# Smithers Has Worst Fire In History

## Four Buildings on Main Street of Interior Town Destroyed by Flames

Loss is Estimated at \$75,000—Anger, Noel, Newbery and Gray Buildings Wiped Out Saturday Night—Many Other Buildings Ignited But Were Saved.

SMITHERS, May 8—The town of Smithers was visited with the most disastrous fire in its history on Saturday evening when flames broke out in the Blue Goose restaurant located in the Anger building and spread in both directions, destroying the H. F. Noel department store; the Anger block, which was a double building, occupied in part by I. Anger as a tailor shop with living apartments above, and by the Blue Goose restaurant; the A. E. Day Bakery, in the building known as the Newbery Block and the large building which until recently was occupied by the J. S. Gray Jewellery Store but which has been vacant for some months.

All the buildings were two storey frame structures and all, with the exception of the Newbery Block, were among the first large buildings built in Smithers. The Newbery Block was built by Frank Newbery as a bakery with living quarters above about thirteen years ago.

The local theatre, several blocks away, was packed with patrons enjoying the picture "Coney Island" when the operator, L. T. Buchanan, quietly announced that there was a large fire burning in the Blue Goose restaurant and asked for fire fighters. The audience dispersed quietly and in order, but by that time, the fire had a long start on the available fire fighting equipment and it could be easily seen that nearly a whole block on Main Street was doomed.

## Park Gets Strip Act

Sixteen Young Doukhobors Land in Jail After Disrobing Before 1,500 People.

VANCOUVER, May 8 (CP)—Sixteen members of a Doukhobor delegation in Vancouver stripped off their clothing on the picnic grounds in Stanley Park in front of 1,500 Sunday strollers and landed in jail charged with failing to show national registration cards. The stripping occurred in the course of a frenzied religious demonstration. They were young members of the Sons of Freedom Sect.

Nine men and seven women, aged from 20 to 48, were arrested.

When the trial started this morning, six others disrobed in police court and were arrested.

sitting on the sidewalk, removed from the fire, fitting themselves with boots and shoes and with new hats.

Not a great deal of stock or contents was saved from any of the buildings as the fire moved very rapidly and by 11 p.m. it was about all over.

Today only a tall brick chimney of the Day Bakery stands amid the ashes of the four blocks that were destroyed.

It is estimated that the loss will be in the neighborhood of \$75,000 which will be partly covered by insurance.

Heat was intense and plate glass windows in the Hanson Block, the Kenney real estate office and Eby's hardware store and the Hudson Hotel across the street, cracked, broke and collapsed during the course of the fire and paint was seared and peeled from these buildings.

The community owes a debt of gratitude to the members of the R.C.A.F. and to other willing workers who helped keep the fire from spreading and getting out of control.

After most of the watchers had dispersed to their homes and at about 12:15 a.m. Sunday morning the large siren at the C.N.R. roundhouse brought many of them back to the scene of the fire by a number of loud wails which, it turned out, was caused by a short circuit in the electric wires near the fire. Visions of a new outbreak were relieved when the cause of the alarm was learned.

## Mickleburgh Nominated

The nomination was moved by Harold Ponder and seconded by Harley Lewis. Mr. Mickleburgh made a fighting acceptance speech in which he condemned old line parties and C.C.F. alike. Guest speaker was Tom McEwen, provincial organizer of the L.L.P. A resolution was passed condemning release of "Fascists" from internment. Mrs. Martin Loveng came all the way from Grass Plains to attend the convention.

LONDON, May 8 (P)—Light Royal Navy coastal forces have destroyed a German destroyer which was driven ashore April 29 by Royal Canadian Navy destroyers in the engagement in which H.M.C.S. Athabasca was sunk.

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## STRIKE AT SEVASTAPOL

Great Aerial Blow May Be Pre-face to Final Drive On City

LONDON, May 8 (P)—Russian planes destroyed twenty-two Nazi aircraft, blew up four ammunition dumps, damaged several ships, silenced artillery batteries and inflicted heavy losses on enemy troops in the Sevastopol area in a possible prelude to a final Red drive into that city.

## Observe May 21 As Empire Youth Sunday

British Board of Education Organizes Empire Poster Contest

TORONTO, May 8 (P)—May 21 has been set aside this year as Empire Youth Sunday, the day designed to more closely unite young people of the Empire. The King has again accorded his patronage to the occasion.

Services will be held across the Empire while the central Youth Service in Westminster Abbey will be broadcast from 9:30 a.m. to 10:15 a.m. Greenwich time.

Empire Youth Sunday is an offshoot of the Empire Youth Movement founded in 1938 by Major F. J. Ney, K.C., of the National Council of Education of Canada, at present working on the movement in South Africa.

In Canada, alone, 40,000 Empire Youth Sunday of circulars are being sent out by Provincial Departments of Education and religious bodies. Of these, 20,000 are being distributed in Ontario by Dr. J. G. Althouse, Director of Education, at the instance of Premier Drew.

A prize of \$50 (\$225) is being offered in a poster competition organized by the British Board of Education. The contest is open to school pupils, art students and members of youth organizations.

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## WAR NEWS

### BERLIN HEAVILY BOMBED

LONDON — Seven hundred and fifty United States heavy bombers and fighters dropped two thousand tons of bombs on Berlin Sunday. Eight bombers and five fighters were lost. Planes from Italy bombed Bucharest railway yards and a strategic bridge on the Belgrade-Sofia railway line near Belgrade.

### ITALIAN FIGHTING RENEWED

NAPLES—The situation on the Anzio beachhead and elsewhere along the fronts in Italy has lived up with renewed artillery and patrol activity.

### KURILES BOMBED AGAIN

WASHINGTON — American bombing planes, based on the Aleutians, again struck at Paramashiru and elsewhere on the Kurile Islands. They met with heavy ground fire although no losses are reported. Elsewhere in the Pacific there were continued heavy bombings of Rabaul, New Britain, and Japanese bases along the north coast of New Guinea from Wewak to Hansa Bay.

### JAPANESE ARE HELD

CHUNGKING — The reinforced Japanese invaders have been held from further advances in Honan Province.

### IN BURMA AND INDIA

KANDY—The Allied forces in both Burma and northeastern India have made continued progress against the Japanese. A British setback at Arakan was regarded as unimportant.

### EASTERN FRONT QUIET

MOSCOW—The long lull in the fighting between Soviet and Nazi forces on the entire eastern front continues.

### PRISONERS IN U.S.

WASHINGTON—It is announced that there are now 183,618 Axis prisoners of war in the United States—133,135 Germans, 50,136 Italians and 347 Japanese. Many of these prisoners are being used in various ways to relieve the manpower shortage.

## JAPS TAKE OFFENSIVE

But Are Suffering Heavy Losses In Attempt to Regain Lost Ground in Manipur

KANDY, Ceylon, May 8 (P)—An Allied communique said today that the Japanese are on the offensive in all sectors of the Manipur hill front in northeastern India and are seeking to regain recently lost forward positions. They are, however, suffering disproportionately heavy losses.

British troops have evacuated Butheaug in western Burma on Sunday as the Allies were repulsing Japanese attacks at Kohima near the Indian border.

## Passing Of Wells Gray

VICTORIA, May 8 (Hon.)—Arthur Wellesley Gray, aged 57, minister of lands and municipal affairs since 1933, died yesterday. He was a prominent resident of New Westminster for many years and a long career in public life started with the aldermanship there. He was mayor of the Royal City for a long time and was an expert in municipal affairs. He had been ailing with a heart condition for many months.

## Berlin and Brunswick

Heavily Hit As Allied Precision Bombing Intensifies

LONDON, May 8 (P)—Nearly thousand American bombers and fighters blasted Berlin and Brunswick areas today with 100,000 tons of bombs. The second straight day of heavy bombing.

The Royal Air Force and the Royal Canadian Air Force attacked France, Germany and the Netherlands.

Canadian planes returned to their daylight operations in the pre-invasion air offensive into the twenty-fourth day and climaxed a four hour period in which probably six thousand bombs rained something in excess of a thousand tons of explosives and manufacturing plants with which Adolf Hitler hoped to combat the western invasion and the Russian drive into the East.

Over 4,500 Allied aircraft bombed Berlin and Bucharest in perhaps the heaviest pre-invasion assault yet.

## Baked Casserole

the less expensive cuts beef for delicious stews and casseroles

Get-wise housewives are on the lookout for new interesting ways of serving those economical cuts of beef, which properly cooked, are as delicious and nutritious as the most expensive. This week I am giving you one of my favourite ways of dressing beef to make a casserole. A hungry family really goes for it. Serve with a leafy green vegetable or a fresh spring salad. A meal fit for a king.

### ECONOMICAL BAKED CASSEROLE

- 1 lb. beef shoulder, diced
- 1 cup meat or vegetable stock
- 2 cups diced cooked potatoes
- 2 tbsps. grated onion or a little onion salt
- 1 tsp. minced parsley
- 1 tsp. Worcester sauce
- 1 tsp. salt
- ¼ tsp. pepper

For four people order one pound of beef shoulder. Dice the meat, roll in well-seasoned flour and brown in hot fat, add 1 cup of stock, vegetable liquor or water and simmer gently for half an hour. Now combine with potatoes, onion (if available) parsley and seasonings. Pour into greased casserole and bake in a slow oven for one hour.

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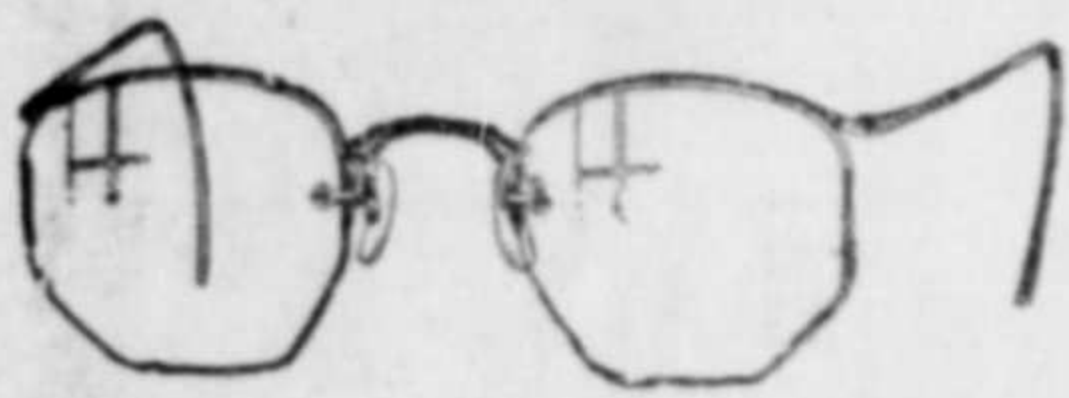
