Successful Operation By American Landing Forces at Saipon in Marianas

PEARL HARBOR, June 16 (7) -United States troops who landed Wednesday on Saipan Island, 1500 miles southeast of Tokyo, in the Marianas secured beachheads, captured a headland and fought their way into a sugar mill, beating off Japanese counter-attacks.

The invaders were supported by a huge carrier plane force and guns of battleships which knecked out enemy coastal guns and anti-aircraft batteries.

Hoonah is All But Completely Destroyed by Fire

JUNEAU, June 16-The village of Hoonah on Chicagoff Island northwest of here has been almost wiped out by fire. An estimated five hundred persons, or roughly 75 percent of the population, have been rendered homeless.

One person — a native—is dead and possibly a second. The fire spread from a dwelling where an Indian woman tried to use gasoline instead of kerosene in fish drying, and spread rapidly through the



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A . I more secluded than their western sisters, are doing tougher war jobs than the women of the western hemisphere. Some are fighting in the army, where several generals accepted them as volunteers. They wear the same clothes and draw the same pay as men-a private gets approximately one dollar a month. Some of these women who range from teen-age rich girls; to illiterate old peasant women, have seen some hot fighting. but the majority do non-combat work such as nursing and stretcher bearing.

A number of Chinese nurses are assigned to "hospitals on muleback"-hospitals which can pack up from one camouflaged peasant hut to another as fighting progresses. They have to move quickly from one battle scene to another and they must be able to work without slee: for hours on end. These nurses are under the supervision the Chinese Red Cross Medica Relief Corps.






