## POINT OF CIVIL WAR IS HEARD

### What Goes On Within Germany Is Question of Day Now

#### WARG VETERAN RE-ENLISTS IN ARMY

**Forms All, Ship Men Over**

Eighteen-year-old Edward Fines Back in Uniform After Having Already Been Overseas

A veteran of the Canadian army at the time he was 17, with a year of active service—part of it spent overseas—behind him, Edward James Fines is enlisting again after a year's interval.

He has applied for enlistment through the Prince Rupert recruiting station, and will leave for the Vancouver reception centre on Monday night.

In March, 1942, Edward joined the famous Princess Pat's Canadian Light Infantry in Winnipeg, and after a training period was sent overseas. In March, 1943, he was returned to Canada and was retired from the army at the ripe age of 16 years, 10 months.

He has been waiting out the interval until he reached the acceptable military age of 18 years working as a welder at the dry dock here.

His home is at Gunton, Manitoba.

Also leaving to join the active army on Monday night is Clarence Louis Campion, 18, who came to Prince Rupert from Saskatoon to work as a steel caulker at the dry dock. His mother, Mrs. Clarence Campion, lives at Marquis, Saskatchewan.

#### PROSPERITY FACTOR—IMPORTANCE OF TOURISTS

**Victoria Alderman Makes Suggestions to Local Rotary Club**

The tourist industry after the war will be an important factor in the prosperity of any community and Prince Rupert, for its own benefit, should become tourist-minded and follow the example of Victoria in establishing a live and well-conducted publicity bureau. This suggestion was made at yesterday's luncheon of the Prince Rupert Rotary Club by Ald. E. Williams of Victoria who was the speaker of the day. So greatly did the city of Victoria appreciate the function of the publicity bureau that it had supported it with an annual grant of \$25,000, this reduced to \$7000 per year in order to keep the organization alive during the war and ready to function fully again once that normal peacetime travel could be resumed.

Mr. Williams, whose talk was of an informal nature, recalled how he had visited Prince Rupert in March 1908 in the course of a trip to the Queen Charlotte Islands and had not been here since. It was a thrill for him to come back here now and find the community which he had seen in birth having become a thriving city which surely must grow further in progress and prosperity. He emphasized the importance of the development of a community spirit among the men of the calibre of those to be found in the Rotary Club and such organizations. He advised the Rotary Club to take active interest in civic affairs.

The Rotary Club decided to vote \$50 to the Pioneers' Home Fund with the suggestion that, when the new home was built, it might contain some furnishings with Rotary markings.

President R. C. St. Clair was in the chair at yesterday's luncheon and several guests included Dr. R. E. Foerster and Dr. A. L. Pritchard of Nanaimo, Col. Roxborough, William Stapleton, William Brasler and Arthur Atherton of Vancouver, M. H. Green of Victoria and Arthur Brooksbank, Archie Thompson and R. G. Birch of Prince Rupert.

#### Revolution Has Burst Forth, Says One Report--Fuehrer Orders Purge

LONDON, July 21 (CP)—Broken communications today cloaked the possible initial stages of civil war within Adolf Hitler's Reich. Heinrich Himmler, ace hangman, apparently has thrown his Gestapo into the task of purging all persons sympathetic with army officers who, Hitler said, tried to kill him.

Stockholm reports said that storm troop units were marching to Berlin to maintain order. The "Atlantic Radio," believed to be operating inside Germany, declared "revolution has burst forth in Germany and part of the eastern army is deserting and returning from the front."

The official German radio tonight said that Field Marshal von Kluge, in an order to his French command, underlined what he called "absolute necessity for loyalty to Hitler." The order said there would be no repetitions of 1918 or of the example set by Italy. Highest former German military quarters were, apparently, involved in the plot against Hitler. The German TransOcean radio named one plotter as Col. General Ludwig Beck, former chief of German staff. Beck was declared by the Berlin radio to be "no longer among the living."

**COMMUNICATIONS ARE CUT OFF**

LONDON, July 21—What is happening within Germany is a burning question but there are signs of an internal deterioration such as marked the closing days of the First Great War. To head it off another purge has been commenced and it is said a plot against Hitler has been put down.

Telephone communications between Berlin and neutral points was cut off last night. D.N.B. warned its subscribers to be ready for an important announcement.

Berne, Switzerland, gave out the sensational report that there was fighting between storm troopers and the regular army. Zurich said that a movement to overthrow Hitler was under way in many parts.

London heard that Vice-Chancellor Herman Goering had told all Air Force officers to check up carefully on all orders which might appear doubtful.

Adolf Hitler, in a hysterical six-minute speech last night, accused a group of officers of trying to assassinate him. Col. Count Graf von Stauffenberg was personally accused of inspiring a movement against Hitler and himself planting the bomb from the explosion of which the Fuehrer escaped with his life. Some of the ringleaders, it was said, had already been shot or had committed suicide. These included Stauffenberg. It was a crime without example in German history, said Hitler, for which ambitious, criminal and stupid officers were responsible. They would be completely exterminated.

Herman Goering and Admiral Doenitz reaffirmed their loyalty to Hitler. Heinrich Himmler has been placed in charge of the home front air force.

Hitler declared that a group of army officers had planned to assassinate him and prepare for surrender as in 1918. The plot had failed but Hitler and other speakers, in the unprecedented broadcast, made it obvious that Germany was confronted with a major internal crisis if not wide-spread revolt against the Nazi regime.

Thirteen of Hitler's personal military staff were injured in the explosion and Hitler disclosed that one of them had died.

Hitler declared that he was taking steps to exterminate the usurpers and a subsequent official announcement said the men who planted the bomb was Count von Stauffenberg who had been shot. Other ringleaders in the plot had been executed or had committed suicide.

#### NEW UNION IS FORMED

**Shipwrights, Joiners and Caulkers Organized Here**

A meeting of the Shipwrights, Joiners and Caulkers' Industrial Union was held last night to organize a local union in the Prince Rupert Dry Dock under the banner of the Shipyard General Workers Federation of British Columbia.

The Prince Rupert Labor Council was represented by President D. A. Careless who offered a few words of welcome to the new union into the fold of the Canadian Congress of Labor.

The new local was presented with their charter by Harley Lewis, Prince Rupert executive member of the Shipyard General Workers' Federation, who congratulated the members of the new local in their decision to contribute toward the advancement of organizing the shipbuilding industry on an industrial basis.

Officers were elected as well as delegates to various other organizations. The new union is the third local in the local shipyard now affiliated with the shipyard General Workers' Federation of B. C., the other unions being the Boilermakers' and Machinists' which represent well over half of the workers in the yard.

The official name of the new local will be "Shipwrights, Joiners and Caulkers' Industrial Union, Local No. 2."

#### WAR NEWS

**RUSSIANS SEAL FATE OF LWOW**

MOSCOW—Soviet forces seized a stranglehold today on the Germans' Baltic front deep inside Lithuania, hurled a massive blow toward Warsaw and sealed the fate of the Nazi stronghold of Lwow. For 60 miles along the Bug river the Red army scored new gains. Large German forces in the Baltic have been imperilled by Russian thrusts.

**FLYING BOMBS CONTINUE**

LONDON—Flying bombs continued to thunder over the London area and southern England today after a night bombardment previous to which there had been an eight-hour lull in assaults. Casualties and damage were reported.

**ALLIES ADVANCE IN NORMANDY**

ALLIED SUPREME HEADQUARTERS—The Allies captured the town of St. Andrew-sur-Orne, three and a half miles south of Caen today. The British captured Noyers and fighting continued in the streets of Evreux.

**YANKS ENTER PISA**

ROME—American patrols have reached the outskirts of Pisa. Further gains are being made by the Allies north of both Leghorn and Ancona. Notable progress is being made by the Polish units of the Eighth Army on the Adriatic coast.

#### Terry Fortune Is 'Mentioned'

OTTAWA, July 21—Petty Officer Terry Fortune of Prince Rupert is mentioned in dispatches as a member of the personnel of H.M.C.S. Wakeful at the time the Canadian frigate sank a German u-boat. Lieutenants J. P. Fraser and J. H. Lincoln are awarded the Distinguished Service Order.

#### ROOSEVELT'S ACCEPTANCE

President of United States Speaks from Pacific Coast to Chicago Convention

CHICAGO, July 21—In a broadcast speech from a Pacific Coast naval base to the Democratic national convention here, President Franklin D. Roosevelt last night formally accepted the precedent-smashing fourth term nomination. The acceptance he said, was based entirely on a sense of obligation.

#### RAIN SLOWS UP ALLIED ADVANCE

SHAERF, July 21—Heavy rains during the past 36 hours have turned the Normandy front into a sloppy, muddy mess which has slowed down armored movements. However, in the Caen sector the Canadians and British troops are still advancing in the face of the heaviest resistance. The advance in one sector has paused while German machine gun nests are cleaned out, while in another the Canadians have made the deepest penetration along the front, a distance of eight miles southeast of Caen.

#### Henry Wallace Is Going Strong

CHICAGO, July 21—Henry Wallace was making a strong bid today for the Democratic vice-presidential renomination. In early caucuses Wallace showed great strength. Harry Truman appears to be the principal contender and it is still a real fight.

**STILL SEEKING PREMIER**  
TOKYO—Army and Navy chiefs conferred all day yesterday with a view to choosing a successor to Premier Tojo but failed to reach a decision.

**MCGEER AMENDMENT REJECTED**  
OTTAWA—Amendments to the Bank Act proposed by G. G. McGeer Vancouver-Burrard and A. G. Slaght, Parry Sound, Ontario, were rejected in the banking committee.

**NO FAIR UNTIL 1946**  
VANCOUVER—There can be no Canadian Pacific Exhibition at Vancouver before 1946, it is announced.

**NANAIMO BUILDS SHIPS**  
NANAIMO—The first 114-foot R.C.A.F. supply ship to be built here was launched yesterday.

**RETURN ITALIAN PROVINCES**  
ROME—Rome and two other provinces of liberated Italy are being returned to the Italian government as from August 15. Naples is retained for the time being owing to its importance as a supply port.

**SCHMELING KILLED**  
LONDON—Max Schmeling, former world's heavyweight boxing champion, is reported to have been killed in Normandy while serving with German parachute troops.

**NOT BEING EVICTED**  
VANCOUVER—Houseboat dwellers at the foot of Denham st. may be permitted to remain there until next spring it is announced.

#### Peace River Wife Murder Is Charged

FORT ST. JOHN, July 21—Posses are searching near here for Phillip Durocher, aged 35, Indian woodcutter, guide and trapper, charged with murder of his wife, Shirley M. Durocher, who was found in a wood yard with her throat cut.

Police said the couple had been living apart but had become reconciled several days ago.

Two small children survive.

#### Must Stretch Butter Coupons

Butter coupons 70 and 71 which came due yesterday will have to be stretched to last three weeks, instead of two, according to a Prices Board ruling which delays the valid date of coupons 72 and 73 from August 3 to August 10.

Reason for the valid date of the next coupons being put back is that butter stores in the country are down about 5,000,000 pounds under the level considered sufficient for the winter period when production is low.

A similar extension of a coupon last spring was successful in bringing up to a safe level butter stocks which had dropped 5,400,000 pounds.

Heavy export shipments of butter are responsible for the present reduced supply, and the reduction must be made up during the summer months.

#### GERMAN TROOPS BLOW UP LWOW

MOSCOW, July 21—Russian armies closing in on the Polish railway centre of Lwow can hear the sound of big explosions within the city, as the Germans destroy buildings and installations. The Russians are closing from three sides on what once was a key German transport bastion on the eastern front, and troops in the city are in danger of being cut off. Only a slender neck of German-held territory connects Lwow with the main body of the Nazi army.

#### Expected Here From Overseas

Mr. and Mrs. A. E. Thomas, 909 Eleventh Avenue East, are expecting to welcome back home from overseas soon Gunner Chris Hellen Anderson who, after service overseas with the Seaforth's in North Africa and Italy campaigns, has been invalided back to Canada. Gunner Anderson, writing to Mr. and Mrs. Anderson with whom he made a "second home," said he might surprise them soon and a dispatch in the Daily News on Tuesday indicated that he was approaching Prince Rupert.

He was wounded in the foot while in action about Christmas and has also been suffering from Malaria.

Gunner Anderson, son of Mr. and Mrs. Chris Anderson of Woodside Farm, Manitoba, worked at Surf Point mine, Porcher Island, before the war, enlisting in 1939. A brother, Diver, was killed a few years ago at Dawson.

#### Interior Man Is Dead In Action

A Vanderhoof man, Lance-Corporal Andrew James Finnie, has been killed in action while serving with the Canadian Army overseas, according to the latest casualty list released today.

Lance-Corporal Finnie was killed while serving with a British Columbia regiment. His next-of-kin is listed as his wife, Mrs. Margaret E. Finnie, of Vanderhoof.

Listed as wounded while serving with an Alberta regiment is Private William Kruger, whose father, Frank Kruger, lives at Hudson Hope, B.C.

#### Eric Orme Now Pilot Officer

Eric Orme, youngest son of Mr. and Mrs. C. H. Orme, now home on leave after completing air training with the Royal Canadian Air Force, has won his commission as a pilot officer and is being congratulated by his many young friends.

#### Railway Chief Is Visitor Here

W. R. Devenish, vice-president in charge of western lines, Canadian National Railways, Winnipeg, arrived in the city on last night's train from the East, being here on an inspection visit to the company's local properties. He is accompanied by W. T. Moodie, general superintendent for British Columbia with headquarters at Vancouver. They will be here until the end of the week when they will proceed to Vancouver.

**CONGRATULATIONS TO SALVATION ARMY**

The Salvation Army, whose auxiliary service war work in Prince Rupert has gone on unobtrusively and largely without the flare of publicity, is to be appreciatively congratulated in connection with the establishment of the fine new seamen's club which was officially opened on Wednesday afternoon. As was appropriately enough said by the speakers on the dedicatory occasion, it meets a need which was really badly felt here and fills it adequately indeed. Men of the merchant navy will now have an opportunity at Prince Rupert of spending pleasant leisure hours amid comfortable, wholesome and home-like surroundings—easily accessible and splendidly appointed. It is an institution such as which will make Prince Rupert a pleasant place for the men who go down to the sea in ships to visit instead of a port with a bad name, a desolate an inhospitable place to be shunned.

The new seamen's home was conceived primarily for the benefit of the men of the United States merchant navy but it is to be hoped that the facility will also be available for Canadian merchant navy men as well as those of other merchant navies which may possibly have occasion to visit here in the future.

**BEATEN BUT DANGEROUS**

Daily from within the enemy nations come portentous signs of grave internal crisis. This was well illustrated for both the senior axis powers yesterday. In Germany there is a bombing plot against Adolf Hitler, the Feahrer narrowly escaping assassination. In Japan there is a complete administrative shake-up with admission of desperation insofar as success in the war is concerned.

Soon we may expect the most determined compromise peace offensives of the war from Germany and Japan. Such moves would, of course, be full of treachery but, happily, there appears to be little disposition on the part of the Allies to relax from their resolve for unconditional surrender.

**LOCAL BOY "MENTIONED"**

It is a pleasure for the Daily News to join in the congratulations their many friends are extending to Mr. and Mrs. Theo Fortune, popular pioneer residents, in view of the announcement today that their son, Petty Officer Terry Fortune, has been mentioned in dispatches for the part he played as a member of the personnel of the Canadian Frigate H.M.C.S. Wakesiu in the recent exploit of sinking a German U-boat in the North Atlantic.

Terry was one of the boys of the local Royal Canadian Naval Volunteer Reserve unit who went into active service on the outbreak of war and he has now had a long and meritorious record of service as recognized by the honor which has been conferred upon him by being "mentioned." He spent all his life here and was a budding local radio announcer during the pioneer days of station CFPR.

**IMPORTANCE OF HEALTH RECOGNIZED**

The announcement by the Prime Minister of Canada that there will be established in the dominion government a department of national health and welfare will meet with general approval throughout Canada.

It is significant that in many of the most progressive countries of the world it has been considered essential that there be a minister of health. Notably this is true in New Zealand, which seems to be a world leader both in health services and low mortality rates. Similarly in Great Britain and Belgium there are ministers of health. In Australia there is a minister of health and social service. In France before the war there was a minister of family and health. In Russia there is a powerful people's commissariat of health. In other countries there are ministers of health which suggest other allied objectives in their titles. This is true in Brazil, Bolivia, Nicaragua, Paraguay, Peru and Newfoundland.

In the United States, although there is not as yet a secretary of health in the cabinet, there is the United States public health service with far-reaching federal powers.

It is most significant that there are three great countries in which one fails to find the term "health" in connection with any ministry. These are Germany, Italy and Spain.

Benjamin Disraeli—great prime minister of the last century—stated that the first duty of the statesman is the care of the public health. That Canada will establish a ministry of national health and welfare means that the dominion recognizes the true ideal of statesmanship. Had we dropped the term, it would have implied less attention to health. That we have retained it is a guarantee of our sincerity in our stated ideal of better health for all of the people.

**Tense Football On Hill Tonight**

A situation dear to the hearts of all sports fans will exist tonight on the Acropolis grounds when the Navy and Signals football teams meet in what might turn out to be the final game in the Gullyby cup series. It will be the final if the Navy team win it. It will be a semi-final if Signals are victorious. Leading up to this situation were three games of which Navy won two, one from Reserves, and one from Signals. Signals also took one from Reserves, and in order to get a crack at the Gullyby cup they must take tonight's game.

**High-Toned Soprano Sax In Band Here**

This is the third of a series of articles on people in Prince Rupert who have become proficient on uncommon musical instruments.

Music of the Royal Canadian Navy band of H.M.C.S. Chatham has recently been embellished by one of the least-known members of the saxophone family, the soprano.

Played by Bandman Albert Darch, this high-toned instrument has been used as a substitute for a flute which is not found in the "Chatham" organization.

Darch, whose brother, Leslie, plays oboe in the band, shows his versatility by handling clarinet and alto sax in addition to the soprano.

Much smaller than the alto, the soprano sax is occasionally used for solo work by big-time dance orchestras but it is seldom found in brass bands.

On all types of saxes Darch has played for 11 years. He started studying the soprano at the age of nine and took up the alto a year later.

Until a few months ago he had scarcely touched the small reed instrument for three years but he renewed his interest in it when it became apparent that the soprano would be a valuable addition to the band's woodwind section.

When only 11 years of age Darch joined the Canadian Legion band in his home town of Bowmanville, Ontario, playing alto sax. During his first few months in the Navy, at Toronto, he played clarinet only, however.

### The Experts Say - - -

**CHOCOLATE ICE-BOX CAKE:** A certain amount of left-over food is inevitable in the best-run household, but here is good news from the Agriculture Department Section which shows how left-over portions of cake or cookies may be served attractively again . . . as chocolate ice-box cake.

Mix together one-third cup of sugar, 1/4 cup of cocoa and one teaspoon of flour. Separate three eggs and beat the yolks. Gradually stir the sugar mixture into the yolks and blend until smooth. Slowly add two cups of hot milk, stirring constantly. Cook over hot water until custard is thickened, stirring constantly. This will take about 10 minutes. Remove from heat, add 1/2 teaspoon of vanilla and cool slightly. Add 1/2 of a teaspoon of salt to the three egg whites and beat until stiff, then fold into the custard. Put two cups of dry cake or cookie crumbs in the bottom of a loaf cake pan. Pour the custard mixture on top and chill thoroughly four to six hours or longer in the refrigerator before serving.

**MINUTES SAVED** here and there these days mean more time to enjoy the summer out-of-doors . . . so here is a time-saving trick from the Pensions Department's Nutrition Division: let the family peel those delicious new potatoes at the table.

**GORDON BLEU:** French chefs who win this coveted honor make poems of gastronomical delight. Maybe you think your family wouldn't appreciate the gustatory stimulation of a subtle blending of flavors, but don't be too sure. Fry toothpicking onion slices on the sides of a roast, garlic for roast lamb . . . remove before serving.

**LUNCHBOX CHEESE SANDWICHES:** Lunchboxes and picnics can both be improved if these sandwiches, suggested by the Agriculture Department Consumer Section, are tucked away as a mainstay in the menu:

Two hardcooked eggs, 1/4 teaspoon of pepper, one teaspoon dry mustard, two tablespoons melted butter, 1/4 cup top milk, two tablespoons vinegar, 1/2 pound grated cheese, salt to taste.

Separate whites and yolks of hard cooked eggs; mash yolks and blend with other ingredients. Add egg whites, finely chopped. This makes 1 1/2 cups of filling.

**RANG ROUNDUP:** The Prices Board suggests these pointers for

keeping precious kitchen ranges working smoothly:  
Never clean the porcelain surface of the range when it is hot—never use gritty cleaners. A cloth rung out in warm, mild soapy water is best—be sure and wipe dry after washing.  
Always wipe up lemon and orange juice, milk or vinegar or any other acid juices and foods as soon as the surface has cooled. Acids spoil the porcelain finish.  
Rotate the use of surface units just as you rotate the tires on your car. Playing favorites wears them out.

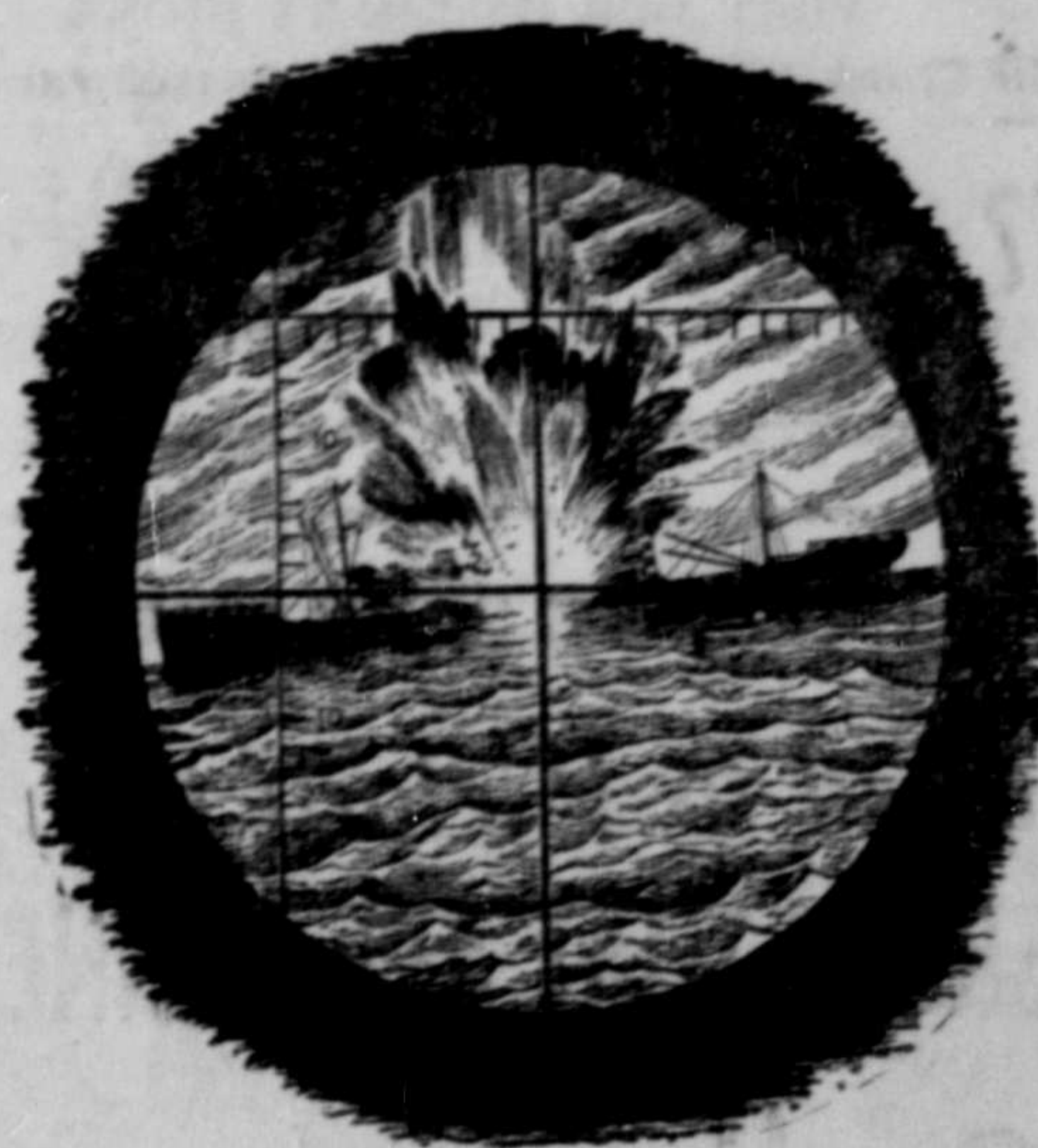
