CEILINGS SET— CEILING ON FISH PRICE

Ruling of Wartime Prices and
Trade Board Says What
Shall be Paid to Fishermen
On Delivery.

Deviating from the policy
which has been in force up to now
whereby maximum prices
have been restricted to the pro-
cessors, the Wartime Prices and
Trade Board has set a schedule
of prices for fresh and frozen
fish on this coast to fishermen
at point of delivery to the
wholesale market.

The new prices are said to be
identical with those recommended
by a conference of the fresh
and frozen fish industry held in
Vancouver last fall with two
exceptions — the price of ling
cod has been reduced from 12c
to 10c and the black cod price
from 14c to 12c.

Cod fishermen down the
coast have protested at the
prices being too low.
Salmon prices will be arranged
later.

FORCES IN BRITAIN ENGAGE IN REALISTIC DRILL FOR THE "BIG SHOW" — The great Allied invasion army is getting the most thorough training for the big job in Britain, under actual battle conditions. Above you see British reconnaissance troopers, trained in every angle of modern warfare, making their way through a practical minefield. A mine has just let go a few feet from the man in rear. Leaders work shoulder to shoulder, picking every inch of the ground they cover and marking the path, mad safe with white tapes. They carry small white frames which are placed over spots where mines have been located.

Representation on the respective sub-committees is now being completed.

Provision is being made for other members to be contacted later.

It was reported by the secretary that some organizations have not yet submitted names for sub-committee membership. Gratification was expressed upon the wholehearted response of those persons who had already accepted membership on these committees.

As soon as sufficient material and literature has been obtained the sub-committees will begin working.

Appreciation also was voiced for the several cash contributions received towards the creation of a reference library.

Several valuable copies of similar surveys made elsewhere in Canada and in United States, as well as reference books and pamphlets, have been secured and others have been ordered.

The Extension Department of the University of B.C. as well as many other organizations have expressed keen interest in the survey being organized here.

From these, assistance by way of information, booklets, pamphlets, etc., is being received.

For the housing and cataloging of this material, the local library board has kindly extended the use of its staff and suitable space.

A small room for sub-committee meetings and a larger room for general meetings have been generously loaned by the Health Unit adjoining the public library.

It was decided that meetings of committee members would be called shortly in order that they might discuss together the usual procedure and ways and means used in similar surveys. This having been done they will


