# The War Service Gratuity and Reestablishment Credit-

## OTHER BENEFITS AT THE TIME OF DISCHARGE

When the time comes to leave the armed forces, the man or woman in uniform faces a new world. It is a world which has changed in the time they have been serving. For many there will be a choice of many roads, and they will need time in which to make their decision. They will need security also during this period.

The people of Canada, through Parliament, have said that Canada's men and women must have this security and in no country in the world have the wishes of the people been heeded so fully. Canada's veterans will have opportunity and help in making their choice of a lifetime occupation.

#### THE WAR SERVICE GRATUITY

Passed at the last session of Parliament, this provided monthly payments to those honorably discharged who have enlisted for service in any theatre of war and to those who saw service in the Aleutian Islands for their period of service there.

#### HOW MUCH IS IT?

There is a basic gratuity of \$7.50 for each thirty days' service in the Western Hemisphere and \$15.00 for each thirty days' service overseas. A supplementary gratuity of seven days' pay and allowances of rank, with Canadian subsistence or lodging and provision allowance, is paid for each six months of service overseas.

#### WHAT IS OVERSEAS SERVICE?

Service in Greenland, Iceland, the Aleutian Islands and any other theatre of war, is overseas service. Being in the Western Hemisphere, service in Bermuda and Newfoundland is not. Air crew, flying outside Canadian territorial waters, or stationed outside Canada or the United States, and naval personnel, serving anywhere in seagoing ships of war, are regarded as being on overseas SETVICE:

#### WHEN IS IT PAID?

The Act is to come into force January 1, 1945, unless proclaimed earlier. Monthly payments, not exceeding monthly pay and allowances last received, will start after that time and will continue until full payment is made.

HOW TO GET IT Application, for those still serving, will be made at the time of discharge. Arrangements are being made for those already in civilian life to make their applications to the service in which they last served.

#### DEPENDENTS MAY CLAIM IT

There is provision in the Act for dependents of those who die in service, or of those who die before payment is made or completed, to make application for the gratuity.

#### RE-ESTABLISHMENT CREDIT

In addition to the war service gratuity, a re-establishment credit is set up for exservice people who are eligible for the gratuity. It can be applied for at any time in the ten years following discharge, and is intended especially for those who do not take advantage of training, education or of benefits under the Veterans' Land Act.

It is an amount equal to \$7.50 for every thirty days' service in the Western Hemisphere and \$15.00 for every thirty days' service overseas.

#### HOW CAN IT BE USED?

HOW MUCH IS IT?

It may be used for the purchase of a home, of furniture, of a business, of tools of trade, or for the payment of premiums under any insurance scheme established by the Government of Canada. This does not include private companies. It can be used for modernization or repair of a home,

for working capital of a business or profession, and for purchase of instruments or tools for training or education. Provision is made also to authorize. its use for other constructive purposes.

#### EFFECT OF OTHER GRANTS

If assistance is given under training and educational provisions, or under the Veterans' Land Act, the credit is reduced by the amount of this assistance. If the credit is used, training, education and benefits under the Veterans' Land Act cannot be granted until an adjustment has been made. PAYMENTS UNDER THE RE-ESTABLISH-MENT CREDIT WILL NOT COMMENCE UNTIL THE ACT HAS BEEN PROCLAIMED. DETAILS AS TO THE MANNER OF MAKING APPLICATION WILL BE GIVEN IN THE PRESS AT THAT TIME.

#### OTHER DISCHARGE BENEFITS

Before leaving the service, every man and woman is interviewed by a Veterans' Welfare Officer, and the details of the re-establishment programme are explained. They get a complete medical and dentai examination and are eligible for free treatment after discharge for anything which this examination shows to be necessary.

They are allowed to retain one uniform and certain other items of service clothing.

To purchase civilian clothing, they receive a clothing allowance of \$100.00. This is paid to all ranks discharged since August 1, 1944. If they have 183 days' service, and receive an honourable discharge, they are paid a rehabilitation






