R.A.F. BOMBERS BUSY

LONDON - Despite dismal weather, Royal Air Force mosquitoes hammered Hamburg, German seaport, Wednesday night. Other mosquitoes strafed Nazi transport from Utrecht to Arnheim in the Netherlands and near Dusseldorf in Germany. The mosquitoes blew up one convoy and set a train afire. American fighter-bombers destroyed 135 trucks, 56 locomotives, 35 oil tank cars and 15 coaches full of German troops on Wednesday.
