



The long promenade decks where peace-time passengers strolled have been cleared away and in their place are powerful davits supportting assault landing craft. It was from the "Prince Henry" and her sister ship, H.M.C.S. "Prince David" that assault landing craft, manned by Royal Canadian Navy personnel, were launched on "D"-Day to hurl the first wave of Canadian soldiers against the beaches of Normandy. Since that day the two ships have continued to land troops in France and to carry away the wounded and prisoners.
