Budget Brought Down Today

Credit of Province Of British Columbia Is At Highest Level

Only War Prevents Cost of Education Being Taken Over—To Study Municipal Responsibilities.

VICTORIA, Feb. 21 (CP) — British Columbia's credit is at the highest mark in its history and is not surpassed by any other province, Premier John Hart told the Legislature today when, as minister of finance, he brought down the budget. The province was able to refund \$3,000,000 at maturity on the New York market at 2.5 per cent, the lowest rate ever obtained by the province at that market.

London Has Big Attack

Schools, Convent and Apartment Houses are Among Buildings Hit.

LONDON, Feb. 21 (CP) — The Nazi scattered incendiaries and explosives over London in a fierce attack Sunday night which set fires in many areas and caused some casualties. The Germans fanned out in all directions in an effort to confuse defences.

The raiders were met by heavy anti-aircraft barrage and at least three were shot down. Three schools and a convent, hotel and several apartment houses were burned out.

JAPAN SAYS LOSS LARGE

Serious Defeat at Truk is Acknowledged—Army and Navy Commands Furged.

NEW YORK, Feb. 21 (CP)—The Tokyo radio acknowledged today that Japan had suffered heavy loss to her great naval base of Truk and announced that chiefs of staffs of both Japanese army and navy have been relieved of their posts.

Stuttgart Hard Hit

LONDON, Feb. 21 (CP) — The Royal Air Force and the Royal Canadian Air Force dealt a third great blow in 36 hours Sunday night, bombarding Stuttgart as a sequel to a record assault during the day on Nazi airplane factories by two thousand American planes and a Saturday night attack by the British at Leipzig.

PRODUCTION CUT

WASHINGTON — General H. H. Arnold, chief of air staff, says that 25 per cent of the aircraft production of Germany has been destroyed as a result of the great raids on Leipzig Saturday night and Sunday.

SCORED FOUR GOALS

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Big Damage Wrought by Americans

Nineteen Vessels, Including Warships and 201 Jap Planes Destroyed.

WASHINGTON, D.C., Feb. 21.—"The visit of Dec. 7, 1941, on Pearl Harbor has been returned and a partial settlement effected," said an official communique by the Department of the Navy yesterday on the attack by the United States Pacific fleet on the Japanese naval base of Truk last week.

Details of the result of the attack on Truk were given in the communique. Nineteen enemy vessels were sunk, and seven probably sunk. Short installations were bombed and strafed. Two hundred and one enemy planes were destroyed, 127 being shot down and the remainder destroyed on the ground.

The Japanese vessels known to have been sunk include three light cruisers, three destroyers, one ammunition ship, three seaplane tenders and cargo ships.

The vessels probably sunk included a cruiser and a destroyer.

The attack on Truk lasted two days. On the second day there was no enemy response.

Marshall Air Base Is Taken

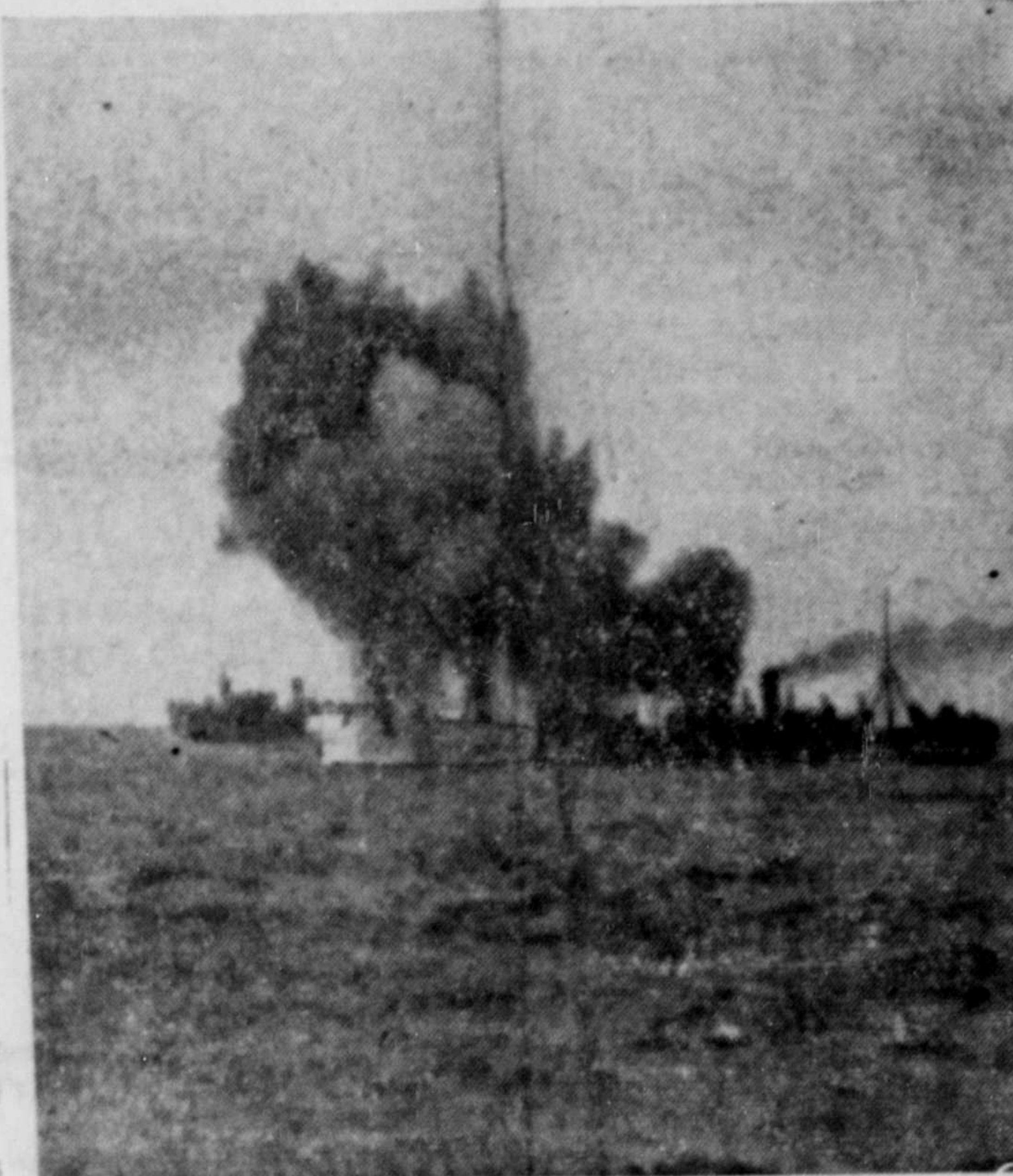
PEARL HARBOR, Feb. 21.—United States Marines Saturday took possession of Engebay Island on the westernmost Eniwetok atoll of the Marshall group, Engebay, which has an air field, is about seven hundred miles from the important Japanese mid-Pacific base of Truk. The casualties were light.

American naval vessels—destroyers—shelled Rabaul on New Britain Island and Kavieng on New Island, for the first time. Shore installations were damaged and ships in the harbors were struck. The United States warships got within four miles of Rabaul and Kavieng. Not one was damaged.

For the sixteen consecutive day Rabaul was heavily raided on Sunday by American planes which destroyed 123 tons of bombs to add further to the great wreckage and destruction there.

Admiral Chester W. Nimitz, in a special communique, said that operations were proceeding according to schedule in the campaign against the Japanese in the Western Pacific.

Further blows have been dealt on the Japanese in the Carolines.



Students See Food Picture

Well-known grocer's Glamorgan Film Show presented to the children of the city by the Provincial Government at the Capitol Theatre last morning. The film, a technical color film, presented by the management in the form of a civilian nutrition campaign of the Union Board of Health and other organizations.

Created by the Air Force to be shown to Air Force personnel, the film did a mouth-watering job of glamorizing milk, meat, cheese, vegetables and their vitamins. An interest-holding master stroke was the sustained comparison of the requirements of an aircraft for efficient service and the nutritional needs of the airman himself.

The balance of the use of foods common to everyday Canadian tables was the theme of the 20-minute picture, with accent on milk and milk products and vegetables. It was shown that every food and vitamin required for the body is contained in milk, meat, vegetables, cereals, and fruits. The proper and continuous combination of these foods makes for interesting eating, and high personal efficiency.

In a spoken foreword to the picture, Hon. C. G. Power, Minister of Defence for Air, spoke of proper food as a weapon of war and commented on the timely and valuable information contained in the picture.

WAR NEWS

BATTLE OF ITALY

Fiercest fighting in the Italian campaign still goes on at the beachhead south of Rome. The Germans, throwing divisions, a force estimated at up to 150,000 men into the battle, made a two-mile penetration into the Allied lines on Saturday but have been pushed back at least part of the distance by the Allies who have resumed the offensive. The battle goes on undiminished around Cassino where the Americans have been forced to give up the railway station which they had taken. The Allied land forces are receiving naval and air support. Twenty-six enemy aircraft were shot down yesterday.

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LEIPSIK SMASHED

LONDON — The German industrial city of Leipzig had its fiercest attack of the war Saturday night from the Royal Air Force which dropped 2,300 tons of bombs, starting huge fires causing enormous damage. The United States Air Force followed up with a mighty daylight blow yesterday. Mosquitoes bombed Berlin and western Germany. Seventy-nine planes were shot down by the Royal Air Force Saturday and the Americans lost 22 bombers and four fighters yesterday. There were daylight raids yesterday on other important German targets as well as the Netherlands.

BATTLE OF RUSSIA

MOSCOW—A large formation of Russian Air Force bombers attacked Pskov, starting large fires and causing much damage. Russian land forces closed in from three sides. The Red Army yesterday made a two to 12 mile gain and took 114 more prisoners to the west of Staraya Russa. The Russians are also advancing on Minsk in White Russia and on Krivol Rog in the Ukraine.

Red Cross Campaign . . .

Next Monday is the opening day of the fifth money-raising national campaign of the Canadian Red Cross Society which will ask the Canadian people for \$10,000,000 to carry on its vast mercy work for the ensuing year. During the next two weeks the Red Cross canvasser will call at your home or at your business place and ask for a contribution to Red Cross. He will tell you that this is the crucial year of the war, that it is expected that there will be thousands of casualties for whom vast quantities of bandages, dressings, hospital comforts and blood serum will be needed. It is estimated that the supplies will cost \$3,000,000. The Red Cross will need \$750,000 to finance its blood donor service which has a 1944 objective of more than a million donors. There are also the 5,200,000 life-saving food parcels for prisoners of war (100,000 a week) which will cost \$5,500,000.

Other Red Cross services are: jam for Britain (approximately half a million pounds were sent last year); the enquiry bureau, through which messages of relatives and friends in enemy and enemy occupied countries are exchanged and missing persons located, hospital visiting to arrange special diets, comforts and supplies for service men and women in military hospitals; home nursing classes, preparedness for disaster relief, nutrition, outpost hospitals, Junior Red Cross, relief to Allied nations and the Canadian Red Cross Corps.

What has British Columbia done for the Red Cross? This is a question that you may want to ask the Red Cross canvassers who are collecting from you to make B.C.'s quota of \$800,000. They will tell you that in 1943, B.C. Red Cross facts and figures reveal that materials and wool to the value of \$183,010 were distributed to 96 branches which returned 1,700,601 made up articles to the provincial warehouse shipped more than a million overseas; donations of useable blood to the number of 17,358 had been received at the Red Cross Blood Donor Clinic, Vancouver—10,000 from men and 7,358 from women; almost 40 tons of jam were made for Britain; first aid supplies have been sent to all branches of disaster relief; 6,226 messages and enquiries have been sent to and from enemy and enemy occupied countries and missing persons located through the Enquiry Bureau; 90 home nursing classes with an enrolment of 1,836 have been held; \$10,366.85 has been raised from the sale of salvage; Junior Red Cross raised \$25,271 for B.C. crippled children and war work; 15 hospital visiting committees arrange special diets, take gifts and do other services for men and women in military hospitals.

The total receipts for the year were \$1,367,742 and disbursements \$1,284,749.

Prince Rupert And the "Y"

(Being a series in instalments by Mrs. Dorothy Garbutt, the Hostess here)

(Instalment No. 6)

As I said previously, my main work is among the wives and families of the men and latterly, of course, among the service women. We have a flourishing Service Wives' Club meeting every Thursday in the YWCA ladies' lounge. The members are mainly wives who, because they have small families, cannot go out to work and because they are pretty well tied to their homes find it lonely in a strange town. Here at their own special club—and they have their own special buttons, blue enamelled triangles, the "Y" symbol, with YWCA Service Men's Wives' Club in gold letters on them which automatically makes them members of any of the YWCA Service Wives' Clubs throughout the length and breadth of Canada—here in their own special club they meet young women their own age, facing their own problems and here they are free to bring the children. And I tell you it is quite a sight on a Thursday afternoon to see anywhere from 15 to 20 young mothers and nearly as many children in the lounge. The children are all busily playing in the Kiddies' Corner.

Perhaps a word about this Kiddies' Corner should be included here, as I feel it is Prince Rupert's own special corner. Every toy, every stick of children's furniture has been donated in response to appeals made through the Hut Spot for articles. We have a play penstand for the dolls' house and play tables made and given by Mr. and Mrs. Alex Mitchell, a seesaw and a doll's trunk by Mr. Hallett, a canvas swing given by Mrs. Durran, blackboards by the Carters before they left, doll's carriage and toys by the Brockshys before they left and another carriage, chairs and toys by the Jenners among the donations while the children of King Edward School gave us a number of small cars and toys and the children of Borden Street School gave us on loan a very beautiful electrically lighted doll's house. These are but few of the toys given us and the Service Wives themselves, when drafted or posted, very often quietly leave a few toys in the box while the IODE sent us a big crate of

toys sent to them from a town up north.

So while the children are busily playing in the kiddies' corner and having the odd hair pulls and squabbles the mothers are knitting for the Red Cross or making curtains for the various messes, mending service clothes or mending for the Military Hospital. Lately, however, this RCAMC mending has been taken over by a CWAC whose duty it is to mend these things.

The Service Wives raise their funds by taxing their members 15c an afternoon, 10c of which goes towards their tea and 5c towards a raffle. Each girl takes a turn in bringing a 50c raffle. They make excellent use of these limited funds and so far have sent monthly parcels to a British sailor who contracted TB while here and was sent to Tranquille Sanatorium. He has since been sent back to England but the girls voted to send three dollars a month to the sanatorium for other sailors. They have also given money to the Red Cross and the Salvation Army.

Twice a year they spend a little on themselves and have a dinner at the YMCA Cafeteria, a event for which Pat Trant always excels himself in service and in the type of meal he puts up. This is followed by a show. Unfortunately the last show they attended was a super horror thriller called "The Lodger" and the girls were almost too terrified to go home alone.

This present Service Wives' Club is an outgrowth of the old Scottish Auxiliary, RCAF Club and Composite Auxiliary. They found that by pooling their resources and membership they had better meetings and the idea of wives of the three services meeting together was a good one and made for understanding and amity.

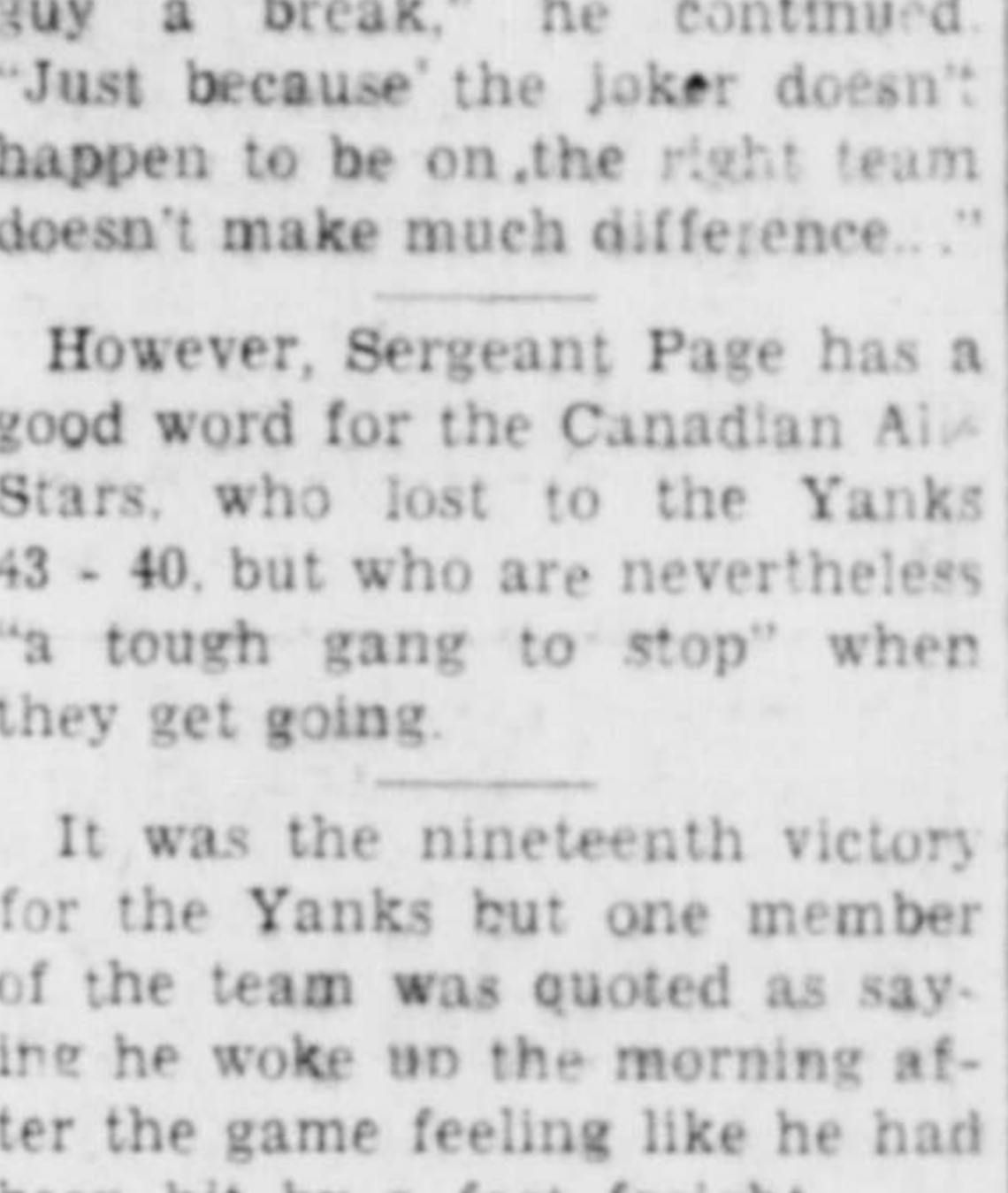

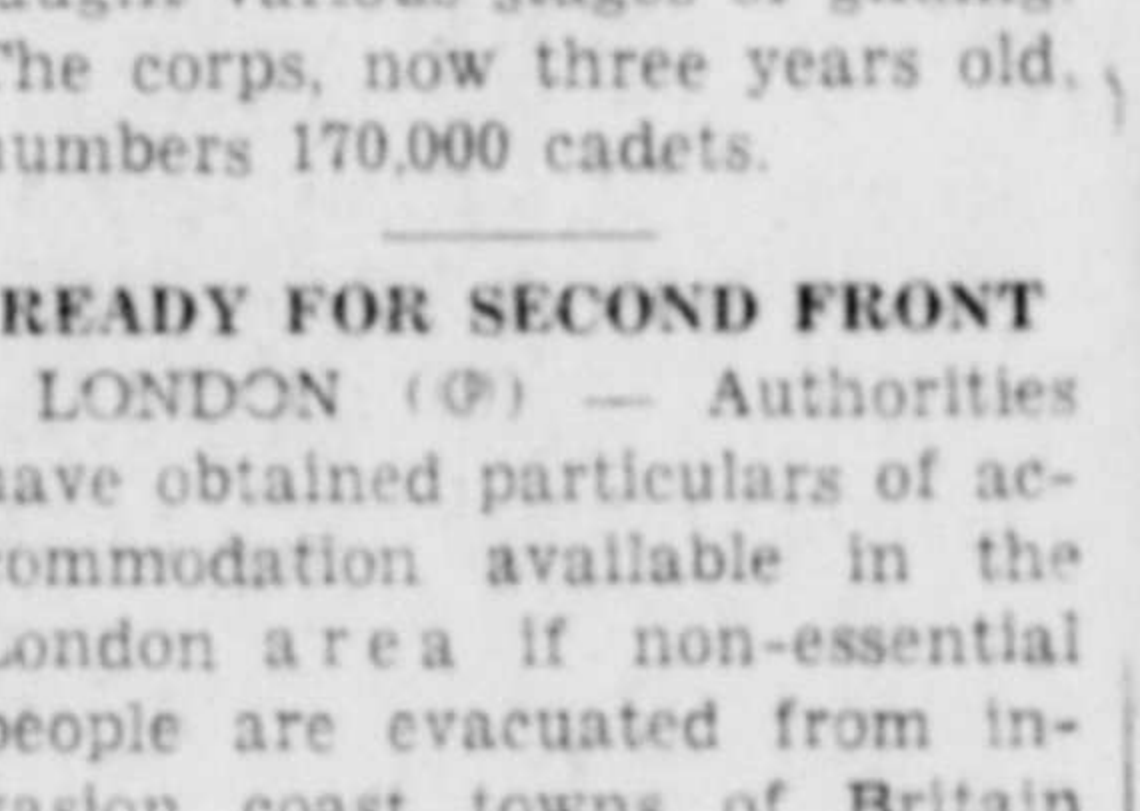

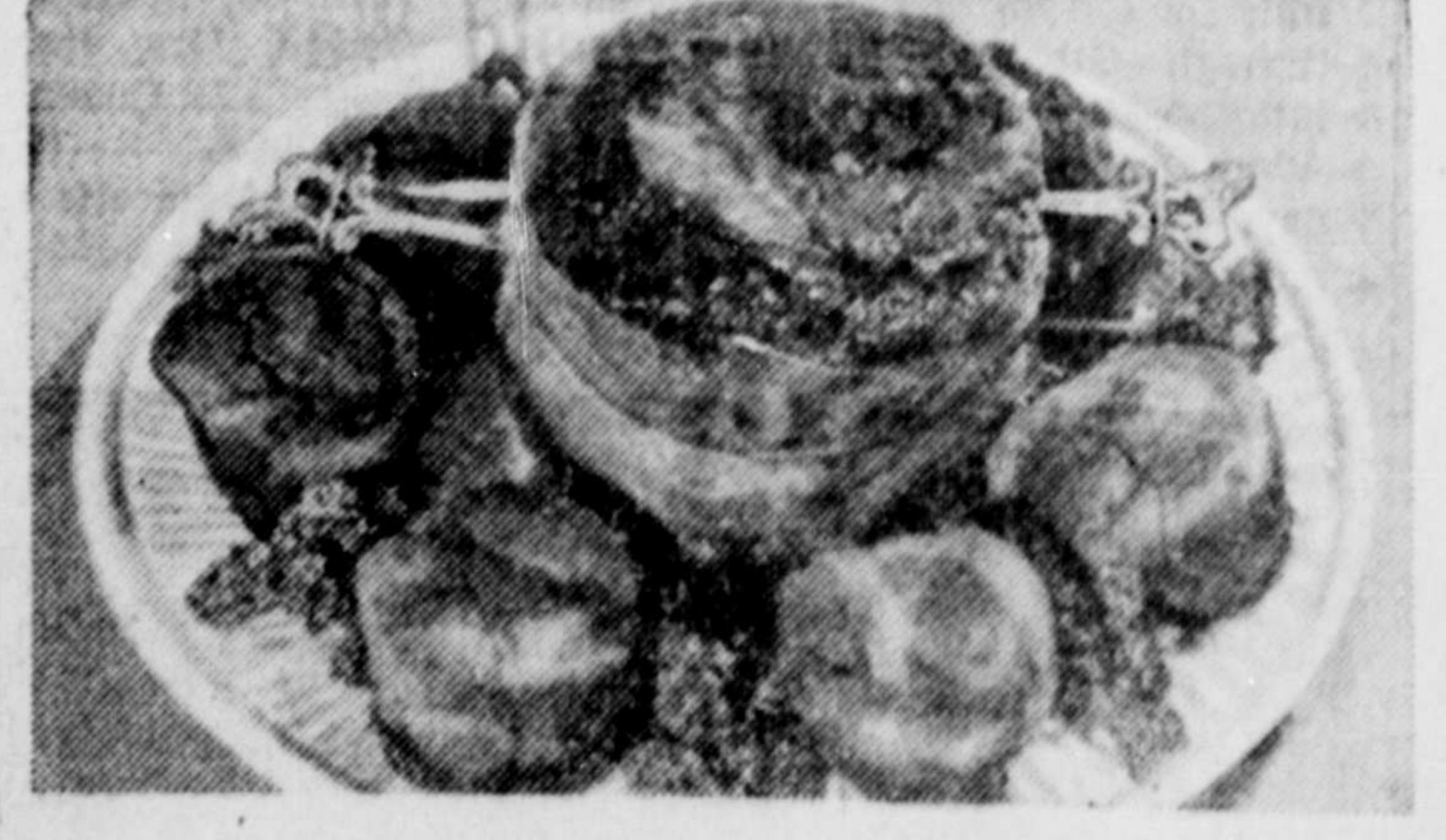

Rolled Rib Roast

GOVERNMENT NOTICE NATIONAL WAR LABOUR BOARD

Incorporation of Cost of Living Bonus into Wage Rates

THE ATTENTION of all employers in Canada, subject to the Wartime Wages Control Order 1943 (P.C. 9384), is directed to the provisions of the Order requiring them to establish for each of their occupational classifications, not above the rank of foreman, a single wage rate or range of wage rates as prescribed by the rules set out in Schedule "A" of the Order by adding to the previous authorized single wage rate or previous authorized range of wage rates the amount of previous authorized cost of living bonus, and that such established single wage rate or range of wage rates shall be effective for the first payroll period beginning on or after February 15, 1944.

Employers who may not be paying previous authorized cost of living bonus as required by General Orders of the National War Labour Board, issued under dates of August 4, 1942, and November 3, 1943, pursuant to the provisions of the Wartime Wages Control Order, P.C. 5963, are required to include such amounts of cost of living bonus in the establishment of wage rates of their employees under P.C. 9384 effective for the first payroll period beginning on or after February 15, 1944, as stated.
