WAR NEWS IN SOUTHWEST PACIFIC

ALLIED HEADQUARTERS IN NEW GUINEA-The Allied air force hit Wakde-Haarmi area of Dutch-New Guinea, northwest of American holdings at Hollandia, dropping two thousand pound bombs. Five of 200 Japanese intercepter planes were shot down over Schouten Islands.

SITUATION IMPROVED

WASHINGTON-President Roosevelt says that the situation in Italy is much improved. He had not been very optimistie about the new offensive at the outset, he admitted. Now, however, the outlook is much more encouraging.

INDIA-BURMA SITUATION

KANDY, Ceylon-Chinese, advancing down the Mogaung Valley in North Burma, have cut the main road to Kamaing, Japanese base, headquarters announced today. Meanwhile Impahl in Northern India appears to be again threatened with a new Japanese invasion thrust to the south, the enemy at last reports being eleven miles from the border.

INVASION EXPECTATION

LONDON-Marshal Rommel is reported from Berlin to be making a final inspection of anti-invasion defences. The main thrust of the Allies, Germany appears to expect, will be along Cherbourg Peninsula or the Normandie Coast with the chief embrakation port Portsmouth which the Nazis have been making the principal target of their bombing attacks. A new Russian offensive is expected in Berlin to synchronize with the western invasion.

MOSQUITOES STING BERLIN

LONDON - Royal Air Force mosquito bembers blasted Berlin last night, the Air Ministry announced today, as Britistry announced today, as British heavy bombers rested for a renewal of the pre-invasion offensive. The raid on Berlin, in which no planes were lost, was carried out in spite of bad weather. Allied operations Tuesday were restricted to offensive sweeps by fighters. 


