## Handicaps Overcome — RE-ESTABLISHMENT of WAR DISABILITIES

In Canada there is an ex-service man who has lost both hands and who is a railway agent in a large Canadian railway city. There is another with a similar disability, who holds a position requiring the use of precision tools. Another has an important post in the testing department of a large Canadian industry. These are serious handicaps, but they have been overcome. Similar and lesser handicaps are being overcome every lay by those ex-service men and women prepared to help themselves.

### PLANS ARE COMPLETE

It was early in 1940 that Canada started preparations to ensure an opportunity for a full and productive future to those who lost some of their faculties as a result of war service. A special committee was set up to plan for the re-establishment of war casualties. Their plans have been made law and they are in full operation now.

### NO FINANCIAL WORRIES

To face the problem of re-establishment the wounded veteran must have peace of mind. He must know he is secure financially while recovering from injuries and that his family will not suffer hardship. Canada's plans take care of this. Any man or woman, discharged from the services in need of continuing treatment, and unable to work, has pay and allowances of rank continued for at least a year, if necessary, and longer if the disability is pensionable and if treatment is still beneficial.

HEALTH CENTRES Canada is providing health and occupational centres, in a restful country atmosphere, for those who need convalescent treatment for wounded nerves and wounded bodies. Five of these are being established across the Dominion.

## TRAINING IS A FEATURE

There is the widest possible opportunity for training to those in receipt of disability pensions. Their right to this training is continuous, and has no limitations of

time, such as apply in the case of the physically fit. In many cases, training commences in hospital as soon as medical authorities will permit.
