JAP FLEET HEAD DEAD

Admiral Mineichi Koga Killed On Active Duty While Directing Operations

NEW YORK, May 5 (C)—The Tokyo radio announced today that Admiral Mineichi Koga, commander of the Japanese combined fleet, has been killed on active duty less than a year after his predecessor, Admiral Yamamoto, met a similar death. Tokyo said that Koga died at his post in March while directing general operations from an airplane at the front.

DEADLY TEAM WORK BURNS JAP FORTS

PORT MORESBY, May 5 (C)—South Pacific air fighters have devised deadly tactics for dealing with Japanese strongpoints. They tried them out on Numa Numa village on Bougainville with 12 P-39 Airacobras. Four dropped 500-lb. bombs, and four dropped their belly tanks among the wood and thatched buildings. The last four poured in cannon and incendiary machine-gun fire and the whole show went up in flames.

MONTREAL, May 5—Half way in the Sixth Victory Loan campaign, employees of the Canadian National Railways and its subsidiary companies, TransCanada Air Lines and National Railways Munitions Limited, have purchased bonds to a total of \$6,143,800. Canvassing continues actively and those in charge are confident that the workers at the close of the campaign will have surpassed their record purchases made in the Fifth Victory Loan which totalled \$8,599,600.

Two Hundred and Two Officers and Men Missing After Sinking of Destroyer

OTTAWA, May 5 (C)—The Department of Navy yesterday issued a list of 202 officers and ratings reported missing after the Canadian destroyer, Athabaskan was sunk in the English Channel during a naval clash. Twenty-two were British Columbia men. None were from Prince Rupert.

Subscribers Victory Loan

Subscriptions to the Sixth Victory Loan on Thursday amounted to \$16,000, bringing the cumulative total for the drive so far to \$389,900. Both these figures are below the corresponding figures for the Fifth Victory Loan last fall when the corresponding day's total was \$18,550 and the cumulative total for a similar period was \$465,400. The quota in both drives is similar—\$750,000.

SIXTH LOAN MOVING UP

Is Now Twelve Million Dollars Ahead of Corresponding Time in Fifth Campaign

OTTAWA, May 5 (C)—The Sixth Victory Loan went \$12,000,000 ahead of the Fifth Loan for the same period when \$78,115,950 was sold on Thursday for a cumulative total of \$714,984,750. Loan purchases on Wednesday had totalled \$88,251,250, bringing sales at the half way mark to \$641,868,800—two million dollars behind the Fifth Loan's corresponding total.

Holland Is Forbidden Territory

LONDON, May 5 (C)—The North Sea province of Zeeland, Holland, has been declared "forbidden territory" with remaining few Dutch inhabitants barred from the highways and waterways without special German permission. The action has been taken in view of the forthcoming expected invasion.

Gandhi May Be Released

LONDON, May 5 (C)—An unconfirmed report said Friday that the release of Mohandas K. Gandhi from internment in India is imminent. Time and conditions would be decided by Viscount Wavell, viceroy of India.

BIG ITALIAN DRUM STRUCK

NAPLES, May 5 (C)—British and American bombers struck the great dam on the Pescara River in eastern Italy today. In the land fighting German raiding parties penetrated the Eighth Army lines but were thrown back.

Third Day of Ford Strike

WINDSOR, Ontario, May 5—The strike of 14,000 employees of the Ford Motor Company went into its third day today with all factory workers still out. However, leaders of the United Automobile Workers agreed to allow office workers and executives of the company to return to work. An official of the government's Wartime Labor Relations Board is expected in Windsor to try and negotiate a settlement.

All Possible Draftees Being Removed From Industry, Minister Says

OTTAWA, May 5 (Canadian Press)—Hon. Humphrey Mitchell, minister of labor, said that administrative districts were calling men for compulsory military training as fast as medical boards and other machinery can deal with them. When all possible draftees had been taken away from industry, future call-up requirements would probably be met by men reaching eighteen-and-a-half years of age. More compulsory labor transfer orders could be expected in the future, the minister said.

DISCUSS FOREIGN POLICY

LONDON — Foreign policy dominated the discussion at the conference of Empire Prime Ministers here today. It is expected that Prime Minister Curtin of Australia will raise the question of the establishment of an Empire secretariat.

JAPS DOMINATE RAILWAY

CHUNGKING—The Japanese are continuing their advance into China and have captured the city of Lo Yang, in western Honan province. Two thirds of the Peiping-Hankow railway are now in Japanese hands.

The funeral of the late John M. Dunn took place yesterday afternoon from the Grenville Court Chapel of B.C. Undertakers to Fairview Cemetery. Many old friends were present including veterans of the 102nd Battalion with which deceased served in the First Great War. Very Rev. James B. Gibson, dean of St. Andrew's Anglican Cathedral, officiated and Mrs. J. C. Gilker presided at the organ to accompany the hymns which were "Abide With Me" and "Lead Kindly Light."

Ralph Wilby Is Extradited

Fallbearers were Robert Parks, Fred Hardy, W. E. Denning, Thomas King, W. J. Rance and R. S. Woods. The "Last Post" was sounded over the graveside by Bugler W. J. Rance. LONDON, May 5 (C)—Habeas corpus proceedings to prevent the extradition of Wilby, alias A. D. Hume, were dismissed yesterday and Wilby is now on his way to Seattle to answer charges in New York of larceny, said to involve \$275,984.

AFRICAN REHABILITATION

NAIROBI, (C)—A rehabilitation centre has been started in Kenya and is doing valuable work in helping East Africans who have been disabled in the war to overcome their handicaps.

Air Blows Knocking Up

R.A.F. Subjects Russian Ground Forces — twenty-first Day of Pre-Invasion Assault

NAPLES, May 5 (C)—Italy-based bombers of the Royal Air Force struck a blow Thursday night in support of Russian ground forces by attacking Budapest, capital of Hungary, hitting railway yards and causing two violent explosions and many fires.

American bombers hit German military installations in the Pas de Calais area of France today, opening the twenty-first day of Allied pre-invasion aerial assault after the Royal Air Force stumbled at Western Germany overnight.

Royal Canadian Air Force planes Thursday night laid mines in enemy waters. All returned safely.

NEW LANDINGS ARE MADE ON NEW GUINEA

ALLIED HEADQUARTERS IN NEW GUINEA, May 5 (C)—United States invasion forces on Netherlands New Guinea made lightly opposed amphibious landings a week ago at two points west of Hollandia.

LIMPLEY STOKE, Eng., (C)—Owners of 1,206 acres in beautiful Limpley Stoke Valley have made an agreement with Somerset County Council to preserve the land from any spoliation by building developments for 25 years.

Four Planes Six Minutes

LONDON, May 5 (C)—A mosquito, manned by two Royal Air Force men, destroyed four German planes Thursday night in six minutes during a sortie over Dijon, France. The time bettered the record of Squadron Leader Bob Kipp of Kamloops who got four on Tuesday night.

LONDON, (C)—Walter Grimaldi, superintendent registrar for the Edmonton registration district, conducted his 30,000th marriage ceremony at the registrar office here on Leap Year Day.

Danger of Inflation . . .

Holding the price ceiling imposed in Canada has been a hard struggle, for there has been steady pressure brought to bear tending to force up the cost of living, threatening the soundness of Canada's wartime economy.

This problem has provided worry for government authorities, and it should worry the ordinary individual, for the alternative to a fixed ceiling on prices is inflation with all its attendant dangers.

Canadians have recognized the need for keeping the economy on an even keel in order to maintain our war effort and to prepare for the postwar period. However, in this, the fifth year of war, it may be not unnatural that a sense of the individual responsibility for maintaining a stable economy should need restressing.

In the past, wars have brought with them a high cost of living, ending in inflation, which sapped the strength of nations and added poverty and injustice to the other tragedies of war. It is within the memory of many that inflation which followed the cessation of hostilities in the First Great War brought in its wake terrible suffering and hardship to some countries in Europe, and that many who, prior to the inflation period, were reasonably prosperous citizens and businessmen, went down to ruin under the situation that existed.

In Canada, during the First World War, prices rose 60 per cent between 1914 and 1919, while under the present ceiling price the rise in this Dominion, from 1939 to 1944, has only been 18 per cent. This successful effort on the part of Canada has been noted in other countries which have not waged such a successful fight against a higher cost of living.

Many changes connected with this battle to maintain the price ceiling and to ward off the threat to our cost of living, have been brought about since the start of the war, but all have had a related interdependence with regard to the stabilizing measures. These include price and wage control, profit limitations, taxation, rationing and saving.

In this war Canadians must head off the danger of inflation. Much has been done to avoid a repetition of the disastrous price rises of former wars. But we must continue to hold the line and not let history repeat itself.

Our young men are fighting for a Canada and a world in which all men can have faith, hope and security. Each of them wants to come back to a job—or a farm—with a future. We at home must keep secure for them a strong and stable foundation on which alone a postwar period of promise and achievement can be built.

Ford Troubles . . .

Few were surprised when the Ford Motor Company of Canada, Limited, shut down after the men walked off the job says the Windsor Star. Anyone who has been in touch with events has realized that trouble was brewing. It was only a matter of time until the differences would boil over.

The dismissal of a steward was not the real cause, it being merely the match which touched off the dynamite.

For a long time there has been a chip-on-the-shoulder spirit in the Ford plant. There has been a constant friction, an ever-present idea that someone was trying to gyp someone else. That has been an unhappy feeling and it has not made for good relations between management and employees. It has been common knowledge that trouble was not far beneath the surface.

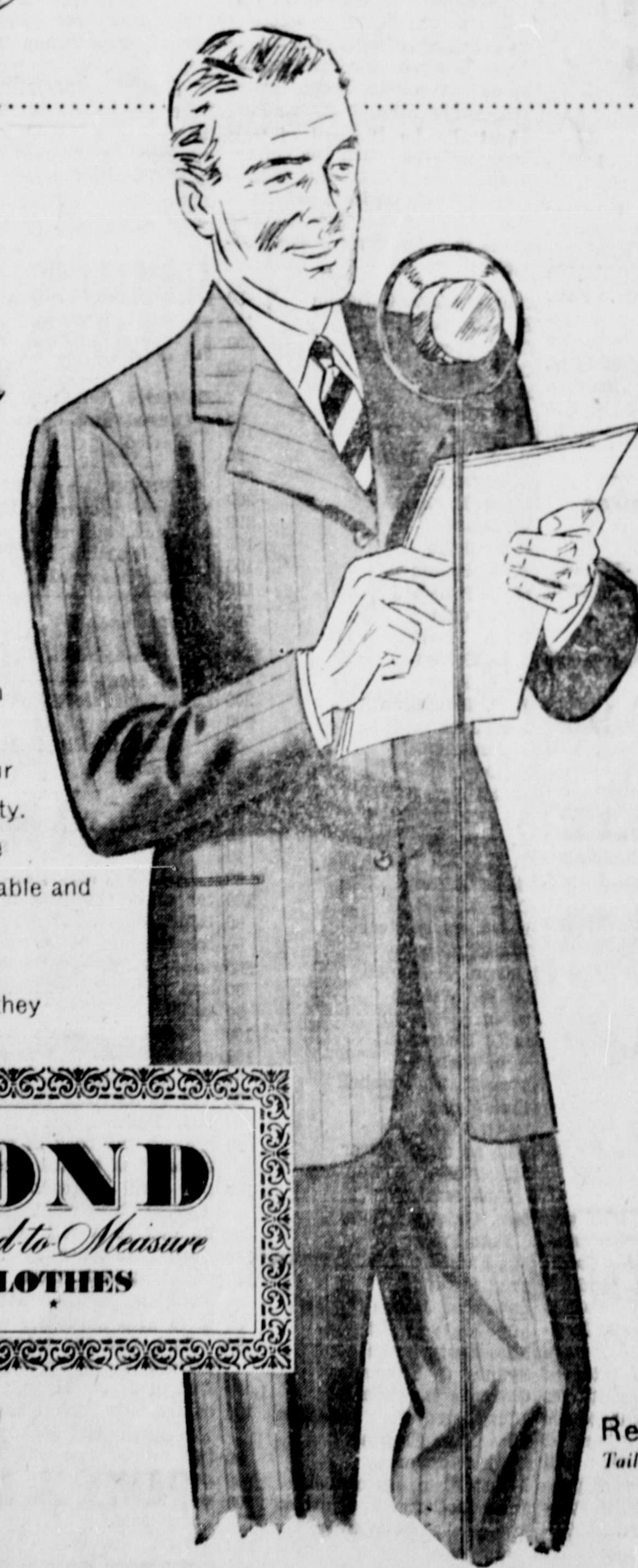

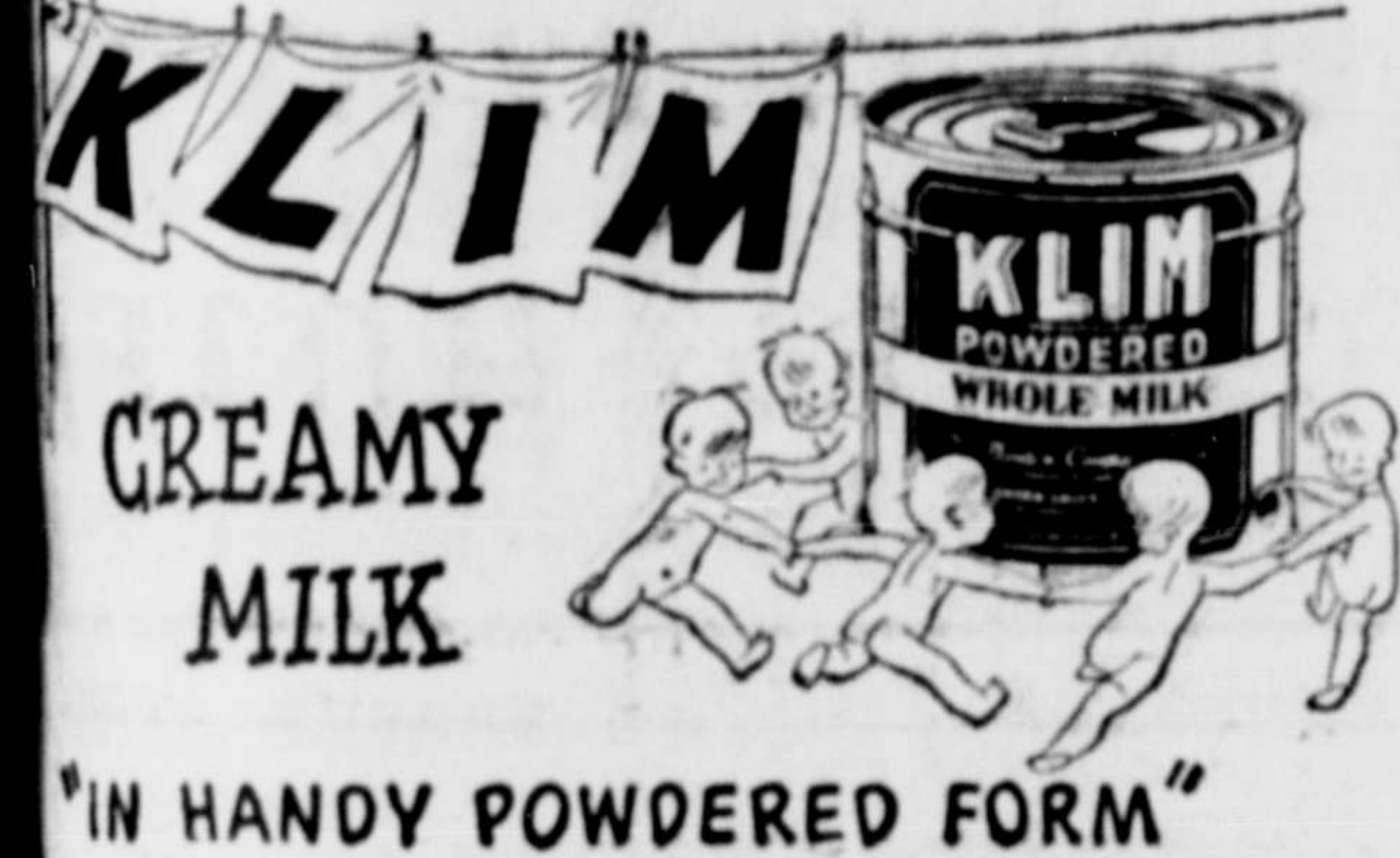

The Experts Say - - -

ASPARAGUS is the aristocrat of vegetables but it can become a poor relation if it is not treated properly. Asparagus ages very rapidly after cutting. It ages as it lies in the market and it shows its age by spreading tips and woody stalks.

The Consumer Section of the Agriculture Department suggests that if you want flavorful asparagus see that the stalks are fresh, firm and green and that the tips are compact and tender. The sooner it is used after cutting the better the flavor—but if you must keep asparagus a day or so, loosen the bunch, wash each stalk thoroughly, cut off the tough ends, remove the little scales which may hold grains of sand and wrap the stalks in waxed paper or put them in a covered dish in the refrigerator until ready to cook.

The big problems in cooking asparagus is to get the thick ends cooked without overcooking the tender tips. There are two ways of doing this. The stalks may be tied in bunches and cooked upright in the bottom of a double boiler, covering the tips with the top of the double boiler turned upside down. Have about two inches of water or enough to allow the tougher portions to boil in the water while the tender tips steam. The other way is to cut each stalk in two and cook the tougher ends 10 minutes, then add the tips and cook for five minutes. For this method use a small amount of water. Salt added during the cooking preserves the color.

SOUR MILK: Most food-wise housewives know what a special-ly good flavor sour milk gives to ginger bread and muffins.

But according to Dr. L. B. Pett of Nutrition Services, what some of them don't know is that sour milk keeps most of the nutritive value of fresh milk. This makes it double important to use up any sour milk on hand—for good eating and good health.

CARAMEL PIE: A sweet dessert which doesn't use up much precious sugar is a boon any day and this one from the Nutrition Bureau makes a double appeal because it includes plenty of health-giving milk.

Heat one third of a cup of sugar in a heavy pan until melted and golden brown. Stir in one third of a cup of boiling water and cook until the sugar is dissolved and the syrup slightly thickened—about five minutes. Beat three eggs slightly, add a quarter teaspoon of salt and a teaspoon of vanilla and gradually stir in two and a quarter cups of hot milk. Add caramel syrup, strain and pour into a nine-inch pie pan lined with uncooked pastry. Bake in hot oven, 450 degrees Fahrenheit, for 15 minutes. Then reduce the heat to 325 degrees and bake until the custard is set, about 25 minutes.

VITAMIN A VEGETABLES: Marion Harlow of Nutrition Services says that housewives can make a sound health investment and delight their hungry families by taking advantage of the yellow and green vegetables which are so rich in essential vitamin A. Carrots, sweet potatoes, squash and turnip, among the yellow vegetables, and spinach, cabbage, brussels sprouts, broccoli among the green, are all rich in vitamin A, which, unlike most vitamins, can be stored up in the body. 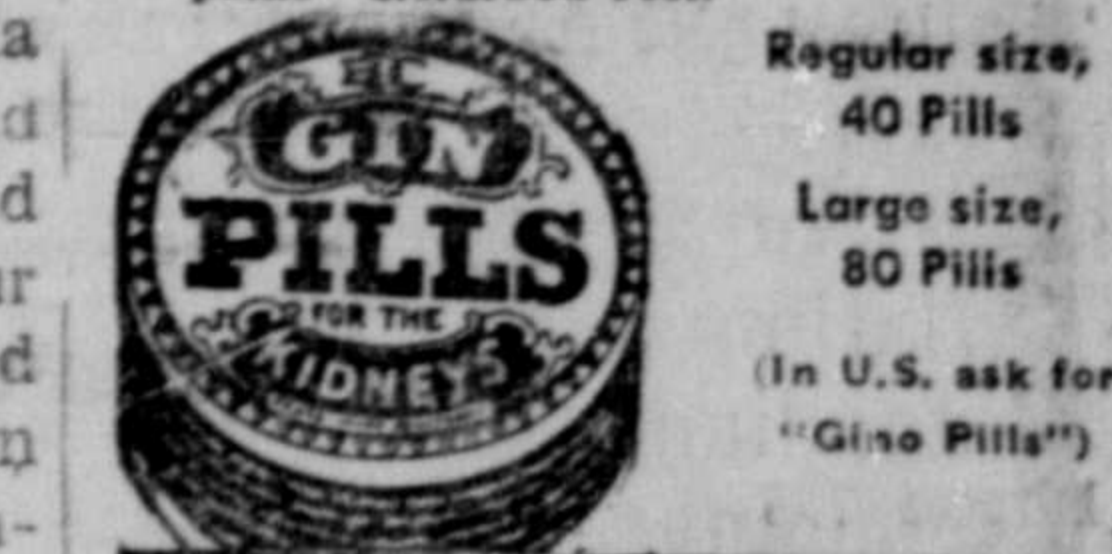
