Air Army Withdrawn With Heavy Casualties

First Retreat of Invasion, 2,000 Cross to South Bank of Rhine. Unable to Take Wounded

LONDON, Sept. 27—The British airborne army besieged near Arnhem, Germany, after they landed there a week ago has been withdrawn to the south bank of the Rhine River, Allied headquarters announced today. There was no official indication of the number of men withdrawn, but the report said that it was necessary to leave the wounded behind as prisoners.

A National Broadcasting Company correspondent, David Anderson, broadcast from the front line this morning that 2,000 men had been rescued from the Arnhem pocket. He said that 1,200 wounded had been left behind. The original airborne army, he said, was estimated at between 7,000 and 8,000 men.
