Priceless Articles Here . . .

A group of articles beyond price lie exposed to the carless view of the public in the display window of the Northern B.C. Power Company on Third Avenue. They are as valuable as life itself yet they are protected only by a sheet of glass from the casual passerby.

No, they are not washing machines or diamonds. Actually, they are of far less interest to the average Canadian than a washing machine or a diamond. They are only 16 articles of tinned or dehydrated food. They are the contents of a Red Cross food package.

Yet, in subjugated Europe, in emaciated China and India those things would not be display objects, for they are the urgent antidote for gaunt death. To display them would be fascist mockery and armed guards would be needed to stave off the savagely hungry watchers.

In prisoner-of-war camps these sixteen articles in a box marked with a Red Cross are of the utmost value to young Canadians and Britons. The regular appearance of these boxes is a real highlight of appetite and nourishment in their dragging young lives.

The boxes, incidentally, are identical with those which many Canadians buy and carry home regularly—a case of beer.

What, specifically, do they contain? Well, there are a large bar of chocolate, tins of powdered milk, butter, corned beef, pork and sardines, as well as a jar of marmalade, small packages each of prunes, raisins, and cheese, and a few ounces of tea, sugar and coffee. In short, nothing that the average Canadian sets much store by.

Yet, the Red Cross knows the true value of these things. In their current drive for funds they are asking that the Canadian public contribute money for their purchase and distribution to their own prisoner sons and Allies. For the contribution of a few dollars any Canadian can have the feeling that he has saved a life as surely as if he had dragged a man out of the sea.

1174 Students Attend Schools

There were 1174 pupils attending the city's public and high schools during February, the board of school trustees learned from reports read at the meeting on Wednesday night. Booth Memorial School had 487 pupils, King Edward 378, Borden Street 227 and Seal Cove 82.

Booth had the highest attendance percentage with 95.97 per cent, Seal Cove was second with 92.38 per cent, Borden Street school had 92.31 per cent, and attendance at King Edward was 91.52 per cent.

The meeting learned that war savings stamps and certificates bought by the students during the month totalled \$752.82. Booth Memorial students bought \$200 worth, King Edward \$288.75, Borden Street \$203 and Seal Cove \$61.067. The money was raised through direct sales, redemption of commercial coupons, concerts, and the sale of handwork.

The Seal Cove pupils donated \$10 to the Junior Red Cross for the India Relief Fund. Borden Street school gave \$132.65 to the Junior Red Cross.

J. Y. McCarter, J. Callahan and Percy Leopold of Wartime Housing Limited attended the meeting, discussing aspects of the new Conrad Street School. It was learned that the new school will have a full concrete basement, suitable for physical education purposes, or for a play-

• In packing centres like this across Canada, some thousands of devoted women volunteers, working tirelessly in shifts of 100, pack about 100,000 Red Cross food parcels each week.

In 1943, millions of dollars were used in filling these parcels with nourishing food. To date, nearly 7,000,000 of them have been supplied.

For many thousands of war prisoners these parcels spell the difference between gnawing misery and a measure of bodily comfort. As the fighting spreads the need grows. Were this the only activity of the Red Cross, it would be enough to warrant your openhanded support. But this, and all the other Red Cross work, must go on. Give generously!

Montreal, Dec. 2.—The long road home to freedom ended today for 217 Canadian men, women and children who finished a six-week journey from Japanese internment camps and walked into the arms of a surging mass of relatives three hours after being repatriated from Japan. The travel-stained group told of grim conditions in the internment camps. They said internees were ill-clad, ill-shod and ill-housed. Their diet of bread was interspersed with an irregular four-ounce ration of meat that was mostly bone. All the repatriates spoke in warm tribute of the Red Cross and its work and said it was saving many lives with the parcels that were getting through. They all urged that this work be continued and that Allied Government redouble their efforts in speeding repatriation of the remaining thousands, whose plight they pictured as "serious."



LONDON, March 4. — Mass education campaigns among Africans, including the use of the movies and radio, and the revival of native arts and industries are recommended in a report by a sub-committee of the Colonial Advisory Committee on education in the colonies.

The problems are of grave urgency, says the committee, if the "explosive temper" caused by changing native outlook is to be wisely controlled. Among proposals for improving local crafts and artistic developments the committee includes the introduction of more mechanical devices and modern ballroom dancing and games.

The committee urges co-operation of the work of all educational, social, commercial and industrial agencies of British African dependencies in a mass drive against illiteracy.
