The present set-up of military defences on this coast is a hangover from the plan which was adopted when the Japanese were on the Aleutian Islands and presented a definite invasion threat to the whole Pacific Coast. Now that the danger of a Japanese invasion is practically out of the picture, it is logical that the trained forces should be removed from these areas and taken to where they are worse needed in bringing the war to its victorious culmination as speedily as possible.

With things settling down following the recent crisis resulting from the abrupt decision to go conscription, it is to be expected that there will be little delay in concentrating on the steps necessary to bring about the most efficacious war effort under the conditions presently prevailing.

Of course, Prince Rupert will continue to play an important part in war strategy one way or another as long as we have to wage the conflict against the enemy across the Pacific Ocean.

Conscription for overseas service has been the law of Canada for over two years. The present position is that the law is being enforced.

from any person or persons, body or bodies corporate, who may be willing to advance the same, on the credit of the City, the sum of Forty Thousand Dollars (\$40,000.00), and to issue therefor debentures in sums of not less than One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00)

3. The said debentures shall be dated the fifteenth day of January 1945, and shall bear interest at the rate of four (4) per centum per annum.

4. There shall be levied, raised or provided during the currency of the said debentures by rate sufficient therefor over and above all other rates on all the rateable land and improvements within the municipality for payment of the debt and for the payment of the interest in the respective years the amount set out in the schedule hereto which said schedule is hereby incorporated with and made part of this By-law.

5. The interest thereon shall be payable half-yearly on the 15th day of January and the 15th day of July in each year during the currency of the said debentures or any of them.

6. Each of the said debentures shall have attached thereto coupons for the payment of the interest as hereinbefore provided, and as to principal and interest shall, as and when the same become payable and upon surrender of the debentures or interest coupons respectively, be paid in lawful money of Canada at the main branch of the Bank of Montreal in any of the following places at the option of the holder thereof, namely: a Prince Rupert, Vancouver or Victoria, in the Province of British

Columbia. The said debentures and the interest coupons attached thereto shall be signed by the Mayor and Treasurer of the City. but the signatures on the interest coupons may be either written, stamped, printed or lithographed, and the debentures shall be sealed with the seal of the City.

8. The revenue and expenditures arising from the operation of the said motor-bus system shall be kept in a separate account in a chartered bank, and the repayment of the debt hereby created, and interest thereon, shall be a first charge against the profits of such operation.

9. This By-law may be cited for all purposes as the Motorbus Loan By-law No.
