LONDON, April 13 (CP) -The Russians in Crimea advanced forty-six miles in one day and are now only fortysix miles from Sebastapol, radio announced today. The entire Kerch Peninsula has been cleared of Nazis. The speed of the Soviet advance is indicated by the fact that Germans and Rumanians in the Crimea are withdrawing swiftly toward Sebastapol.

Other Russians have pushed deeper towards the north Rumanian oil fields with the capture of Falticeni.

Question of Japanese . . .

Except possibly for some who may be interested in a business way, the sentiment in British Columbia appears to be pretty generally in agreement with what was crystallized by the executive of the British Columbia Liberal Association in conference this week at Vancouver when it went on record as favoring not only the exclusion of Japanese as far as future settlement in Canada is concerned but also expulsion of Japanese from the country after the

That is the attitude of the people of this province today and, in view of the innate hostility of the MEN Japanese to us as it now appears evident exists not only during crisis of war but in days of peace, it seems to be quite the reasonable way to feel about these people with whom we were so long tolerant, believing at one time their protestations that they were good friends and neighbors of ours.

The question of the Japanese position in this country after the war is already receiving considerable attention. Public opinion appears definitely to be crystallizing against anything in the way of accepting them for reasons which would seem to be quite obvious.

Public Ownership . . .

Public ownership of utilities is also a moot question in the provincial field and the suggestion is made that the coalition government may include it as a Robert L. Eby plank in its next election platform. The government at Victoria seems to have been moving along this line of late and the fact that the British Columbia Liberal executive should put itself on record as favoring the policy indicates that the government may commit itself even more definitely before the election comes. Our Socialistic friends should be able to accept this policy so there should be no issue as far as they are concerned. However, there are some influences that are still by no means sold on the idea of public ownership and it is to be anticipated that there may not be entirely unanimous acceptance of the proposition.

It is well that the public men and the people Rodney Jones should be bringing the issue to the fore so that it may be thoroughly discussed.

Rationing in Canada . . .

"Rationing in Canada," says the Comox Free Press, "has never approached anything that could be Jack Mactie fairly described as 'belt-tightening.'
