# McGeer Hits Constitutionality Of Ilsley Budget Tax Proposals

OTTAWA (CP) - Senator Gerald McGeer, in a memorandum to Premier Hart of British Columbia, claimed that the Dominion government lacked the constitutional authority to carry out agreements with the provinces proposed by Finance Minister Ilsley in his budget speech.

McGeer contended that the Dominion has not the right to levy taxes within the provinces and to give the money back to the provinces for provincial purposes. The Dominion, he said, can tax only for Dominion purposes.

He said that the emergency powers used in wartime do not become constitutional rights in time of peace.

## **REAL ALASKA HIGHWAY**

THE SEATTLE STAR, declaring that it has always been for a real highway to Alaska that will serve the people of the United States, the people of Canada and especially the people of Alaska, is "against any attempt to foist upon the people and the governments of the United States and Canada, as a permanent route, the Alcan interior road built by the Army during the war. There is no justification for any attempt to establish a permanent Alaskan highway on such a route." As to the present condition of the road and prospects for making it a permanent tourist highway, the Star draws attention to a statement made in the House by Representative O'Hara of Minnesota: "If I were travelling on that highway I would want to have a boat with me, I would want to have an automobile mechanic with me, and I would want to have a couple of barrels of gasoline and oil; a couple of weeks' supply of provisions, and everything from mosquito netting to fur-lined clothing and blankets. The Alcan trip would, under most favorable conditions, be only for hardy, vigorous souls, well equipped and in good physical condition."

# WHY THE FUSS?

WE HAVE NO BRIEF for the Roman Catholic Church or any other religious denomination, although we do believe there are too many of them working at cross purposes toward the same general end -good Christian living-but we do delieve the Victoria city council is unduly exercised when it calls in the Protestant clergy to help it make up its mind as to whether or not a ceremonial procession of the Catholic Church should be permitted on the city streets. If the city of Victoria is going to be so careful as all this on whom it permits to parade the streets, it is going to have a lot of problems on its hands and, if it is going to stop any of the processions, it will land itself in very undemocratic territory by its actions. Maybe the Victoria city council, in its solicitousness and discretion, has forgotten about such things as the Atlantic Charter, the Four Free-

Routes for an Alaskan highway have been investigated thoroughly, both by United States and Canadian commissions. Both commissions recommended western routes. What is needed is an agreement between the United States and Canada to build such a highway. Canada is not ready yet. But let us not forget the project. Let us, meanwhile, do nothing that will give the project a black eye. Any attempt to maintain a general use highway on the ill-advised interior route would set back for decades the project of a real highway to Alaska.

### Mrs. D. Thompson Heads **Royal Ontario Museum of** Archaeology

TORONTO (P - Her family's interest in antiquities was instrumental in a young Philadelphian including archaeology among her university studies. Today Mrs. Dorothy Burr Thompson is acting director of the Royal Ontario Museum of Archaeology-the first woman to hold such a position in Canada. At the age of 12 she attended a lecture on 'a Cretan palace excavated by Sir Arthur Evans, the eminent British archaeologist She was so impressed that she took archaeology among her courses when she went to Bryn Mawr College. She later took her B.A., M.A. and Ph.D. from the Philadelphia college. "After that first course in -archaeology my interest never wavered," Dr. Thompson said. When I graduated from Bryn Mawr, which still offers the best archaeological course in North America, I won a fellowship which took me to Greece just at the end of the First World War. I explored the ruins near Athens, those at Mycenae and later lived a year at Arcadia." Appointed acting director on the retirement of Dr. C. T. Currelly, Dr. Thompson will be in charge of administration, development and purchasing. "The museum is interested in collecting the ordinary work of ordinary people-not the major works of art," she says. Women are not discriminated against in archaeology and although the new director does not encourage girls to take it up as a career she says the field is more open in Canada than
