Glory For Prince Rupert . . .

Newspapers and radio throughout Canada have been heralding another accomplishment of Canadian combined naval and air operations in the sinking of a German U-boat in mid-Atlantic with H.M.C.S. Prince Rupert, frigate named after this war-crowded north port, taking part in the kill. Of course, it is a matter of satisfaction that this ship, "adopted" by the local Imperial Order, Daughters of the Empire, which has been sending gifts and comforts to the vessel ever since she was here last fall, should have distinguished herself in action. It brings the name of the city of Prince Rupert to the fore, giving us all particular interest in the event and a modicum of reflected glory.

Evidently, none of our own town boys were on the Prince Rupert but, nevertheless, it is fitting for us to congratulate the commanding officer, Lieut. Commander Robert W. Draney of New Westminster, and his officers and men on this feat and to wish them more good sailing and further bags of the kind recorded.

It is a reminder of the fact that our own Canadian ships and men appear to be playing an increasingly important part in the Battle of the Atlantic against the undersea prowlers.

TRANSOCEAN ANNIVERSARY

Progress of Atlantic Flying Since Alcock-Brown Epic

MONTREAL, June 15 — Twenty-five years ago yesterday the first non-stop flight across the Atlantic was made by Alcock and Brown and their great exploit was honored by Trans-Canada Air Lines pilots, particularly those flying the government's mail service across the ocean.

Alcock, later Sir John William Alcock, K.B.E., and Lieut. Arthur Whittom Brown flew from St. Johns, Newfoundland, to Clifden, Ireland, in a Vickers aircraft. It took them 16 hours and 12 minutes. In the quarter century which followed their pioneering, aviation has made great strides and T. C. A. crews flying big transport Lancasters have covered a much greater distance, from Montreal direct to Scotland, in a little more than 11 hours.

In approximately 75 crossings since the Canadian government's wartime Trans-Atlantic service was inaugurated less than a year ago, the Lancasters have rushed some 35,000,000 letters to and from the forces overseas. With these aircraft in service, two round trips were made each week and this will soon be increased to three, according to H. J. Symington, C.M.G., K.C., president of T.C.A. Five aircraft, all but one built in Canada, will be in operation this summer.

The service was destined by the government primarily to speed mails for the Canadian forces overseas, but other freight is carried, parts and equipment of importance to the war effort. At the request of and for the Canadian government, Trans-Canada Air Lines undertook this wartime operation, its crews

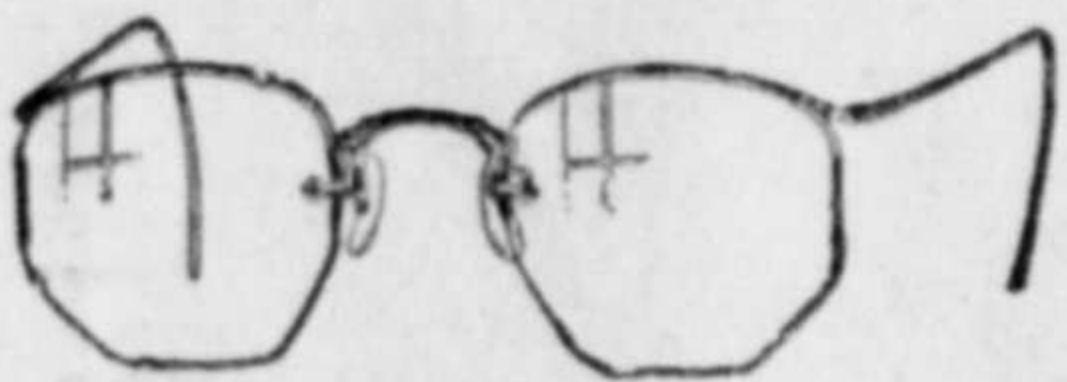

WHEN PRINCE RUPERT PAID VISIT HERE

The exploit of the new Royal Canadian Navy frigate, H.M.C.S. Prince Rupert, in sinking a German submarine in mid-Atlantic recalls an interesting ceremony aboard that vessel when she visited here early last September soon after her commissioning.

The trim new war vessel was thrown open for inspection by ladies of the Imperial Order, Daughters of the Empire, Canadian Legion Women's Auxiliary and Navy League Women's Auxiliary.

Mayor (at that time) W. M. Watts was present and, on behalf of city and citizens, made the presentation to Lieut. Commander Draney of a handsome plaque and a library of gramophone records as a community gift. Comforts and cigarettes were given as a personal gift to the ship's personnel by Mr. Watts.

The local Imperial Order, Daughters of the Empire, Mrs. G. E. Moore, municipal regent, having assumed sponsorship of the vessel, presented a washing machine. Since then other gifts have been sent regularly to the ship by the I.O.D.E.—100 records, six thermos bottles and a steel guitar at Christmas and since then toasters and electric irons.
