value of \$20,000.

Prince Rupert experienced close to a transportation tie-up this morning when an overnight thaw, accompanied by rain, softened the packed snow on city streets, converting them into a welter of treacherous slush which stopped much traffic and made walking a major athletic endeavour.

Not Breaking With Britain

But India Will Go Ahead Vigorously in Forming Independently Republic, Declares Nehru

BENARES, India—Pandit Jawaharlal Nehru, leader of the India Congress party and leading minister of the interim Indian government, said last night that there was no foundation for Bombay dispatches reporting him as having said at a reception in Benares Sunday night that "in two or three days' time India is to declare herself out of the British Empire."

Nehru said, however, that a resolution was to be considered for a "sovereign and independent" republic.

The future of India had been thrust forcefully on to the official scene in London yesterday by Bombay dispatches quoting Nehru as saying that his Congress party was taking matters into its own hands, following the deadlock with the Moslems over the formation of an autonomous government for India, to forge a new and independent nation.

The Times of India, published in Bombay, quoted Nehru as saying: "We are not going to submit our decisions to British Parliament. Congress has decided to go forward vigorously."

MR. HART SCORES

PRIME MINISTER JOHN HART, well known for his sagacity and persuasiveness, has done an excellent job of negotiating at Ottawa on behalf of the province of British Columbia, it appears evident.

The approval by the session of the Legislature next month of Mr. Hart's agreement is, of course, a foregone conclusion.

The agreement will make it possible for British Columbia to proceed with a number of undertakings and projects of major importance which have been hanging fire for some time.

It had been conceded that Mr. Hart would arrive at a satisfactory agreement with Ottawa. From all that can be gathered from the announcement which was made by the Premier yesterday, it has been an eminently satisfactory one.

Another Excuse

IT SEEMS to be a "doubtful" explanation which Hon. J. A. MacKinnon, the minister of trade and commerce, has offered for the recent sudden and entirely unexpected decision to call off grain shipments to the Prince Rupert elevator.

The minister gives as the reason the fact that the northern Alberta crop this year has been a wet one and that the local elevator has not sufficient drying facilities to justify the grain being handled here.

It might be well as the Prince

Rupert Chamber of Commerce will doubtless do, to advise the minister, although it seems incredible if he does not already know, about the drying facilities of the plant which has capabilities equal to that of any of the major terminal elevators in the country for the drying of wet grain.

Prince Rupert is getting fed up with the various excuses that are being so regularly offered for passing the place up. This of Mr. MacKinnon's about the calling off of grain shipments is one that we would like to have further explained.

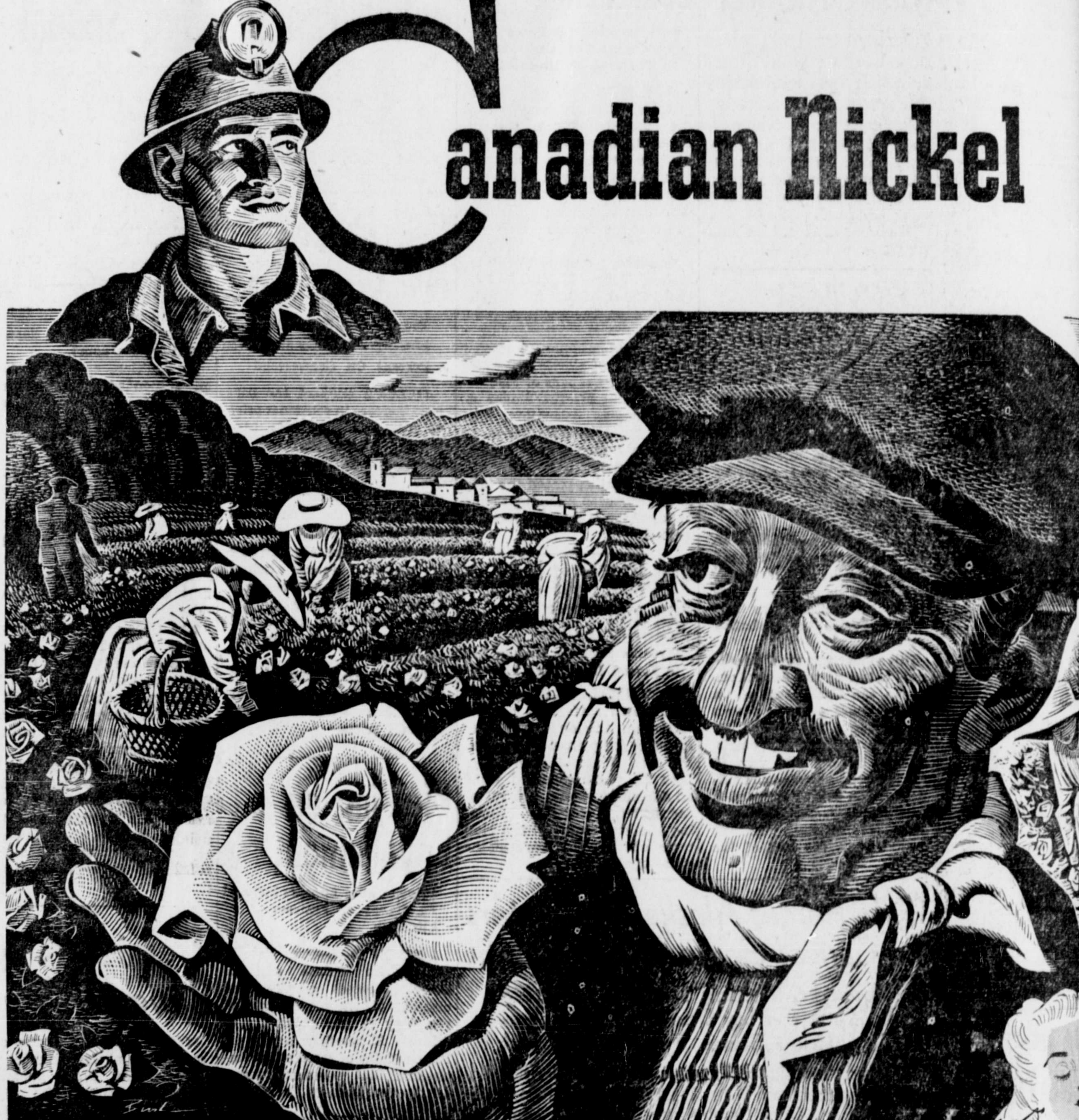
BURNS LAKE VOTING TIE

SECURITY, HUMOR FOR HAPPY HOME

Archbishop of Canterbury's Wife Says Children Must Have Security

LONDON (Reuters)—Security and a sense of humor are prescribed by Mrs. Geoffrey Fisher, wife of the Archbishop of Canterbury, as essential foundations of a happy home. Mother of six sons, Mrs. Fisher spoke in a radio broadcast.

"Home-making is not an easy job," she said. "Besides hard work and sacrifice, it needs self-control and patience, but perhaps a sense of humor is the most important quality needed for family life."

Children needed a feeling of absolute security, founded on trust in their parents.

"There is no more tragic figure than that of a child who has discovered for the first time that his father or mother has let him down. At first he will make all sorts of excuses for his parents, but if it continues he becomes callous and cynical.

"Many homes are breaking up because of a lack of truth, faithfulness and love in their family relationships. Children from these broken homes become problems because the security needed for their development was taken from them."

The family is the best training ground for life, Mrs. Fisher said, because it represents the community in miniature; and the intimate family circle is the best testing place of character.

Last night in the Conrad Street School training centre, Len kept two of the preliminary fighters busy as sparring partners, trading blows and strategy with Leo Adolph, who will meet Darrow Gomez in the semi-final, and with Guss Gustavson, a 159-pounder who will meet 163-pound Steve Bright of Port Edward in the preliminary card.

Len describes Gustavson as "good," which is what Gustavson will need to be if he is going to beat wily Steve Bright, whose talents have been recorded in local ring encounters in earlier years.

Cranberry Sauce
4 cups cranberries
1 cup sugar
2 cups water

Wash cranberries carefully and pick out any soft ones. Put sugar and water in saucepan and bring slowly to boiling point. Boil about 10 minutes or until a thin syrup is formed. Add cranberries, cover and simmer gently until clear and transparent but not broken. Chill well before serving. Makes about 4 cups fairly thin sauce.

Giblet Cube Stuffing
Giblets
1/4 cup mild-flavored fat
2 tablespoon chopped onion
1/4 cup chopped celery
4 cups lightly toasted 1/2-inch bread cubes (about 5 half-inch slices of bread)
1 teaspoon chopped parsley
1 1/2 teaspoons salt
1/4 teaspoon pepper
1/4 teaspoon poultry seasoning
1/2 cup giblet broth (about)

Simmer giblets in salted water for 30 minutes, then chop finely. Save 1/4 cup of the broth for dressing, use the rest in gravy. Cook onion and celery in fat until clear. Mix with bread cubes, parsley and seasonings, giblets and enough hot water to moisten cubes slightly. Sufficient to stuff a 5-pound chicken.

Holiday Snow
1/4 cup cornstarch
1/2 cup sugar
1/2 teaspoon salt
2 cups boiling water
1 lemon
2 egg whites

Mix cornstarch, sugar and salt thoroughly together. Gradually add boiling water, stirring con-

2 1/2 cups pastry flour
3/4 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon mace
1/2 teaspoon nutmeg
1 teaspoon cinnamon
1 teaspoon allspice
1/4 teaspoon cloves
1/4 teaspoon baking powder
1/4 teaspoon baking soda
1/4 cup molasses
1/4 cup grape juice

Cream fat, add sugar and almond extract and cream well together. Add eggs, one at a time, beating well after each addition. Dredge fruit with part of the flour. Mix and sift remaining flour, salt, spices, baking powder and soda, and add alternately with molasses and grape juice to creamed mixture. Add flour and mix well. Line the bottom and sides of a deep pan, 7" by 7" with heavy greased brown paper and fill two-thirds full with batter. Bake in a slow oven, 300 degrees F., for about 2 3/4 hours. Makes 2 3/4 pounds.

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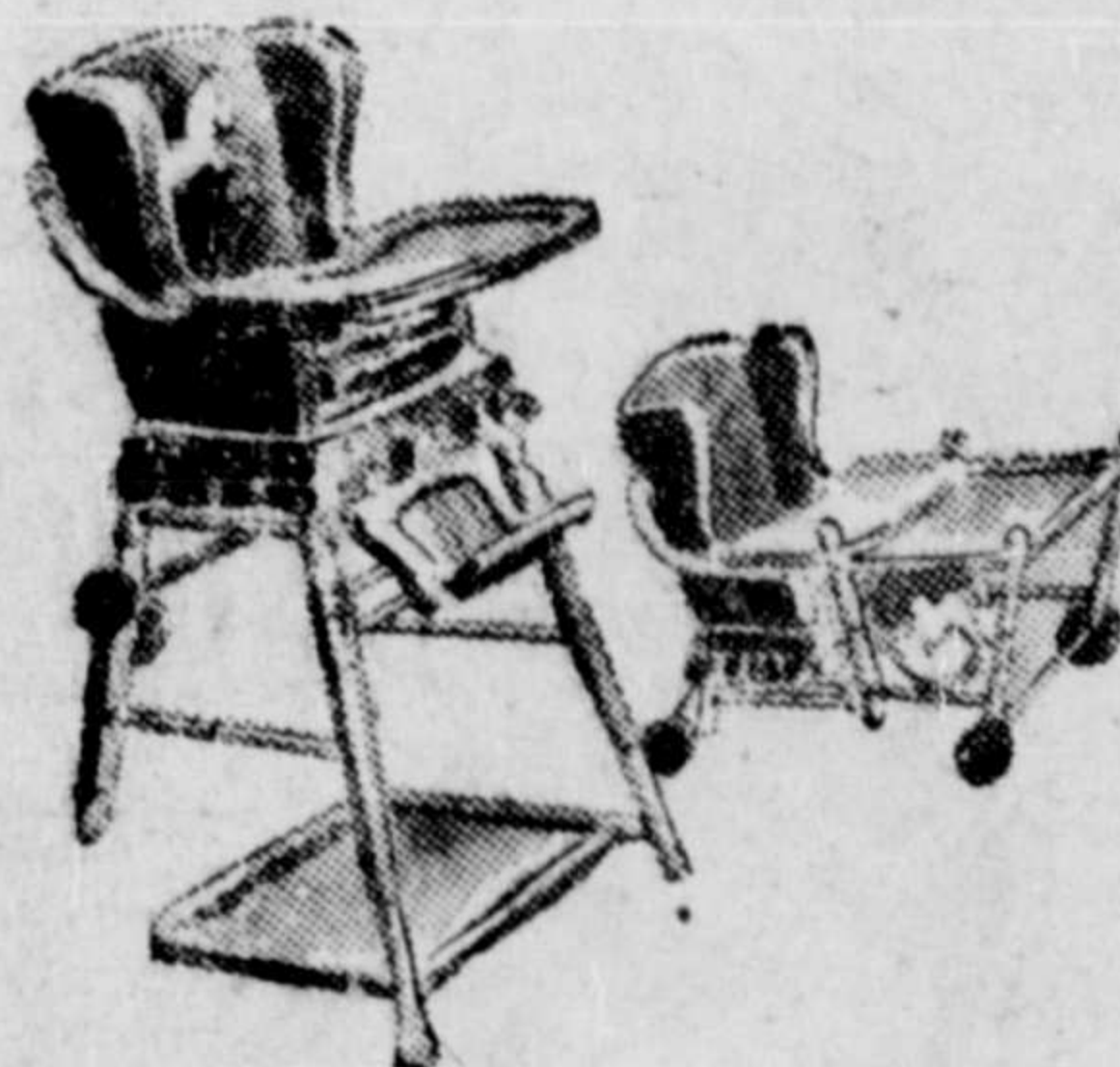

First Regular Liner Since Maritime Strike Goes Through to Westward

KETCHIKAN—First vessel of the Alaska Steamship Co. to come north from Seattle in over two months owing to the maritime strike, the steamer Alaska arrived Sunday but had little cargo for this port and made only a brief stay before proceeding to Seward and elsewhere in western Alaska with much-needed cargo of foodstuffs and other supplies. It will be 10 days it is expected before the first real shipload of cargo for local delivery arrives from Seattle. Meanwhile, through the organization of deliveries from Prince Rupert by Canadian vessels and smaller local boats, Ketchikan, which has been the least hard hit of all Alaska points on account of the strike, is suffering comparatively little.
