New Island Landings In Marianas Made by Yanks

PEARL HARBOR, July 24 (CP)-United States forces have landed on Tinian Island in the Marianas group in the third amphibious move the Allies have made in the island group. There was light opposition and landings are continuing.

The landings were supported by land and carrier-based planes and naval and artillery fire, beachheads being firmly established.

The United States amphibious forces made further substantial advances on Guam and captured another village. They have secured beachheads with loss of only 1958 casualties in the first three days of land fighting.

WAR NEWS

PSKOV RECAPTURED

MOSCOW - Pskov, important gateway to Esthonia and last Russian city to be held by the Nazis, has been recaptured. The Red Army, continuing its drive in Poland, has reached the outskirts of Lwow and has also reached Lublin. Thirteen hundred more populated places have been taken by the Red Army as it heads for the Vistula river.

SITUATION WITHIN REICH

LONDON - Although Nazi propaganda sources declare that the uprising against Adolf Hitler has collapsed, neutral sources say that Heinrich Himmler has failed to capture many military leaders who are actually inciting troops at the front to revolt. The former head of the Reich home army is reported to have been executed.

ADVANCES IN IN NORMANDY

SHAEF-British, Canadian and American forces have all made advances in a sea of mud in Normandy.

HEAVY R.A.F. RAIDS

LONDON-Royal Air Force and Royal Canadian Air Force bombers have been concentrating on principal railway lines of the Nazis, destroying equipment and smashing track and bridges. There was a heavy attack on the naval base of Kiel last night.

MORE FLYING BOMBS






