OTHER CANADIAN VICTORY—

M.C.S. Swansea Bags Nazi Boat; Makes Fifth Enemy Victim in Recent Weeks

OTTAWA, July 6 — Only a short time after she helped H.M.C.S. St. Laurent destroy a U-boat, M.C.S. Swansea, one of the Royal Canadian Navy's frigates, bagged another, Hon. Angus L. Macdonald, minister of national defence for naval services, announced today. Swansea was assisted by H.M.S. Pelican, a Royal Navy sloop.

The kill by Swansea brings to five the successes against U-boats announced by the Minister recently. First to score was the frigate H.M.C.S. Waskesiu. The second triumph was rung up by a group of Canadian ships in which the corvette Chilliwack played the major role. Then H.M.C.S. St. Laurent, a destroyer, assisted by H.M.C.S. Swansea, wiped out another U-boat with depth charges and gun fire. Next the frigate H.M.C.S. Prince Rupert assisted United States forces in sinking a submarine.

The minister emphasized that the first three frigates to have been built on the West Coast of Canada have all destroyed U-boats, with Swansea sharing in the destruction of two. The frigates have made their kills in the order in which they were built, H.M.C.S. Waskesiu was the first to be commissioned and the first to make her kill. H.M.C.S. Swansea and H.M.C.S. Prince Rupert made their debuts in that order.

The commanding officer of H.M.C.S. Swansea, Commander Clarence A. King, D.S.O., D.S.C., Legion of Merit (U.S.), R.C.N.R., of Oliver, B.C., describes the tussle in which the frigate played the star role as a "textbook action."

Immediately the presence of the submarine became known, "Action Stations" changed throughout Swansea. The frigate made her first run and dropped a pattern of depth charges. Shortly after, she dropped another pattern and was joined then by H.M.S. Pelican. The two ships attacked together and Swansea dropped a pattern which apparently split the hull of the U-boat like a coconut and forced it to the surface.

The U-boat broke the water about 2,000 yards away from Swansea and astern of her. The frigate went round hard to starboard and ran parallel to it, opening up with all guns which could be brought to bear. She was followed closely by Pelican. Both ships scored hits with their heavy guns and swept the Nazi with Oerlikon fire.

"The submarine never fully surfaced," says Commander King. "There was never any more than its conning tower and a bit of its deck showing. It was badly damaged when it came up." Twelve minutes after it was blown to the surface the U-boat made its death dive, stern first with its bow high in the air.



Robot Bombers Hurt Britain



This is the Royal Canadian Navy frigate, H.M.C.S. Swansea, which recently destroyed a German submarine to bring her score of U-boat kills to two. The submarine was so badly damaged by depth charges from the Swansea and a Royal Navy sloop, which assisted in the attack, that it barely broke surface before sinking. The two ships picked up survivors.

Moving On Nipponeese

Pincers Movement on Japanese in North Burma Being Closed by Chinese and Americans.

CHUNGKING, July 6 — Chinese, fighting along the Burma-Yunnan border toward junction with American and Chinese forces in North Burma, have reduced the gap between them to 26 miles but a mountainous region threatens to delay an eventual meeting.

The Chinese have captured 22 miles west of the Japanese base at Tangchung and 26 miles east of General Joseph Stilwell's units at Sadon in Burma. Headquarters announced that the British, Americans and Chinese, operating in North Burma, have killed 17,700 Japanese and have taken 100 prisoners since they launched their campaign early this year.

LOG SCALE MOUNTING

Has Reached Over One Hundred Thousand Board in First Half of Year

Log scaling in Prince Rupert forestry district for the first half of 1944 amounted to 100,104,700 board feet as compared with 65,678,809 board feet in the corresponding period of last year. The production of poles and piling this year is slightly in excess of last, 743,766 lineal feet comparing with 710,846 lineal feet.

Log scaling during the month of June this year reached the substantial volume of 43,096,461 board feet compared with 24,251,298 board feet in the same month last year. This included 816,283 board feet of fir, 3,395,460 board feet of cedar, 27,772,755 board feet of spruce, 10,457,835 board feet of hemlock, 403,807 board feet of jackpine, 253,265 board feet of balsam and 17,056 board feet of miscellaneous.

Production of poles and piling in the interior was light this June at 14,415 lineal feet of cedar, compared with 169,405 feet last year. Ties numbered 10,913 pieces — 1,374 spruce and 9,539 jackpine — and 525 cords of wood were counted.

FIRE, NOT MUDPIES, BOYS' PLAYTHING

Two Premises on Seventh Avenue East Ignited by Lads Yesterday Afternoon

It was not mud pies that the six-year-old boy was talking about when he told his companion at play at 5 o'clock Wednesday night. "You make yours here and I'll make mine over there."

He was talking about fires. So one boy proceeded to lay and light a fire under the wall at the side of a house at 538 Seventh Avenue East. The other boy started his fire under the Seventh Avenue Meat Market building occupying the front part of the same lot.

Having somehow procured matches, they had no trouble gathering bits of paper and shingles. The fires started off well, and soon the bottoms of both buildings were burning.

Then some adult had to spoil the fun by telephoning the fire department. The boys, smelling trouble, decided to leave.

The fire department had no trouble putting out the fire but were unable to find the youngsters, whose conversation had been heard, but not previously understood by employees of the Seventh Avenue Market.

Winnipeg Truck Driver Held Up

WINNIPEG, July 6 — A payroll of \$1,700 and a marked check for a substantial amount were seized by two robbers who held up Henry Sanderson, truck driver, in North Winnipeg and escaped in an automobile.

REICH IS BOMBED
LONDON — Upwards of 500 American bombers attacked northwestern Germany and air fields and robot bomb nest sites in France today. Overnight the Royal Air Force struck in great strength at the Pas-de-Calais area and Dijon, railway centre south of Paris.

DeGAULLE IN WASHINGTON
WASHINGTON — General Charles DeGaulle arrived in Washington today to confer with President Franklin D. Roosevelt. Later he will visit Ottawa.

JAPS USING GAS
WASHINGTON — A United States officer, assigned to investigate reports of the Japanese using poison gas against the Chinese, confirms that such was done. He found evidence of both mustard and Lewisite gas having been used.

HUMAN SLAUGHTER HOUSES
LONDON — Brendan Bracken, British minister of information, told the House of Commons that the Nazis are operating "human slaughter houses" in occupied European countries. Into them Jews are being herded to be killed.

BIG CIRCUS FIRE
HARTFORD, Conn. — Several persons may have been trapped under the main tent of the Ringling Bros.-Barnum and Bailey circus which took fire and collapsed today while crowded with patrons.

BATTLE OF NORMANDY IS SAVAGE

SHAEF, July 6 (CP)—The British and Canadians are engaged in one of the most savage encounters of the Normandy campaign in the area around newly-captured Carpiquet where the Germans have reached a concentration of one division to every three miles, it was announced today.

The Americans have bypassed besieged La Haye du Puits at the base of Gonten Peninsula while other units are battling inside the town after capturing the railway station.

Hand-to-hand fighting for an air field adjacent to Carpiquet is continuing.

JUNE PERMIT VALUE \$12,000

A building permit for \$6,250, issued to the North Star Bottling Works in June, made up more than half the value of the month's issue of \$12,400. A repair job on the L.D. Cafe accounted for another \$4,500. Five other alterations and repair jobs ranging between \$100 and \$800 completed the list.

Value of permits issued in June was the highest since March, although it was less than one quarter of that month's total. Permits valued at \$52,585 were issued in March. May permit issue totalled \$4,975.

So far this year \$176,060 worth of building permits have been applied for at the city engineer's office. For the first half of last year the total was \$262,630.

Security Subject I.O.D.E. Address

"Think twice before you speak of security matters, then say very little," Captain R. Thistle, area army intelligence officer, guest speaker, told a meeting of the Queen Mary Chapter I.O.D.E. last night. He said that a great deal of damage could be done by careless people who happen on matters of military importance.

The meeting was held at the home of Mrs. S. Pierce, with Regent Mrs. D. C. Stuart in the chair. There was a fair attendance of members.

Arrangements were made to accept the names of volunteers to help with the Civic Centre carnival next week. Other business was on a routine nature.

JUNE FIRES WERE FEW

June was the slackest month so far this year for the city fire department, only five calls being received. Total number of calls received so far this year is 58. There were nine calls in May.

Last year the department answered eight calls in June, and the six-month total was 68 calls. No appreciable damage was done by any of the fires last month.

Prime Minister Makes Statement to House On Effect of New Attacks

So Far 2,752 Persons Have Been Killed, Mostly in London—Children Being Evacuated—European Campaign Will Not Suffer

LONDON, July 6 (CP)—German flying bombs have killed 2,752 persons and wounded 8,000 others since the blind robot attacks, centred on London, started three weeks ago, Prime Minister Winston Churchill told the House of Commons today. More than 10,000 of the casualties were in London, Mr.

Churchill said. The Prime Minister announced that children were being sent from the capital as in the blitz days four years ago.

More Britons have been killed by the flying bombs in southern England than were killed in the first 15 days of the blitz, Mr. Churchill disclosed. "It would be a mistake to underestimate the serious nature of the attacks," he said. The government was doing everything in its power to combat them and had not failed yet. One hundred to 150 of the robots were coming over daily but a great many of them failed to cross the channel and many were being shot down before they reached the capital. The average was about one person killed for each bomb that came over, there having been 2,750 of the robots so far.

"We shall not allow battle operations in Normandy or the attacks on Europe to suffer. They must come first," Mr. Churchill stated.

The Prime Minister said that about 50,000 tons of Allied bombs have been dropped on robot launching bases in France.

The House cheered when Mr. Churchill, declaring that the government would not leave London, said: "Here we began the war. Here we will see it end."

Disaster In Mine

From 40 to 75 Men Believed Dead in Ohio Colliery

BELLAIRE, Ohio, July 6 — An unknown number of miners, variously estimated at from 40 to 75, is imprisoned by fire in the Powhatan mine. Nine hours later an official of the United Mine Workers expressed doubt if any would be reached alive. Hope was later abandoned of rescuing any alive. The official said there was no way of getting the men back of the shaft without forcing carbon monoxide gas into the chamber where they are.

ATTORNEY GENERAL VISITOR

Hon. R. L. Maitland, attorney general, and T. W. S. Parsons, commissioner of British Columbia Police, are visiting the city on official business. Mr. Maitland arrived in the city on last night's train from Edmonton. Commissioner Parsons came in last night from Stewart. They will proceed south from here to Victoria as soon as they have cleaned up such matters as require attention in Prince Rupert.

This morning Mr. Maitland and Commissioner Parsons were in session with the mayor and city officials to discuss city policing.

The attorney general was the speaker at the regular weekly luncheon of the Prince Rupert Rotary Club today.

Government Taking Over B.C. Electric

VANCOUVER, July 6 — Premier John Hart has submitted the plan of the British Columbia government to take over and operate the British Columbia Electric Railway Co. Approval of the municipalities concerned is sought.

Douglas, who is a Baptist minister, will have in his cabinet five farmers, three school teachers, one lawyer, one railwayman and one co-operative expert.



DARWIN, Australia, July 6 (AP)—The first Japanese airman to be captured in northern Australia was brought in by an aborigine.

BURNS LAKE, July 6—Local Indians took charge of the Dominion Day celebration and rented the recreation grounds for the day. Invitations were broadcast and for the week preceding the great day Indians were arriving from every part of the great lakes district by team and pack horse, and by cars of every description including old model "Ts" and a few of the latest models. Between 1,500 and 2,000 Indians gathered and almost as many whites. The little town was policed by Constable Clark with two assistants and perfect order was maintained throughout the day and at the dance which followed.

Indian committees handled the whole program without a hitch. Light rain in the morning marred the children's sports but the weather cleared after lunch and the Old Fort Indians cleaned up on the local baseball team by a score of 19 to 7. Sammy Marsh of Prince Rupert rooted for the Babine Indians.

Chief Paddy Isaac had built good corrals and chutes on the Reservation Park where the bucking contests thrilled a large crowd until they ran out of horses and darkness fell. At the evening dance the Indian Hall was crowded to capacity and the best music ever played in the district was served by the Moricetown native orchestra. Many old time settlers were present and remained for the old-timers' reunion on Monday.

Prepare For Coming Term

School Board in Session—Appointing Teachers—Mickleburgh Returning

Hearing written applications from teachers who wish to fill vacancies on school staffs here and the consideration of other measures to prepare city schools for the coming term occupied the Board of School Trustees at a lengthy meeting last night.

Hired by the board was Miss Florence Connor of Brandon, Manitoba, whose application for the position of music teacher in the Junior High School was accompanied by a wealth of qualifications. Her salary was set at \$1800 a year.

A letter from Bruce Mickleburgh informed the board that he was prepared to resume his teaching duties for the coming term after having had six months leave of absence. It was moved that Mr. Mickleburgh be notified not to expect a leave of absence in the coming year.

The board passed a motion sanctioning the payment of accounts valued at \$8,487.94.

Board members present were J. T. Langridge, chairman, Mrs. M. Roper, Mrs. D. Teng, Mrs. Kathleen Hill and Mrs. J. A. Rutherford, secretary.




