The 365th day known as Year End Day and the 366th day in leap year will be world holidays called December W and June W -extra days inserted at the end

it coincides with the Gregorian calendar, Saturday, December 30, 1944 and Sunday, July 1, 1945 are the closest dates. Fourteen governments including China, Norway and six Central and South American countries have approved the World Calendar.

One of the noted exponents of calendar reform was the late Moses B. Cotsworth of Vancouver who propounded two different plans. He helped to prepare the international-13-month calendar publicized by the League of Nations Committee on calendar reform. After the League became less prominent he devised a 12-month year with a 36-day month and a six-day week, Saturday being dropped from the calendar.

So there you have three different schemes for organizing the length of time it takes the earth to travel around the sun. Any one of them would solve some of the problems of personal finance. Monthly incomes would not have to last 28 days one month and 31 days the next and the deadline for paying bills would not be subject to the vagaries of irregular month-

It's quite on the cards that calendar reform will have an important place in the post-war world in spite of man's instinctive regard for tradition and dislike of change. The superstitious may even have to survive four Fridays the thirteenth.





# Fish 'n Chips



Next time serve golden brown fillets with French fried potatoes for an out-of-the-ordinary party dish

Expecting company, and ration coupons scarce? Well they'll all go for this Old Country "poor man's feast." Almost any lake or deep-sea fish (fresh or frozen) is good this way. The secrets of success are:

- 1 Use a deep enough pan:
- 2 Use a frying basket if you can: 3 Use a high-smoke-point fat
- ::: Blended Jewel is excellent: 4 Have the fat really hot. A cube of day-old bread should brown in the fat in 60 seconds:

Fry the fish first. To do this divide into fillets of convenient size (6" x 3" x 1/4" is ideal): Wipe with a clean dry cloth:

Dredge with seasoned flour. Dip into diluted well-beaten egg (1 tsp. water per egg). Then roll in fine breadcrumbs. Place as many fillets in your frying basket as it will hold without overlapping and lower into hot fat. (If you have no frying basket use a spatula). Fry for three to four minutes, turning once. Drain over the fat, then complete draining of fillets on absorbent paper in a warm place.

While fish is cooking, first parboil potatoes (8 minutes) then peel and cut into fingers. Wipe dry. Fry in basket for 5 minutes or until brown. Drain, sprinkle with salt and serve. Strain fat into a clean dry tin to use again.

# Apply NOW for your new Gasoline Ration Books

On and after April 1, no graded gasoline will be sold except upon the presentation of a 1944-45 ration coupon book.

To assure themselves sufficient gasoline to carry on normal business activities after March 31, operators of commercial vehicles are urged to complete at once and in detail the required application for each of their vehicles. By co-operating in this way, they will help to reduce to a minimum any delay in issuing new gasoline licenses and ration coupon books.

The operation of the 1944-45 gasoline rationing

plan is basically the same as that now in effect. After investigation, an allowance will be fixed for each commercial vehicle. This allowance will be measured to the essential wartime needs of the vehicle.

On and after April 1, service station attendats will not accept gasoline ration coupons unless the license plate number of the motor vehicle for which they were issued is written in ink on each coupon. With the 1944-45 gasoline license, a new windshild sticker, bearing the letter "T", will be issued. Until this sticker is affixed, no gasoline may be purchased for the vehicle.

### PROCEDURE TO BE FOLLOWED BY APPLICANT FOR "COMMERCIAL" CATEGORY

Every commercial vehicle operator must obtain a separate gasoline license and ration coupon book for each commercial vehicle in operation, and must file a separate application for each such vehicle. Here is how he obtains his gasoline license and ration coupon book or books:

- He secures his 1944 vehicle license plate and/or permit.
- 2 He secures an application form from his nearest Post Office.
- 3 He fills out this form, answering every question completely and accurately.
- 4 He has this form properly endorsed.

- 5 He sends by mail to the nearest Regional Oil Control Office his application, his motor vehicle registration permit and a \$1 registration fee. (The fee of \$1 must accompany each appli-
- 6 He will receive, after a week or more during which his application is carefully investigated, his gasoline license and ration coupon book or books, and his motor vehicle registration permit will be returned.
- 7 He should write in ink on each coupon the license plate number of the motor vehicle.
