Man and German Occupied Countries continues-Stetting

LONDON, Jan. 6 (CP)-Royal Air Force heavy bombers, over Germany for the fourth time in eight nights, hammered at the industrial centre of Wednesday night Stettin while mosquitoes bombed Berlin and other objectives, the Air Ministrf anounced. Three Canadian bomber squadrons participated. A total of fifteen bombers were lost in these operations.

Ninty-five German aircraft were brought down yesterday as American heavy bombers struck Kiel shipyards for the third time in three weeks. Twenty-five Allied bombers and twelve supporting fighters failed to return. The second attack on Kiel in two days was made through a strong defence which included rocket planes and Messerschmidt 110's towing what appeared to be a new type of anti-aircraft bombers.



A.R.P. in Prince Rupert . . .

It is timely that Prince Rupert should be visited now by General Alex Ross, chief of the A.R.P. for Canada, who is coming tonight for a two-day stay. General Ross will find that interest in A.R.P. has flagged in Prince Rupert like it has generally in the country due to the danger of enemy attack having seemingly diminished although we would hesitate to say that it has been by any means removed or that it is not still a very existent possibility.

But, apart from military attack, there are other emergency functions that a trained A.R.P. personnel, such as Prince Rupert has developed, might well be prepared to exercise. To keep the organization in existence and oiled to function would appear to be most advisable. Possibly General Ross' visit and suggestions he may have to offer may result in a revival of A.R.P. enthusiasm here. However, some actual need for it must be apparent if that interest is to be maintained. That need may well exist.






