PEARL HARBOR, July 29 (9)-American forces thrusting into Jap-occupied Guam advanced 800 yards to two miles along the entire beachhead after nearly doubling the enemy losses by slaughtering 2000 counterattacking Japanese.

Invasion of Tinian, 130 miles to the north, by other U.S. marine units turned into a Jap rout. Marines captured eight square miles as the Nipponese garrison of that island fled in disorder.




