LONDON, Jan. 8 (9)-Britain mosquito bombers, raiding Germany for the sixth consecutive night, hit targets in the western Reich Friday without loss in the wake of a strong American daylight attack which Swedish reports said gave Ludwigshafen, the chemical city, a death blow, Mannheim also coming in for a pounding.

The Swedish reports said that hundreds of heavy bombers which drove deep into southwest Germany Friday bombed the I. G.
