"Profit is the only source of social security which involves letting the individual enterpriser operate properly. Some controls and regulations naturally are necessary as they protect both business and society alike. However, every infringement by governments into the field of free private enterprise weakens the ability of the individual to meet he challenge in this connection.

"There are also responsibilities placed upon private enterprise. In the past it may have been inlined to take credit on the one hand and disclaim responsibility on the other. Private enterprise cannot take credit for the prosperity which we enjoyed in the early twenties and on the other hand evade responsibility for the disaster of the early thirties.

My government has agreed to the calling of a dominion - provincial conference at Ottawa to discuss these problems and will cooperate fully in such measures as will best advance the object of our common pur-

FOR AFTER WAR Provision will be made for the establishment of a bureau of postwar rehabilitation and construction under a committee of the cabinet in order to co-ordinate the work of the various departments of the provincial services and to fit those measures which come within the scope of provincial jurisdiction into the larger program devised by the dominion authorities.

Appropriations will be submitted for the establishment and maintenance of a forest product laboratory at the University of British Columbia in conjunction with the dominion government and private industry. Provision will be asked for

ICE ARENA OR SWIMMING POOL "Recently, suggestions have been offered that an ice arena be substituted for the proposed swimming pool in the civic centre plans. It has been suggested that such a building would provide for skating, hockey, basketball, badminton and lacrosse. Since ice sports, basketball and badminton are all winter sports, carried on simultaneously, it would be necessary to have a building large enough to accommodate both the ice rink and suitable gymnasium and half space for basketball and badminton. Should it be suggested that the ice rink could be cleared of ice and covered with a sectional floor as is done in Madison Square Garden and probably in other large arenas. it must be pointed out that this would be a very expensive operation and even then would limit each sport to two nights a week. To those proposing such an arena it must also be pointed out that the Dominion Government has let the contract and construction will be started in the near future of a large building to be used as a recreational centre for the armed forces in Prince Rupert. 

It's raining-you're cold-and wet-and you've been waiting five-ten-fifteen minutes. You're appointment won't be kept on time-all because the bus is late again!

And then it did come along. And it was crowded-jammed. You pushed your way on board-stepped on people's toes-they stepped on yours. Somebody pushed an elbow in your ribs-an umbrella prodded the small of your back-a man's hat, sodden with rain water, dripped down your neck!

You're not a little peeved!

You say to yourself -- and perhaps those around you -- "Why can't we get better service? Perhaps it would be better if someone else ran the buses in this city?"

Perhaps it would be. We don't know! But we do know that the problem of being late and the inconvenience of overloading are beyond control.

New buses are difficult to obtain. Road conditions have wrecked all equipment we have. There is one-sometimes twonot infrequently, all three buses in the garage for repairs.

Often we are behind schedule because patrons didn't have heir fare ready. Sometimes the passenger who gets off at the first stop will sit at the rear of the crowded bus. Shoppers with parcels riding at times of peak loads delay us. Others ride the bus at busy times when they do not have to do so. Too many stops will set the driver behind.

All our drivers, too, are working under a nervous and physical strain. Trip after trip, day after day, they must stand the pounding of the bus rolling over the roads of Prince Rupert. Sometimes, too, impatient patrons blame the driver for something that is beyond his control.

The driver's life is not always pleasant. But he is sticking to his job, doing his best.

Would you under these conditions?

Help us give better service. Observe these simple rules. Cut them out and hang them where you can read them every day.

- 1. Don't ride the bus unless necessary.
- 2. Shoppers will find the 9:30 morning trip the least crowded and the stores not so crowded. Do your shopping then.
- 3. If you get off at the first stop sit handy to the door.
- 1. Have your fare ready. Keep a dime in your pocket always handy.
- 5. Don't take bulky parcels on the bus.
- 6. Don't try to crowd into the bus ahead of the next person. Keep in line-and take your turn.

When the bus is late or crowded don't blame the driver. He's doing his best.

Legislation will be introduced to implement the gift of 1,000,000 acres of land to British Columbia veterans desirous of taking up farming under the Dominion Government's Veterans' Land Act

It is proposed to encourage trained and experienced prospectors to develop the mineral resources of this province by special aid under the Wartime Prospectors' Grubstake Act. These prospectors will be financed and their work carried out under proper field supervision.

You will be asked to appropriate funds to provide extensive public works including highways and buildings as soon as men and material are available, in addition, you will be requested to make special provision for an extraordinary program of road maintenance.

Legislation will be introduced enabling the province to enter into an agreement with the dominion government for the carrying out of vocational training in order that men and women may be properly trained to take their places in peace-time occu-

My government is pleased to announce that preferencial treatment will be given British Columbians who served in the forces in connection with employment in the civic service. TAX BURDEN TO BE LIGHTENED

Measures will be introduced for the lightening of the tax

Prevision will be asked for further financial assistance to cities, district municipalities and rural areas in connection with the cost of education.

My government will cause an enquiry to be made into all fields of municipal endeavor and responsibilities. 


