NOW IN ROME

LONDON-Bomb-scarred Cologne received another R.A.F. pounding last night. The Mosquito attack brought to eighteen the number of aerial assaults carried out in October against the German stronghold. The city lies twenty miles behind the Western Front.

### British In Salonika

ROME-British patrols in Greece have reached the important poet city of Salonika. Earlier reports told of British and Greek troops within seven miles of the YugoSlav border. The Germans have evacuated Salonika.

### Mopping Up Antwerp

LONDON-The Canadian First Army continues the costly job of mopping up the last German strongholds blocking the port of Antwerp. Today's reports say the Germans are fighting fiercely on the causeway linking south Beveland and Walcheren islands in the Schelde Estuary. The line of the river mark has been reached and crossings have been made due north of Oudenbosch on the main road to Dordecht. Allied forces have reached the Meause River and have taken three more villages.

### Improve Italian Bridgehead

ROME—British Eighth Army troops fighting in Italy have improved their brideghead across the Ronco River south of the vital enemy stronghold of Forli, and today's communique says the Germans have been cleared from a town on the west bank of the river. Forli is on the lateral road between Bologna and Ribini.

### Russians Nearing Budapest

MOSCOW-Russian troops are within forty-three miles of the Hungarian capital of Budapest. Street fighting is meantime reported to be going on in the large Hungarian city of Kecskemet. Two hundred Hungarian villages and towns have been swept up in the newest Russian advances, and more than four thousand German and Hungarian troops have been taken prisoner.

### Battle of Philippines

MacARTHUR'S HEADQUARTERS-A battle seeems to be shaping up for the important north coast village of Carigara on the island of Leyte in the Philippines. Two Allied columns are closing in on the town and enemy reinforcements are being thrown into the sector. Allied troops have cleared the rest of Leyte Valley of organized resistance. Tokyo puts out the report this morning that Japanese assault troops have landed on the north coast of Peleliu. This is an island in the southern Palau group which has been conquered by Allied forces. The Palau islands are about five hundred miles east of the Philippines.

### Bolstering Up Chinese

WASHINGTON-It is disclosed that President Roosevelt has been making an attempt to strengthen the Chinese war effort under the leadership of Generalissimo Chiang Kai Shek. Mr. Roosevelt has revealed that Major Genral Patrick Hurley, his Special Envoy, is still in China. It is understood that Hurley was originally sent to China to step up the war effort there and to get Chiang to co-operate with the Chinese Communists. It is pointed out that since Hurley is still in China, he may have achieved a certain measure of success.

### Japs Menace Kweilin

CHUNGKING-Kweilin is further menaced by the Japanese who have crossed a final natural barrier river and entered the suburbs of the city.

LONDON-First Lord of Admiralty A. V. Alexander said today that 31 enemy warships and transports and forty smaller craft had been sunk off Greece in six weeks. Most of them were carrying German troops.

# Canadians Land-Go Ashore

### Are Assaulting Last Nazi Gun Positions Blocking Port of Antwerp

LONDON, Nov. 1 (2) - Allied amphibious forces have landed on the south shore of Walcheren Island in the Dutch Schelde estuary and are assaulting the last Nazi gun positions blocking the sea lane to Antwerp, a German communique said today. The German radio said the landing was made by British and Canadian forces with numerous assault barges and amphibious tanks.

A late dispatch just in from Canadian Press war correspondent Ross Munro says the Canadians have gained a foothold on Teisland on the island of Walcheren.

Meanwhile to the east Canadians fought across a narrow to Walcheren from South Beveland Front dispatches said the Canadians were still some yards short of actually fighting on to Walcheren.

South of the Meuse River the First Canadian and Second British Armies struggled through knee-deep mud in pursuit o. over th Germans escaping river behind a screen of stubborn rearguard actions. Al field dispatches indicated that the Germans had generally succeeded in escaping the Allied trap.

On American sectors of the western front activity is con fined to local actions.

LONDON, Nov. 1 (P)-There are immediate indications that the Commons will string along with Churchill in approving retention of the nine-year old coalition government until victory achieved.

Arthur Greenwood, prominent n Labor Party councils, endors ed the extension of the prolongation of Parliament for a year but he served notice that Churchill government would no be free from controversy in coming months. Greenwood said that Labor would oppose extension of the coalition government until Japan is defeated. He argued it would be against the nationa. interest to prolong Parliamen until Japan is defeated.

### \$1,300,000,000

OTTAWA-The Seventh Victery Loan aimed at a minimum objective of \$1,300,000,000 is nearing the haliway mark of the three week campaign. Official returns up to Monday night totalled more than \$501,000,000, while Tuesday's sales were expected to raise this figure to around \$575,000,-000. The armed services hope to go over their \$40,800,000 objective today.

### NO MORE BONDS

LONDON -- The British Chancellor of the Exchequer, Sir John Anderson, has announced in the House of Commons that the sale of national war bonds will be discontinued in Britain after November 6. Sir John said that, starting November 7, a new security will be on sale. He said that the total national debt at September 39 3 apr proximately £21,200,000, an increase of nearly 13 billion dollars since the beginning of the war.

### SHIPS FOR PACIFIC

OTTAWA- At least 87 ships now being built in Canadian yards are likely to see action in the Pacific. A munitions department spokesman in Ottawa says that 21 maintenance vessels, 50 transport vessels and 16 coastal cargo ships now are under construction. "Eating utensils should be scraped and rinsed before washing. The water for washing dishes by hand should be at 110 and 120 degrees Fahrenheit, or as hot as the hand can stand. In a dish-washing machine, the U.S. public health service advises that the water should be 140 degrees Fahrenheit. After being washed in hot water, the utensils should be rinsed in a chlorine solution or in water at 170 degrees Fahrenheit for at least 15 seconds. Hot dishes will drain by themselves. If wiped by hand, the towels must be absolutely clean, or they will add to the bacteria on the dishes. Utensils should never be put away! wet."




MONTREAL, Nov. 1 - Em ployees of the Canadian National Railways passed the six million dollar mark in the first week or the Seventh Victory Loan campaign it was announced today. The total for the railway and subsidiaries-\$6,103,250-is more than two-thirds of the amount subscribed by the system's employees in the Sixth Victory Loan which established a Canadian record.

BUY BONDS

During the first week 53,595 employees subscribed for bonds to the total of \$6,103,250, as com pared with 53,202 employees for a total of \$5,097,450 in the first week of the Sixth Loan. There was a substantial increase in the individual amount subscribea. the average subscription in the first week of the current loan being \$113.87 against \$95.81 in the opening week of the Sixth Loan.

Employees of the railway to the number of 50,432 subscribea \$5,717,100 TransCanada Air Line employees numbering 2,450 made purchases totalling \$286,150, while 703 employees of National Railways Munitions Ltd subsscribed \$100,000.

At the end of the first week of the Seventh Victory Loan campaign, employees of the Western region had subscribed 43 percent of their quota and were from 35 to 40 percent ahead of
