Dr. A. L. Pritchard of the Nanaimo fisheries biological station laid bare a portion of t he private life of the sockeye to the Rotary Club here yesterday in expose based on a Skeena River survey which his department has been carrying on for the last three years.

Dr. Pritchard hopes to be able to tell the whole story about that particular type of fish in another two years when the survey is completed. He seems fairly certain that in spite of their hardships they will last until October 1948. In the meantime he has managed to do pretty well in the matter of data.

The greatest enemy of the salmon and of the sockeye in particular, is the tin can. People insist on putting large numbersof them in cans for other people to eat. This sadly reduces the number of salmon which can hope to get back to their native streams to lay eggs and thereby become ancestors.

Eggs are the salmon's salvation. Salman really known how to lay eggs. They lay them in such quantity that even with a mortality rate of 96 per cent
