KILLER IS ARRAIGNED

Louis Berowitz to be Charged in Connection with Slaying of Montreal Bookie

MONTREAL, (C)—Louis Berowitz, who surrendered himself to a Montreal Herald reporter and admitted the slaying of Harry Davis, 48-year old owner of a book-making establishment, on Thursday night, will shortly be arraigned for preliminary trial in connection with the killing. Berowitz is also detaining seven other men in the course of further investigation.

Davis, reportedly one of Montreal's leading gambling operators, was fatally shot in his bookie rooms. He died in hospital from three bullet wounds. The assassin walked calmly from the betting place. Berowitz later told the newspaper reporter that he had slain Davis in self-defence.

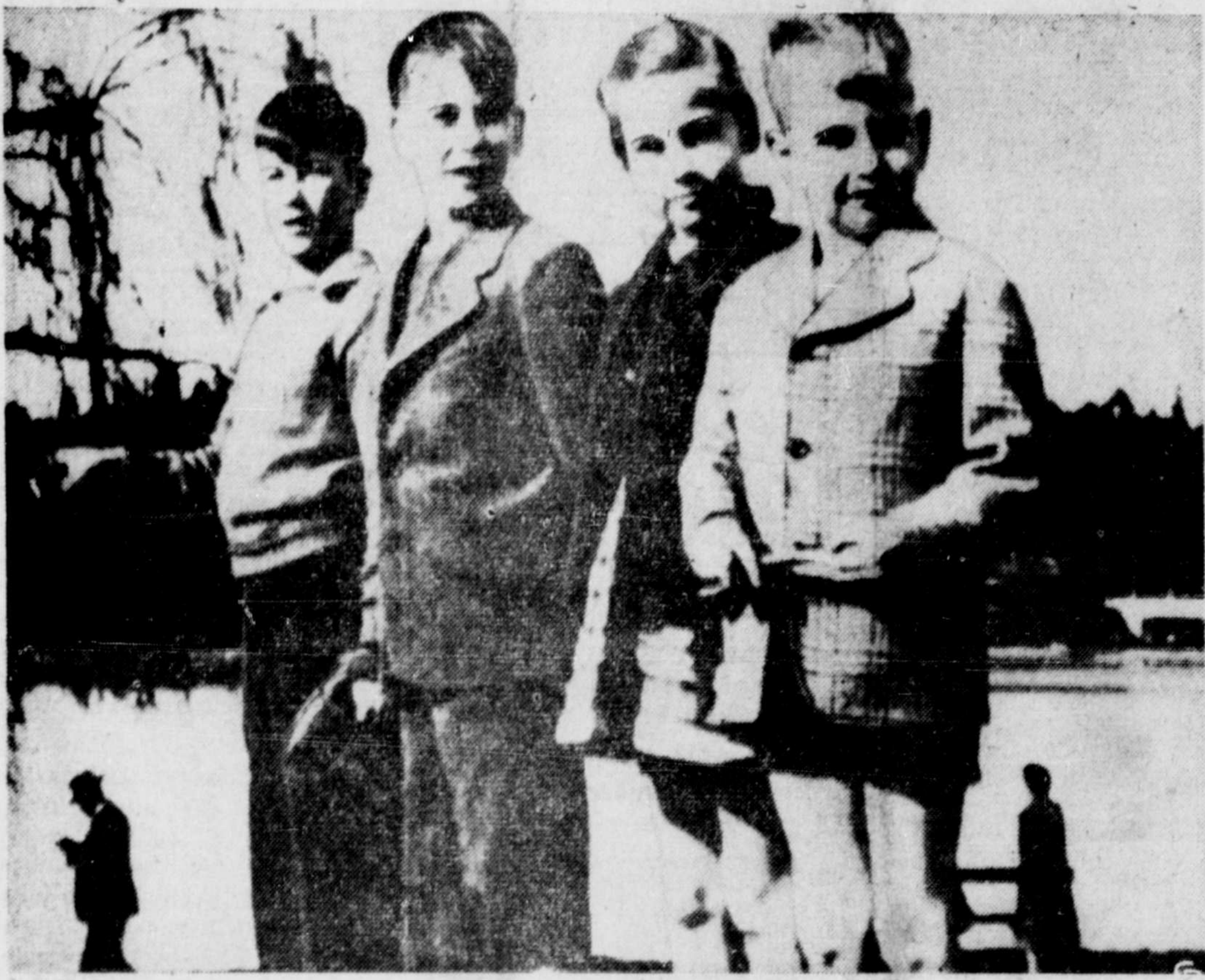
Winner of the vote campaign which will be part of the carnival ticket sale promotion, will be Queen of Port Day, August 22.

RUSSIA ACCUSED BY UNITED STATES

Demand Made That Soviet Cease Economic Stripping of Hungary

WASHINGTON, (C)—The United States yesterday accused Russia of stripping Hungary of food supplies and vitally needed industrial materials. Virtual demand was made of the Soviet to join the United States and Britain in holding the "present economic disintegration" of the Hungarian nation, blame for which was placed on Russian reparation demands, the Red Army policy of living off the country and Russia's removal of material therefrom.

Fur Conservation Indian Solution

OTTAWA, (C)—H. R. Conn of the Indian Affairs branch told a Parliamentary committee that fur conservation service promises the most permanent solution to the economic problems of nearly half of "our Indian population."

BRITISH WAR CRIMES PLEA

"These Are Guilty Men" Says Chief Prosecutor of Goering, Bormann and the Rest

NUERNBERG (C)—British Prosecutor Sir Hartley Shawcross today concluded his summation against twenty-two ranking Nazis on trial on war crimes charges with a plea for "retribution to these guilty men."

Sir Hartley named each defendant from Herman Goering to the absent Martin Bormann and then declared that "these are guilty men."

On the fate of these guilty men depended great future issues, declared the British prosecutor. Their disposition would be a milestone in history. He asked for the death sentence.

The French prosecution summation will be heard Monday followed by the Russian.

North Can Take 150,000 Settlers

FORT ST. JOHN, (C)—Frank Putnam, British Columbia minister of agriculture, said here that the fertile valleys of north-western British Columbia are capable of supporting 150,000 settlers. He is on a tour of the Alaska Highway to the Yukon border.

AFRAID OF INFLATION

Donald Gordon Doubts if Economic Line Can Be Held if Steel Workers' Increase Granted

OTTAWA, (C)—Donald Gordon, chairman of the Prices and Trade Board, told the House of Commons labor relations committee yesterday that granting of a 19 1/2 per cent wage increase sought by steel workers would lead to inflationary prices.

"If we are going to face this increase then we are ready for a new cycle of price adjustments. Whether we can handle it and hold it in control I do not know," Gordon said.

Air Lines Fail To Get Licences

OTTAWA—The federal aircraft board has denied applications of three British Columbia air services for franchises. They are Okanagan Airways, British Columbia Central Airways and Capilano Airways Limited. No reason was given for the refusal but it was indicated that re-application might be entertained later.

Reserve of Grain Urged For India

NEW DELHI (C)—According to Dr. Theodore W. Schultz, leader of the unofficial American food mission which recently completed a 5,000-mile tour of the country, India's great need is a central grain reserve. "Such a reserve could materially improve some of the situations which have disturbed us on this trip, and could be used to alleviate sudden local shortages," said Dr. Schultz. India's food rationing represents "some of the most stringent government controls yet tried anywhere in the world," according to Dr. Schultz, who paid tribute to the public co-operation observed in many of the areas visited by the mission. "We support without reservation your government's estimates of necessary food imports," said Dr. Schultz.

WOULD RAISE LUMBER PRICE

Overall Increase of \$20 per Thousand is Sought by Industry

VANCOUVER, (C)—Revision of the western retail lumber price ceilings to bring an overall increase of \$20 per thousand feet is sought by the British Columbia Lumber Survey. Representing 80 retail yards and other dealers in forest products, a brief has been forwarded to Donald Gordon, chairman of the Prices and Trade Board, and D. D. Rosenberry, timber controller at Ottawa.

Maurice Dix, secretary-manager of the lumber survey, said that a royal commission will be demanded to examine the price board structure unless there is some immediate action at Ottawa.

Urge Parley Over Province Strike

OTTAWA (C)—The industrial disputes inquiry commission investigating the dispute between the Vancouver Province, Southam newspaper, and the International Typographical Union, A.F.L., has recommended that Labor Minister Mitchell endeavour to have negotiations opened between the principal officers of the union and the Southam company, the Labor Department announced today. The commission feels that it can serve no further useful purpose.

PASSPORT THEFT CASE REMANDED

OTTAWA (C)—William M. Pappin, passport officer clerk, facing three charges arising from an attempt to get a false passport for a Russian agent, was remanded until September 16 in police court today. The case of Henry Harris, Toronto optometrist, named in the same incident, has been set over to the same date.

JEW'S FIGURE IN CLASHES

Trouble in Southern Germany With American Soldiers Also Involved

FRANKFURT, (C)—The United States Third Army announces that Jewish displaced persons made organized attacks on American soldiers in southern Germany last night. Seven Jews were wounded with American bayonets and bullets.

The attacks occurred at Windsheim and Wolfrathausen camps, 50 miles south of Munich.

At Windsheim 150 Jews participated in the attack. The trouble at Wolfrathausen followed a riot between Jews and Germans which was quelled by the Americans.

AREA NO. 3 IS CLOSING

Halibut Fishing There to End on August 19, It is Announced

SEATTLE (C)—Halibut fishing in all Pacific Coast and Alaska waters will close at midnight August 19, the International Fisheries Commission has announced. The catch limit of 23,000,000 pounds for Area No. 3, which covers waters westward from Cape Spencer in South-eastern Alaska to the Aleutians, will be attained by that date. This will automatically bring closure to Area No. 4 in Bering Sea and Area 1A, waters south of Cape Blanco on the southern Oregon coast.

Youth to Confess To Woman Killings

CHICAGO (C)—Malachi Coghlan, counsel for William Heirns, said today that the youth will offer to submit to prosecution confessions of the kidnap-killing of Suzanne Degnan, slaying of Frances Brown and fatal stabbing of Mrs. Josephine Ross. The 17-year-old university student has been charged with the murder of the Degnan girl and Miss Brown.

The American halibut boat Omany, carrying 60,000 pounds of halibut, arrived at Prince Rupert this morning but, owing to the refusal of fish workers to work Saturday afternoon pending the outcome of their wages and hours dispute, the vessel was forced to continue on to Seattle to sell her cargo.

ERNEST BEVIN IS LAID UP

Premier Attlee to Head British Delegation at Peace Conference

LONDON (C)—The British Foreign Office announced today that Foreign Secretary Ernest Bevin has been ordered by his doctors to take a complete rest of at least a week and Prime Minister Clement Attlee will take his place at the Paris peace conference.

Mr. Bevin is now at his home in London. The Foreign Office spokesman said he did not know the nature of the Foreign Secretary's illness and "I do not know whether he knows or not."

LABOR HEAD TALKS OUT

President of Trades and Labor Congress Charges A.F.L. With Domination

CALGARY—Charge that the American Federation of Labor was trying to dominate the Canadian Trades and Labor Congress was made here today by P. R. Bengough, president of the Canadian Congress. He was speaking in regard to the move to expel the Machinists' Union from the Congress.

Sailor Makes Home In Cosy Lighthouse

GODSTONE, Surrey, Eng. (C)—Lt.-Cmdr. E. Rogers, R.N., will make his home in a furnished lighthouse at Winterton, Norfolk, but he is in no danger of being marooned because the lighthouse stands 300 yards inland. Lord Beauchamp bought the original lighthouse in 1920, turned it into a comfortable home and built a bungalow at the base of the 50-foot tower. Now the lighthouse has been sold for £3,000 (\$12,000).

High-Handed Russian Act

Two Austrian Legislators Are Taken Into Custody by Soviet Authorities in Vienna

VIENNA (C)—Austrian government sources announced officially today that two members of the People's Party in parliament were arrested yesterday by Russian authorities while on their way home from a session which voted for nationalization of 81 key industries including 13 claimed by Russia for reparations.

Legislators Hans Kottulinsky and Ferdinand Prirsh were taken to Russian headquarters at Aspern and held until morning when they were released, a government spokesman said.

The spokesman said the government has been unable to learn on what charges the deputies were arrested.

The government plans an official protest. Complaint is made that it was the third violation of Austrian parliamentary immunity by the Russians.

GARY CULHANE IS ARRESTED

Shipyards Workers' Secretary Charged in Connection with Province Picketing

VANCOUVER, (C)—Gary Culhane, secretary of the British Columbia Shipyards General Workers' Federation was arrested yesterday on a charge of unlawful assembly in connection with picketing activities at the Vancouver Daily Province building. Peter Nikolayuk was taken into custody at the same time on a charge of obstructing the police.

Amalgamation of Housing Projects

OTTAWA, (C)—A central mortgage and housing corporation was announced Friday for 42 integrated housing projects involving the construction of 2,288 units. Of these work has started on 29 projects.

LANDS MINISTER IS COMING NORTH

Hon. E. T. Kenney to Attend Associated Boards Convention at Terrace

Hon. E. T. Kenney, provincial minister of lands and forests and M.L.A. for Skeena, will be in his home town of Terrace on the occasion of the annual convention of the Associated Boards of Trade of Central British Columbia there on August 8 and 9, according to word received at the Daily News office. He also expects to pay a visit to this city while in the north.

COME TO Church

SATURDAY SERMON
DIVIDER OF HISTORY AND MEN

(By A. O. AASEN, St. Paul's Lutheran Church)

The calendar on yonder wall tells you that it is now 1946 years since Jesus was born. Everything that transpired before that miraculous birth was B.C. ("Before Christ"). Everything that has happened since, the rise and fall of nations, and all that is A.D. ("After Christ"). Everytime we humans write a date, a letter, a check, a deed or any kind of a document, we acknowledge the truthfulness of Christ's birth. It's year 1946 or some other year as the case may be.

You remember the two malefactors, as they are called, who were crucified at the time of Christ's death. I see in them representatives of the whole human race. These men were equally guilty. They were both sentenced to die. They were both hanging on the cross. And to begin with they both blasphemed and mocked the Saviour. But then a miracle took place. One of them repented. One turned to Christ and pleaded, "Lord, remember me when thou comest into thy Kingdom." And immediately the Saviour replied, "Verily I say unto thee, today shalt thou be with me in Paradise." There at that Cross the paths of these two men parted. The one went with Christ into Paradise. The other, persisting in his unbelief, continued on to hell. What made the difference? Faith and lack of faith. Nothing else. And this then leads us to the last point: Does Christ find you among the believers or unbelievers?

Far be it from me to classify you among thieves and robbers but, in God's sight, you are no better than those malefactors, even though you are ever so moral and pure and virtuous and good, according to human standards. For it is your attitude to Christ and his Cross that determines your eternal destiny. Here is what Jesus saith in John 3: "Whoever believeth in him shall not perish, but have everlasting life: but he that believeth not is condemned already,"

SYDNEY, Australia.—Australia is known overseas as the "land of sunshine," but not generally known is the fact that the country is also a land of snow and snow sports. Winter is in its stride here and the snow sports season is beginning on the Australian Alps in Victoria and New South Wales and at Mount Wellington in Tasmania.

Major snow playground of the Commonwealth is Mount Kosciusko, the roof of Australia. It rears 1300 feet high in the Australian Alps and boasts skiing grounds and Alpine scenery.

Mount Kosciusko lies 15 hours by train and car from Sydney and is a New South Wales government trust managed by the Tourist Bureau. 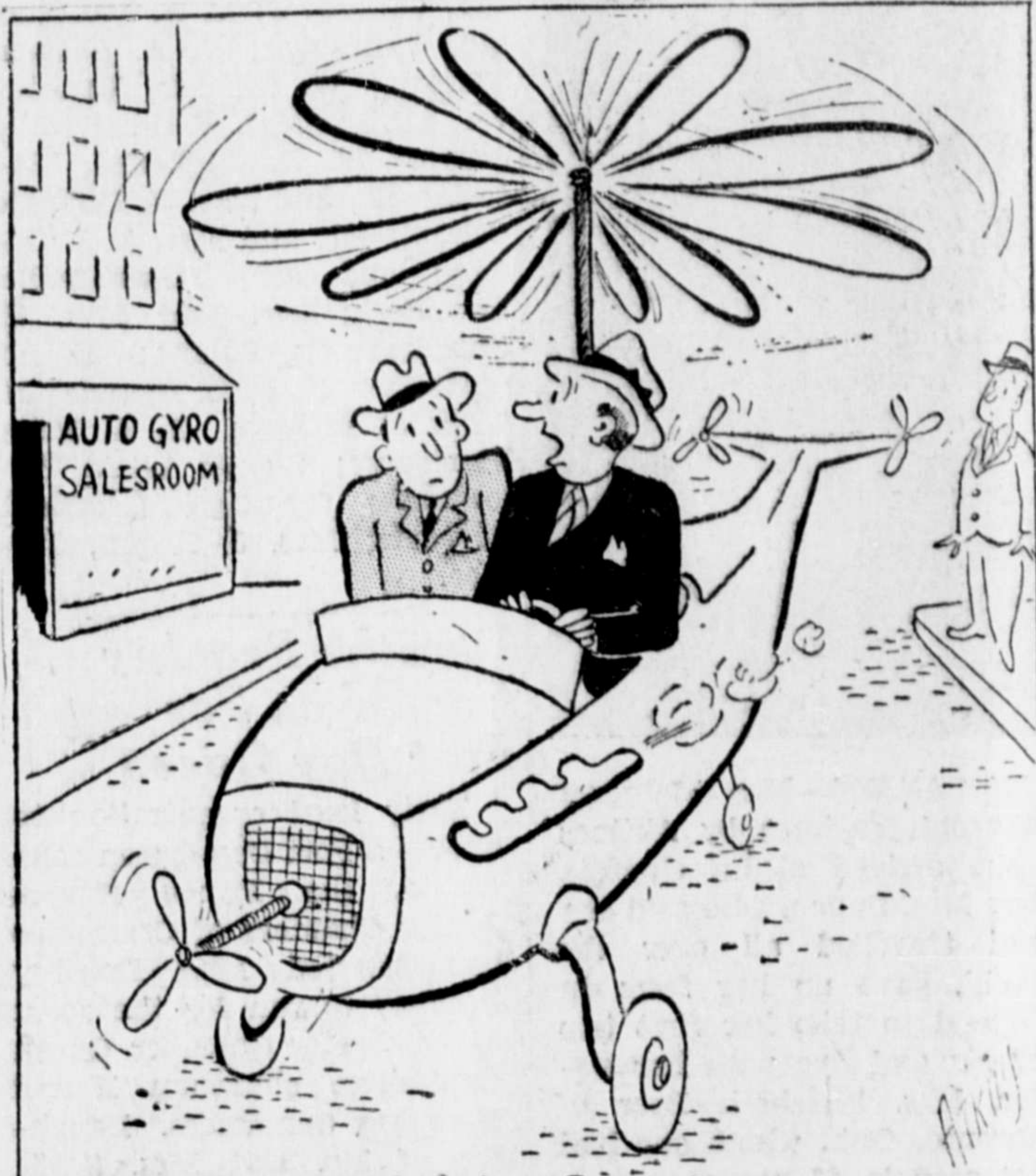

SHORT SPORT

George Bernard Shaw, dramatist who's ready to comment on anything says he "doesn't care a dump" about soccer, has never seen a game "much less a cup final—whatever that may be." The Dublin-born playwright, 90 this month and, incidentally, seven years older than the Football Association, was invited to express his views on sport by the London Sunday Pictorial. His answers were in the usual crisp Shawian style. Asked if he considered that International soccer matches play a part in cementing good relations between nations, he said: "No. It obviously creates the most furious animosity between nations who have no natural quarrels. All competitive games do."

Other questions and answers: Question: The Football Association stands united against their members taking part in any form of betting. Do you endorse this policy? Shaw: Betting is an attempt to obtain money without earning it, and should be made criminal. But the organizing of betting by the bookmaker and its mechanization in the tote is mathematically interesting. The bookmaker is not a covetous idler; and he has to be an exceptionally honest man.

Question: Some league games attract 60,000 spectators but the maximum pay of a professional player is £16 (\$40). Do you think he should get more? Shaw: Yet, if he can. Everybody should get more if they can. The £10 means nothing; it is annual income that counts, not

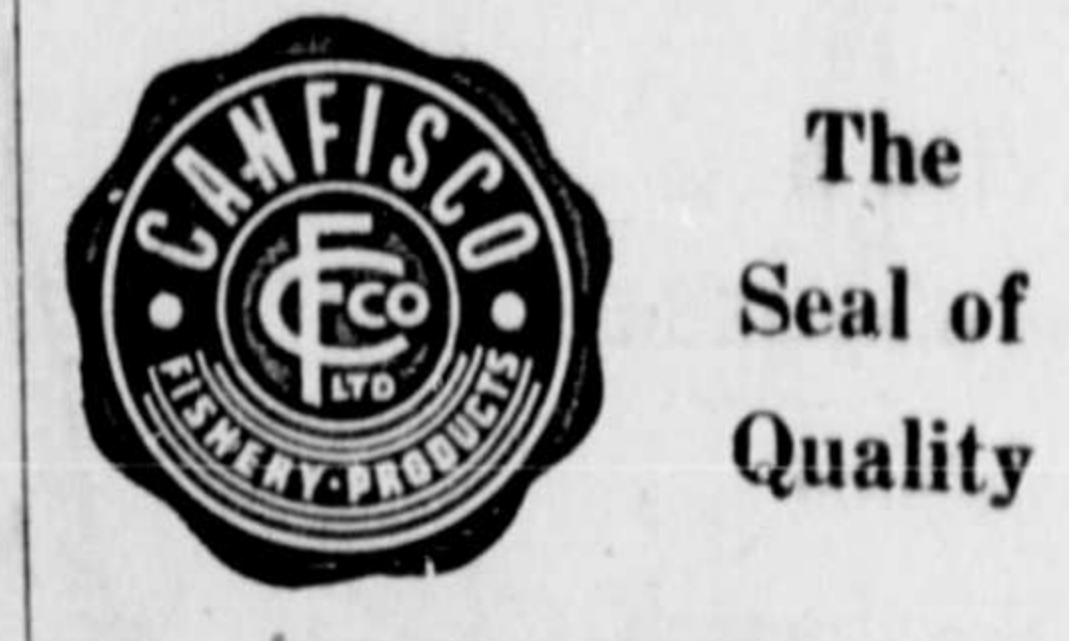

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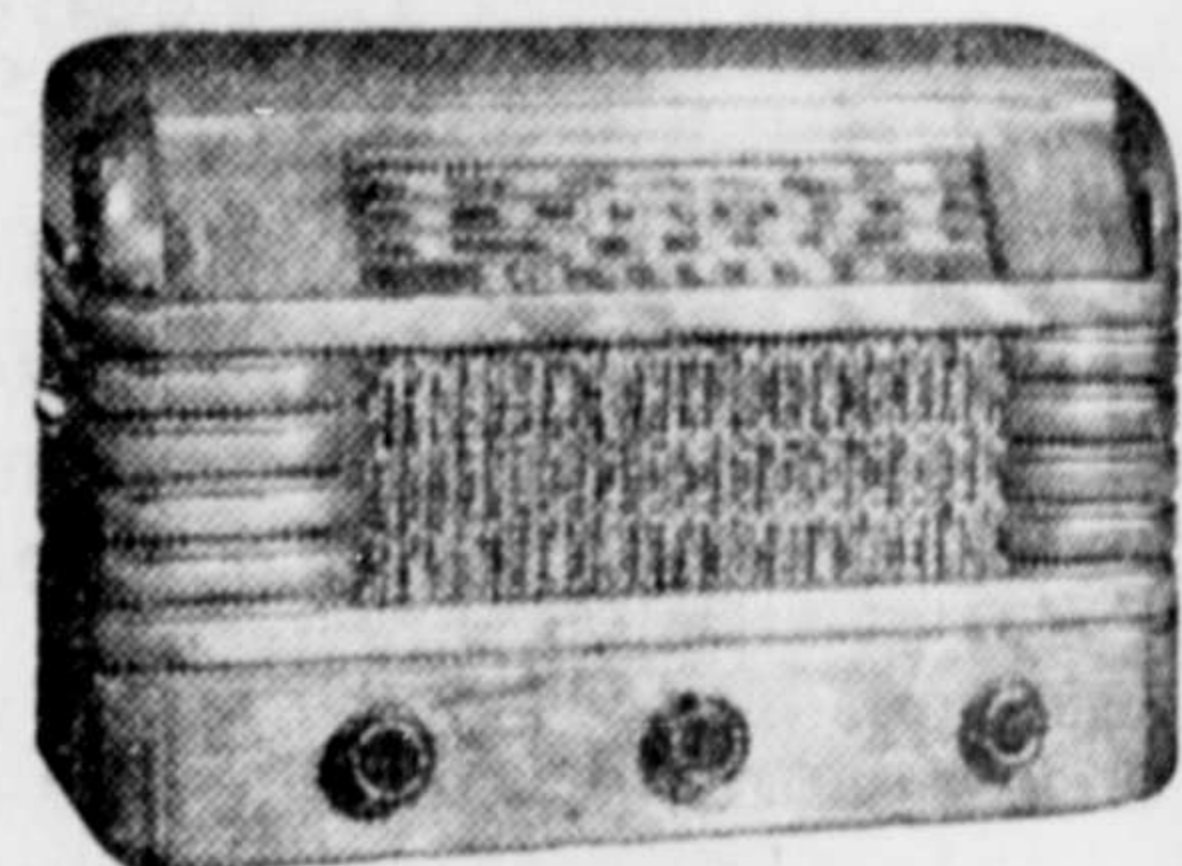

N.Z. Servicemen Go For New Jobs

WELLINGTON, N.Z. (C)—Only one in every three servicemen demobilized in New Zealand has returned to his pre-war employment. A total of 47,164 have returned to their jobs, while 35,127 have taken up new employment on their own initiative.

The Rehabilitation Department has placed a further 18,279 in new jobs, including 2,770 trained at government centres where discharged servicemen are taught a trade. A further 3,358 of these placed by the department have received subsidized wages while training with private employers. The remaining servicemen are either not yet ready to take jobs or have re-entered the services. Only 155 are unemployed.

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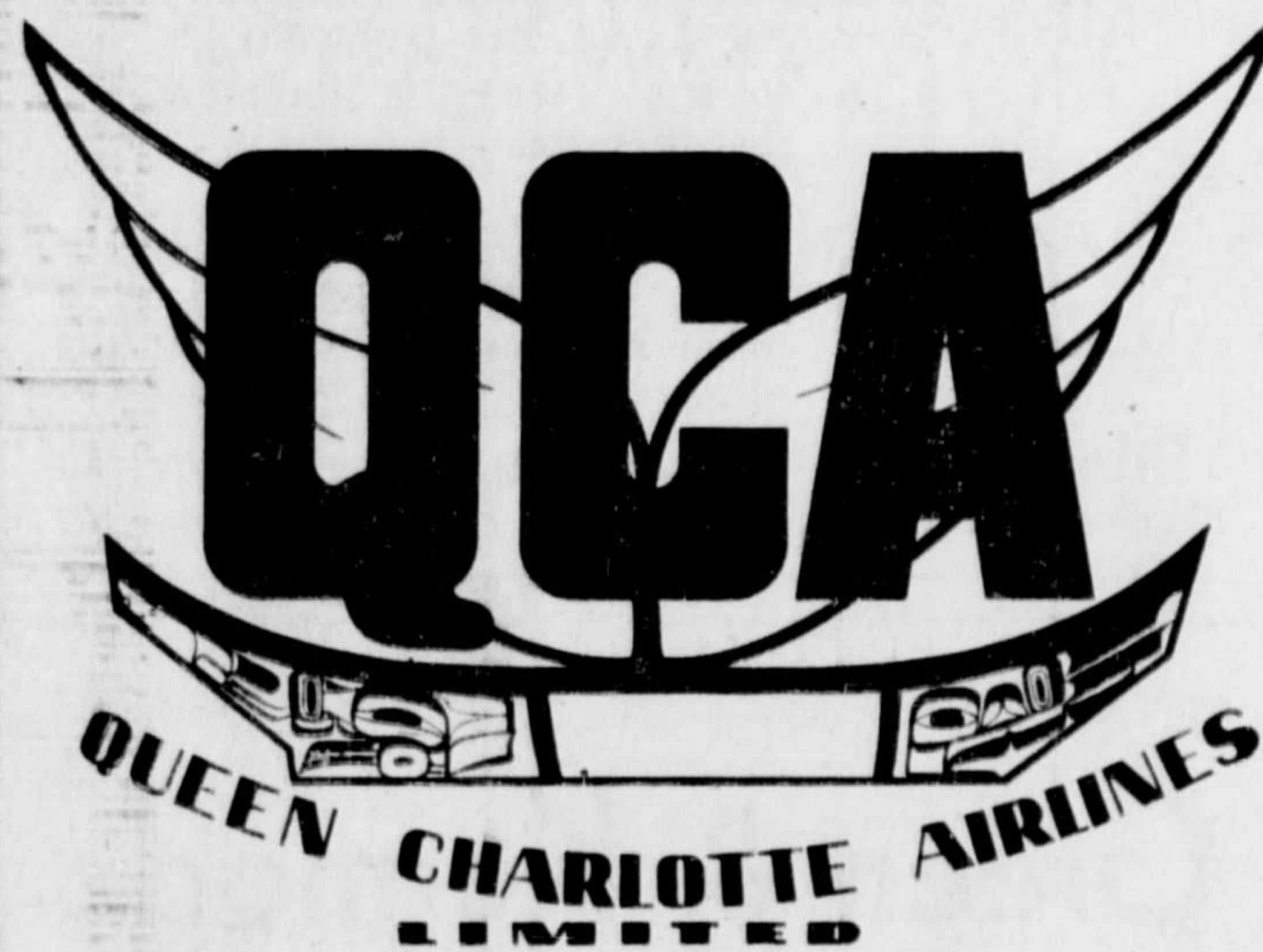

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Waterfront Whiffs

Closing of Halibut Season Announced for August 19—Widespread Salmon Investigations

Bringing down the curtain at an earlier date than ever on Pacific halibut fishing, closing of the season in Area No. 3, in which the larger vessels of the fleet have been operating since the brief season in the nearer Area No. 2 ended several weeks ago, is announced for August 19 by the International Fisheries Commission.

Continuation of the same intensive fishing which drained Area No. 2 of its season's quota was marked as the fleet moved into Area No. 3 and, up to the end of June, 19,750,000 pounds of the 28,000,000 pound quota had been taken. August 19 is also the closing date for the far northern Area No. 4 and Area No. 1A in the extreme south.

The Area Three season will have been of 111 days duration this year. Last year the season in that area terminated September 25, and the year before on November 30. Reason for the short season obviously is the intensive method of fishing now practised. Every year fishing methods get more efficient. Most reasonable method of extending the season over a longer period, fishermen say, is a curtailment law, devised by the fishermen themselves, and enforced by the International Fisheries Commission.

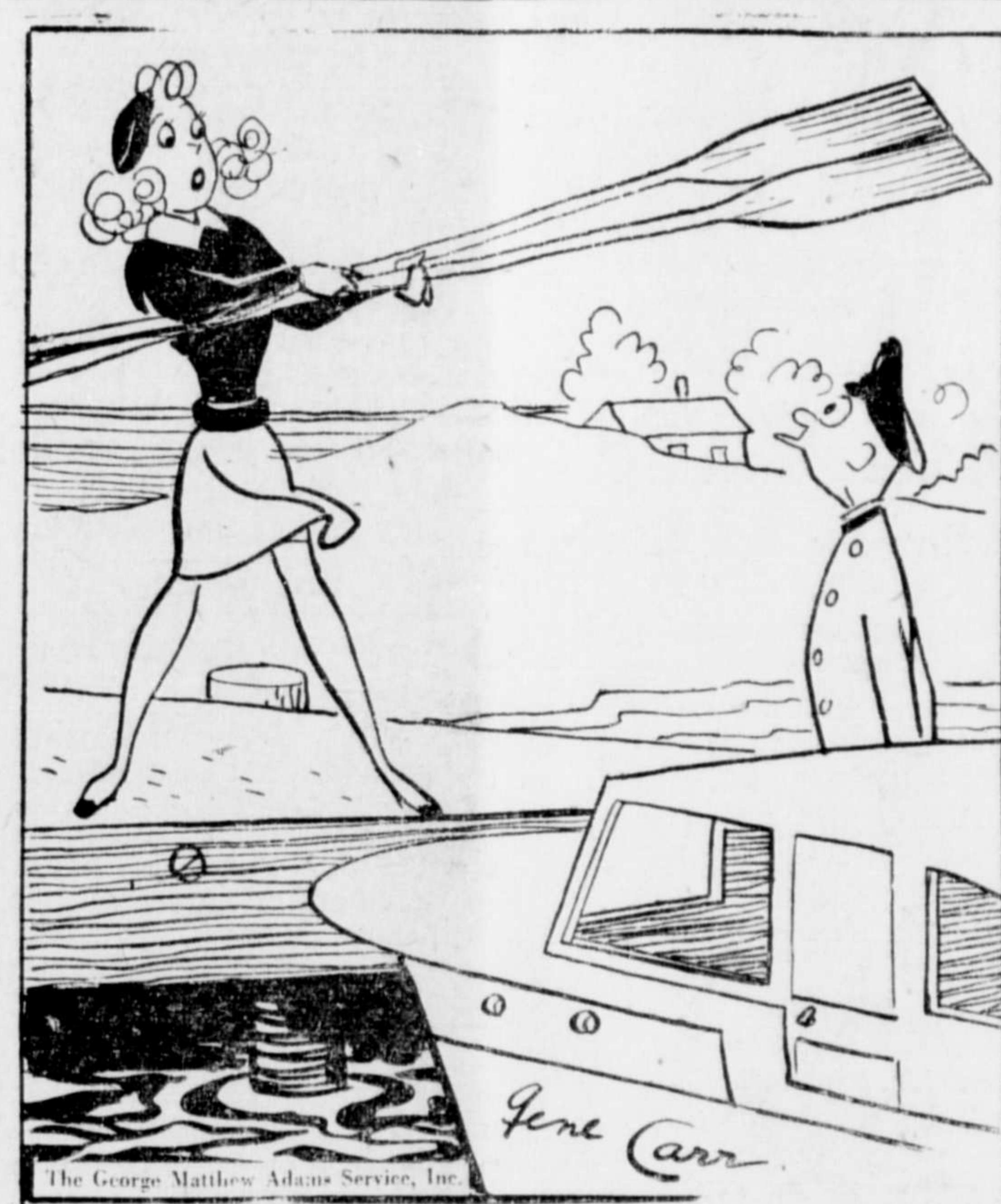
Major J. W. Kilpatrick, after serving in the Canadian Army throughout the war, is now out of uniform and has returned to his civilian duties with the Fisheries Research Board of Canada as executive assistant at the Pacific Fisheries Experimental Station which was removed from Prince Rupert to Vancouver during the war. Major Kilpatrick was associated with the station for nine years while it was situated at Prince Rupert. E. B. Baker had been relieving Mr. Kilpatrick during the war.

Extensively organized research work in connection with the migration of salmon in the Skeena River area which is being conducted under direction of Dr. A. L. Pritchard of the Nanaimo Biological Station of the Fisheries Research Board of Canada is described in a currently issued progress report. Dr. Pritchard has parties out on many streams and lakes and is to large extent making his summer headquarters at Prince Rupert from which, among other equipment, is based a specially fitted motor truck.

Compromise In Strike Dispute?

With the sands of time running out before the fishworkers' strike deadline, set for 5 p.m. Monday, observers on the waterfront feel that the week's negotiations between United Fishermen's and Allied Workers' Union and the nine fishing company operators will result in a compromise which will allow the plants to remain open without a shutdown. Announcement to this effect is expected sometime during the week-end.

Many fish workers themselves feel that, in spite of the overwhelming strike vote last Saturday, a compromise would be more acceptable than a strike which would paralyze the fresh and frozen fish industry and perhaps lead to a similar tie-up in other plants along the coast.

While the strike negotiations created the greatest under-the-surface interest along the waterfront, and indeed, throughout the city during the week, the outstanding waterfront event is the visit of the big Canadian cruiser Uganda and the accompanying destroyer Crescent. In spite of unfavorable weather which has caused cancellation of most of the outdoor sporting events planned by the Canadian Legion and sports organizations, the visit has undoubtedly been a success from the standpoint of goodwill. Comments regarding the hospitality of Prince Rupert are heard on every side by crewmen of the two vessels and all of them overheard by the waterfront man have been good. It is hoped that many of the delayed sport events can be successfully

then return to Esquimalt. Next month the Uganda is scheduled to make a cruise to Dutch Harbor in the Aleutians and during her return trip will visit Prince Rupert, sometime in September.

Prince Rupert's normally fine weather admittedly got a bit clouded up during the visit of the two vessels. However, the rainfall was slightly exaggerated by the Leading Stoker of the Uganda who commented to his mate from under his dripping hat: "We're not going ashore mate, we're just going into shallower water."

Halibut Landings

Halibut landings at Prince Rupert this season now total 12,129,500 pounds, of which more than two-thirds was landed by Canadian vessels. Last week's landings were more than double those of the previous week, and totalled 599,000 pounds. Canadian landings last week totalled 438,000 pounds, while American boats brought in 161,000. Black-cod landings for the week were 80,000 pounds.

Sockeye fishing on the Skeena and Naas rivers, which showed improvement during the bright weather early in the week, fell off during the latter part, it is reported. Boat averages for the week are not yet available.

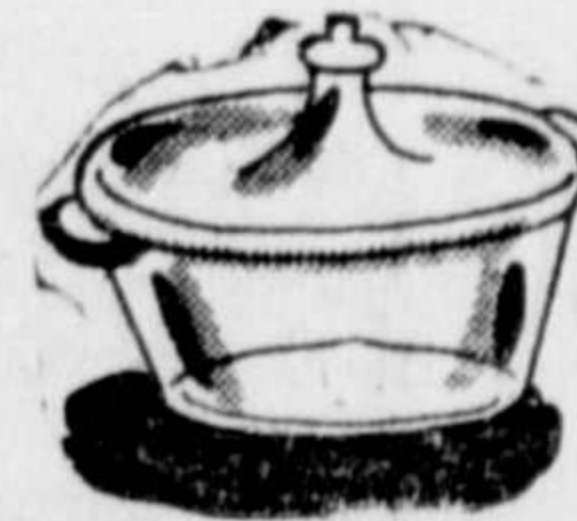
