Russians Winning Everywhere

MOSCOW-Working with Polish troops, Russian forces have renewed their offensive around the Polish capital of Warsaw and have driven a bridgehead six miles deep across the Vistula River just north of the city. This latest drive threatens East Prussia from the south. Hard fighting is raging in East Prussia, with the Soviet advance gaining less than two miles on a separated front. In the north, Russian troops have captured the important Norwegian port of Kirkenes. The Germans have used this port as a naval base in preying on shipping along the route to Murmansk. On the southern end of the front, the Russians have completed their occupation of Transylvania by capturing the important city of Satu-Mare and more than 200 other communities.

Eighth Army Advances

ROME-British Eighth Army forces in Italy have moved ahead from bridgeheads west and north of Cesena. They are now five miles from the town of Forli along the highway to

Spain Accuses Russia

LONDON-The Spanish press has accused Russia of attempting to incite a rebellion in Spain. The Berlin radio says that heavy battles already have been fought in the province of Catalonia.

Nazis Quit Holland?

LONDON-A front-line dispatch this morning says there are indications the Germans are starting to pull out of western Holland. Heavy German movements have been observed north of the Dutch cities of Tilbury and Breda. The Allied communique says British forces are closing in on Breda and Tilburg. The situation is relatively quiet in France and Ger-

Philippines Naval Battle

PEARL HARBOR - As yet, full details of the battle in Philippines waters between Japanese and Allied naval units have not been disclosed. It is known, however, that the Japanese have lost at least one large aircraft carrier, one light carrier and four cruisers. In addition, the Allies have probably sunk one large enemy carrier and two battleships. They also inflicted heavy damage on six Japanese battleships, three heavy cruisers and several destroyers. The Americans have lost the light cruiser, Princeton, and from General Mac-Arthur's headquarters comes the announcement that an Allied escort carrier from the American Seventh fleet, which covered the Allied landings in the Philippines. In the Philippines the Allied invasion forces are advancing along the entire front on Leyte Island. Allied forces have swept 20 miles north of the provincial capital of Tacloban.

German General Killed

LONDON-A Reuters dispatch quotes the German Trans-Ocean News Agency as saying that General Schneckenburger, commanding German infantry forces, was killed in action in Belgrade.

Canadians in India

CALCUTTA - The first R.C.A.F. transport squadron to operate from India has arrived in Calcutta. A large fleet of Dakota planes carried the complete personnel of the Canadian transport group from Britain to India in four days. The Dakotas flew unescorted over France, stopping in Sardinia, Tripoli, Egypt and Iraq.

Canadian Brigadier Killed

WITH THE CANADIAN FIRST ARMY-The body of one of the most popular commanders in the Canadian Army-Brigadier Tom Lewis of Montreal-has been found on the battlefield in the Schelde pocket. At that spot, the Montreal brigadier led his men in some of western Europe's bitterest fighting. He was the first Canadian brigadier killed in action in that war theatre.

Prince Rupert Rehabilitation . . .

The Prince Rupert Chamber of Commerce, Canadian Legion and Rotary Club are to be congratulated on starting the movement which culminated this Tuesday night in the organization of the Prince Rupert Rehabilitation Council, one of the principal functions of which will be to prepare this community for the return home of the men who have been fighting the war, particularly those who have been serving on the battlefronts but also for those who have been on the war industries and who may have to be assisted in readjusting themselves in peacetime pur-

Committees will be formed to survey the principal fields of employment such as the industries to ascertain their capacity to provide employment. The possibility of establishment of new industries here in connection with the handling, processing and distribution of the natural products which abound so richly in the district will have to be investigated.

The newly organized local council will have the opportunity to do much not only in assisting in the rehabilitation of men and women in their readjustment after the war but in exploring the possibilities of opening new fields of employment here - all of which would be of benefit to the whole economy of the community.

The success or otherwise of the effort will depend to large extent on the accomplishments of those who will be assigned to the various committees. Care should be taken to see that the most competent persons in the community should be called upon to conduct the various surveys and make recommendations arising therefrom.







An industrial survey of the province of British Columbia conducted by William Power of Montreal, vice-president of the Spitzer-Mills advertising agency, gium who went on who was in Prince Rupert a few days ago, showed that there were twenty-three industrial establishments in Prince Rupert in 1942 with capital invested of \$7,935,656 and gross production of \$12,492,906. The cost of materials used aggregated \$3,767,-624 while cost of fuel and electricity was \$144,482.

Prince George was shown as having eighteen establishments with capital invested of \$29,-972, gross value of production \$495,241, cost of materials used \$238,813 and cost of fuel and electricity, \$17,224.

Speaking of postwar conditions which might be expected Mr. Power predicted that a difficult period might be anticipated for a year or so after the war but, after that, he envisioned the industrial future of British Columbia as a "dream" due to the demands which would arise from the Orient.

Mr. Power believed that there was no occasion for any rivalry between Vancouver and Prince Rupert. Instead the prosperity of the one city should complement that of the other.


