SATURDAY SERMON

"WHAT ARE WE LIVING FOR?"

By REV. J. LINNEY, Full Gospel Tabernacle
Though much care is given our bodies at the ex-
pense of our priceless souls, our bodies are worth
only 84 cents. The late Dr. Charles H. Mayo, world-
famous surgeon, has placed a value of 84 cents upon
the human body. This was revealed in an article
appearing in the Northwestern Health Journal.

Dr. Mayo says: "It has been
figured out that at a single
meal a man puts into his
stomach more than his entire
body is worth—I mean the literal
commercial value in dollars and
cents."
Dr. Mayo, in explaining his
statement, continued thus: "The
ingredients of the human body
might be figured as follows: he
has enough potassium for one
shot of a toy pistol; a product
value of seven bars of soap;
enough iron for an eight-penny
nail; enough sulphur to keep
fleas off a dog; enough lime to
whitewash a chicken coop;
enough magnesia to make a
single dose for a person with
a sour stomach, and enough
phosphorus to cover 2,200
matches."

Yet in sharp contrast to the
slight value of our bodies, our
life is composed of something
so valuable that its worth can-
not be estimated. It is our soul.
"WHAT ARE WE LIVING FOR?"
A group of men were gathered
together talking over the un-
settled conditions of the indus-
trial world—the pro's and con's
of the possible success or fail-
ure of business ventures, the
strife in the labor world, etc.,
when one of them asked this
question, "What are we living
for?"
The general idea was that if
a man could, over a stated
period of time, gather together
sufficient finances to retire, and
be blessed with good health to
enjoy the remainder of his days
in peace, he could look upon his
life as having been a real suc-
cess.
King Solomon who was grant-
ed wisdom from God to analyze
the way of life has this observa-
tion to make:
"In the day of prosperity be
joyful but in the day of adver-
sity consider; God also hath set
the one over against the other,
to the end that man should find
nothing after him." (Ecc. 7:14)
The inference is plainly stated.
In the day of prosperity we have
need of nothing and wander far
from God who provided the ab-
undance. But in the day of ad-
versity we are driven to our
knees, to seek help from the
Lord and praise Him for needs
supplied.
"WHAT ARE WE LIVING FOR?"
The Patriarch Job has this to
say: "Thou hast granted me
life." So we have this fact to
face as we read these lines. We
are in the land of the living,
and we are already on our
journey, then What Are We liv-
ing For? and in what direction
are we headed?
"Godliness is profitable to all
things having the promise of
the life that now is, and of that
which is to come." Life is full
of mysteries and, without the
Lord Jesus as our Guide, we are
helpless to know the way. His
Word is a sure light to our
journeying feet for no man need

Seasonable Ideas for Housekeepers

Often seems, in the warm of summer, that the members of the family lose part of their enthusiasm for food.

Force through a sieve or crush to a fine pulp. Drain. Beat egg whites with salt until stiff and gradually add the sugar.

Allow 12 to 16 beans per serving. Marinate in French dressing for 10 minutes. To make cucumber rings, cut cucumber into slices and remove pulpy centres.

Moulded Egg Salad 1 tablespoon unflavored gelatine 1/4 cup cold water 1 1/2 cups boiling water

Soften the gelatine in the cold water. Add boiling water, vinegar and salt. When the gelatine begins to stiffen, add the remaining ingredients.

FUR COATS IN SEASON

TORONTO (C) - Fur coats within the reach of the average women's pocketbook will become more of a reality as manufacturers offer moulton coats for sale.

Made from South African and Australian sheepskins, the moulton coats have advantages which appeal to thrifty buyers. Popularly priced at \$300 in Canada, they are difficult to distinguish from beaver and seal coats.

Now the sheepskin is ready for its first shearing and combing after which comes the conversion process in which the wool is turned into hair.

Special chemicals, usually of aldehyde base, are brushed into the fibres of the skin by means of a hand-operated brush. Then the whole skin is fed into an electric ironer kept at high temperature and revolving at 900 r.p.m. This process is repeated until the molecules in the fibre become straight and stretched, enabling the fibres to retain the straight process permanently.
