BELLAIRE, Ohia, July 6

An unknown number of miners, variously estimated at from 40 to 75, is imprisoned by fire in the Powhatan mine. Nine hours later an official of the United Mine Workers expressed doubt if any would be reached alive. Hope was later abandoned of rescuing any alive. The official said there was no way of getting the men back of the shaft without forcing carbon monoxide gas into the chamber where they are.
