JAP SHIPPING RAIDED

ALLIED HEADQUARTERS IN SOUTHWEST PACIFIC-Allied planes sank a two-thousand ton freighter and set fire to nine smaller vessels in a raid on Hollandia, Dutch New Guinea, Wednesday, Allied headquarters announced Friday. Ten Japanese planes were shot down and twenty damaged.

BATTLE IN ITALY

NAPLES-Thirty-six Nazi planes were shot down yesterday by Allied Mediterranean forces at a cost of nineteen aircraft in the operations including attacks on airplane plants and fields in Hungary. Patrols and artillery were active on the land front in all sectors.

PARAMUSHIRU AGAIN ALLIED HEADQUARTERS IN NORTH PACIFIC-The Japanese base of Paramushiru on the tip of the Kurile Islands was bombed for the third straight day yesterday.

SUBMARINES SUNK TORONTO-United States Secretary of Navy Knox, speaking here last night, said that two hundred submarines were sunk in the Atlantic and Pacific Oceans last year. More submarines are now being sunk thtan Allied merchant ships.

DEMAND ON SWEDEN

LONDON - Great Britain and the United States have demanded that Sweden stop shipping ball-bearings to Germany. Similar demands in connection with other materials are being made by the Allies on Turkey and Spain.

Under the Great Success provisions of the British North America Act, Major MacKay disclosed, the Indians enjoy the benefits of free lands, free eduprotection cation and general Moreover, interference. while the Act did not provide for free medical care, nevertheless the government did accep responsibility in this respect and continued to expend large sums yearly on this important service to Indians. Thus the Indians had a measure of security which might be welcomed by many white pepople of the country. While the economic affairs of the Indians were largely shaped and controlled by governmental policies and actions of governmental officers, still it was not the policy of the Department of Indian Affairs to spoon feed the Indian but it was the intention to require him to stand on his own feet and to provide for himself and his dependents to the fullest possible extent within the resources and opportunities at his disposal and to so direct him that dependence on the state shall be gradually diminished and that he shall eventually take his place in the citizenship of the land.

Major MacKay felt that there was a disturbing lack of interest in Indian affairs, Prince Rupert was a communty which should be much interested in Indian matters. The problem of Indian welfare was one which should appeal to the sentiment and conscience of the people. Any group that could make a contribution to their happiness and progress should be glad of the opportunity. Their development should be in the way most in keeping with their best traditions and not inconsistent with Canadian ideals. There must be nothing dominant or aggressive in the attitude of the white man toward the Indian. So far the wise and effective ways of sharing progress with the Indians had not been effectively developed. Metakatla Seeks Full Enfranchisment With Privileges and Responsibilities.

The local native village of Metlakatla is asking for enfranchisement as a community and officially instituted the move in this direction on Wednesday with Major D. M. Mackay who visited the village and received application for the appointment of a board under the Indian Act to inquire into the fitness of the people for such enfranchis-

Should enfranchisment be granted the people of Metlakatla their lands would be subdivided and they would be given their share of these lands as well as of their trust funds at Ottawa. The natives would become citizens similar to whites and would be subject to taxation and other responsibilities of citizenship. Their village would no longer be an Indian reservation but would probably take the form of an unorganized district for taxation and school purposes.

Income Tax Returns FOR 1943 MUST BE IN NOT LATER THAN 20TH OF APRIL 15.

# WHO MUST FILE RETURNS?

If you are single, and your income was over \$660.00-Or, if married, and your income was over \$1,200.00-Or if you had tax deducted in 1943 you must file returns.

WHAT FORMS TO USE

For income under \$3,000.00 use Form T.1 Special. For income over \$3,000.00 use Form T.1 General.

WHERE YOU CAN GET FORMS

You can get income tax forms from-

1. Post Offices.

2. District Income Tax Offices.

Your early co-operation is requested. Over 2,000,000 Canadians will be filing income tax returns. You can help by getting your forms now, and mailing them promptly.

It is important that income tax returns be filed promptly. First, these returns must be filed to obtain credit for tax deductions. Second, to claim any refund to which you may be entitled. Third, to establish the Savings Portion of your tax, which will be paid back to you with interest after the War.

Make your returns now, but not later than 30th of April to avoid a penalty of 5% of your tax.

The unpaid balance of your 1943 tax may be paid any time before 31st of August WITHOUT PENALTY.

GET YOUR "T.4 SLIP" FROM YOUR EMPLOYER

To get a record of your 1943 earnings and tax deductions, ask your employer for a copy of the "T.4 Slip" he filed with the Government. Do this. It will save you time, and help prevent errors.
