## New Canadian Operation In Holland

### Good To Be Shed --- Churchill Canucks Cross Leopold Canal

### With Object of Clearing Out Nazis from Antwerp Entrance

### cause Sure Reason Situation Not Still Grave

LONDON, Oct. 6 (CP) — Prime Minister Churchill warned the House of Commons today a great deal of blood will be shed in the next months. He intervened in the debate on the new Country Planning Bill in an effort to get it passed quickly. The bill is intended to enable local authorities to rebuild the blitzed areas.

Mr. Churchill said: "We must not imagine the situation is not grave because we feel assurance of victory."

Discussion of the bill had been prolonged by numerous amendments, chiefly by Conservative members concerned about the question of compensation.

### Service C.F. Gov't Plan

spread Care Would Provided for Under Commission's Report

LONDON, Oct. 6 (CP)—The Saskatchewan Health Services Commission, in a report to the government today, recommends the formation of a services planning commission.

The commission's duties include the study of compulsory health insurance schemes in the province's eight cities.

Report is the first step in the C.F. government toward a system of socialized services with special emphasis on preventative medicine.

Province would pay for services to old age pensioners and orphans and patients suffering from mental and venereal diseases.

Provinces would also provide care to all school children up to 16 years of age and establish dental clinics and nursing clinics for rural areas.

### ROLL OF VESSELS

at Tokyo Admits Ship Shortage Becoming Acute

HARBOR, Oct. 6 (CP)—The frank admission of ship shortage is accentuated by reports of damaging of 31 ocean-going ships including three warships by United States planes and submarines.

Warships got 11 ships, including three combatant vessels, and the total of Japanese vessels all types sunk or damaged by submarine action to 92.

### WILBY PLEADS GUILTY

NEW YORK—Ralph Wilby, who was arrested in British Columbia last March, has pleaded guilty to grand larceny charges involving alleged theft of half a million dollars from a department store.

### NEUTRALS WORRIED

WASHINGTON—The United States and British governments have sent notes to neutral countries requesting that they prevent Axis leaders from "retaining their loot" or finding a safe haven for their wealth in neutral territories.

### BALTIMORE WINS

BALTIMORE—Baltimore has forged its way into the Little World Series for the first time since 1925 by taking the seventh game of the final International League playoffs from Newark 6-3. Newark made three runs, 12 hits and two errors. Baltimore made six runs, 10 hits and one error.

### INDIANS HAVE WON GROUND

Take Virnola, Overlooking Rimini—Yanks Take Road Junction

ROME, Oct. 6 (CP)—India Troops of the British Eighth Army have taken Virnola on high ground west of Rimini on the Adriatic sector, it was announced today.

Americans of the Allied Fifth Army in the central sector have captured Loino, vital road junction on the Florence-Bologna highway. The Americans have also cleared Monzumo, three miles west of Loino.

### BERGEN SUB BASE BOMBED

LONDON, Oct. 6 (CP)—Royal Air Force heavy bombers made a concentrated attack on Nazi submarines and submarine pens at Bergen, Norway. One bomber failed to return.

HAMILTON, Ont., Oct. 6 (CP)—Harold Ferguson, aged 38, of Hamilton, was convicted of murdering Abraham Rosenberg, Hamilton tailor, last February 4 and was sentenced to death after a jury deliberated five hours and returned a verdict of guilty as charged.

### BALIKPAPAN HIT AGAIN

United States Bombers Make Second Attack on Borneo Oil Centre

ALLIED HEADQUARTERS IN NEW GUINEA, Oct. 6 (CP)—United States bombers hit the major Japanese oil centre at Balikpapan, Borneo, with forty tons of bombs while nineteen Japanese fighters were brought down and seven Allied bombers lost in a one-hour battle over the objective. It was the second Allied heavy attack on the vital objective in four days.

### MOOSE 50 MILES FROM THIS CITY

It looks like the newly built Skeena River Highway is bringing tourists of the quadruped variety Prince Rupertwards. Not so many years ago moose were regarded as a rarity west of Burns Lake which is more than 300 miles from here. They have been gradually appearing in greater numbers further west, and just recently one was seen on the new road within fifty miles of Prince Rupert.

### SMITHERS MAN IS CASUALTY

SMITHERS, Oct. 6—James P. Downey received a telegram on Wednesday advising him that his son, Lieut. Pat J. Downey, had been wounded on September 25 while serving with his regiment in France.

### In Balkans— BATTLE NOW AT BELGRADE

Russians and Yugoslav Patriots Now In Outskirts

MOSCOW, Oct. 6 (CP)—Russians and Yugoslavs are fighting the Germans in the outskirts of Belgrade today. Front line dispatches indicate that patrols crossed the Danube river from captured Pancevo, less than nine miles from the capital.

In northern Yugoslavia along the Ica river other Russians were less than 30 miles across the flat Hungarian country from the second largest Hungarian city, Czeged.

### Former Resident Of Prince Rupert Dies in Rhodesia

Former friends in Prince Rupert will regret to learn of the death which took place August 20 in Southern Rhodesia of Miss Emily Davies who years ago was employed by the Canadian Fish & Cold Storage Co. here.

Miss Davies was the sister of Mrs. W. G. Hughes, also formerly of this city and now living at Woodgreen, London, England.

### JAP POSITIONS NOW STRONGER

Hunan-Kwangsi Railway Situation Has Become Safeguarded

CHUNGKING, Oct. 6 (CP)—The Chinese announce that all communications with the defenders of Paoching have been cut off for 14 hours, indicating the loss of that important centre on the right flank of the Japanese advance on Kwellin.

The fall of Paoching would safeguard Japanese positions along the Hunan-Kwangsi railway in a drive against Kwellin.

The Japanese have been heavily reinforced on the left flank. The Japanese, invading Fukien Province, have reached the northwestern suburbs of Foochow, the Chinese High Command said today.

### Repudiates Communism

Not in Favor of Foreign Ideology—Charges Republicans

WASHINGTON, D.C., Oct. 6 (CP)—President Franklin Roosevelt, in a broadcast Thursday night, disowned Communist support for a fourth term bid and declared that his Republican opponents were spreading fear propaganda in stating that his administration is plotting to give the Communists control of the government.

Mr. Roosevelt said: "I have never sought and I do not welcome the support of any person or group committed to communism or fascism or any other foreign ideology which would undermine the American system of government or the American system of free competition in enterprise and private property."

The Democratic candidate emphasized that this attitude did not in the least interfere with America's friendly relations with Russia, adding that the kind of economy that suits the Russian people is their own affair.

### Moose Roaming in Smithers Streets

SMITHERS, Oct. 6 — The moose, locally, are not showing much respect for the abilities of the local hunters. A few days ago J. E. Kirby saw a big bull moose cross Main st. near his house, sauntering nonchalantly along. Large game seems to be quite plentiful throughout the district but hunters for grouse have not had very good luck.

The invasion succeeded because security was understood.

### Allied Armies on Western Front Meeting With Determined German Resistance but Making Headway

LONDON, Oct. 6 (CP)—First Canadian Army troops launched a spectacular new operation today in Holland, driving across Leopold Canal in the wake of a violent flame barrage to establish a limited bridgehead and burst into a German pocket south of the mouth of the Schelde River. Ross Munro, Canadian Press correspondent, said the assault was launched between Bruges and Eeloo and the opposition did not prove as heavy as had been anticipated.

The object of the operation is to clear the Germans from the Schelde estuary and enable the Allies to use supply facilities of the great port of Antwerp. Supreme headquarters said that the Canadians advanced three miles north of Baarlenassay to the vicinity of Alphen, six miles south of the main Tilburg-Breda road, in Holland.

Meanwhile dispatches from the front said that American First Army troops which entered Beggendorf, east of Ubach, Thursday had to pull back today under heavy enemy pressure.

The Germans reported more Allied parachutists were dropped in Holland to reinforce the British Second Army's western loop between the Neder-Rhine and Waal, west of Arnhem.

The Germans acknowledged another breakthrough by the American Third Army north of Nancy.

The British Second Army repulsed five German counterattacks in heavy fighting on the fringes of Nijmegen salient.

The truce at Dunkerque ended at 10 a.m. after 19,000 civilians were evacuated and the Germans allowed twelve more hours to re-mine the road and re-establish defence lines. Dunkerque is the last of the German-held Channel ports.

There is no news from the other end of the front where the American Seventh Army is pushing for the Vosges Mountain passes near Belfort.

The Germans said that a great Allied offensive is surely in course of preparation.

### INNES PLEADS GUILTY TO THEFT CHARGE

Silas Innes, youthful native, pleaded guilty to a charge of theft when he appeared for election before Judge W. E. Fisher in County Court yesterday. He was remanded for sentence until October 9.

Innes is charged with theft of \$117 from the fishing boat Misty on Monday morning. The boat, owned by Roy Arthur Johnson, was moored at the Cow Bay floats.

### PREPARATIONS FOR INVASION ARE DESCRIBED - ROBOTS AND RATIONS

A brief record of England's summer—invasion summer—is contained in a series of letters received on this continent from an English couple who describe and comment on the invasion of France, the arrival of the flying bombs and the issuing of new ration books.

"We can now say how for months — and we almost feel like saying years — before the invasion, the roads and railways were full night and day with such vast quantities of everything, such numbers of motor vehicles, guns and tanks, that we began to think that we were being run around the country just to keep warm."

"Americans arrived in corresponding numbers, until every house must have had two or three or more. And this has been one of the best outcomes of the war, because now there must be hundreds of thousands of Americans who know us in our homes, and we have got to like them well and to know that between us there only superficial differences."

"The flying bombs are very nervewracking at first, but we can't keep up a constant state of awareness, and are just becoming dulled and fatalistic about it."

"Everyone feels cheered at the thought that Hitler should be wasting his precious materials and manpower on something that cannot have a bearing on the progress of the war."

"Morale is amazingly good and it really was epic to see, as I did, a queue of housewives at the fish shop far more concentrated on their prospects of getting some kippers than they were on a 'doodle-bug' which

## EDITORIAL

### RESERVE AND HOME DEFENCE...

There has been a wide misunderstanding in Canada as to the relative places of the Reserve Army of Canada and the Home Defence Army. There are a great many who believe it is all the same body. In reality they are entirely different in operation and have no connection whatever.

The Home Defence Army of Canada is the army which formerly formed the 6th, 7th and 8th divisions, and which is almost entirely composed of drafted men. Its role is to defend the shores of Canada and provide security troops within Canada. All officers are volunteers, and a large number of N.C.O.'s are also volunteers who are category men, those who could not get overseas for medical reasons. The vast bulk of the other ranks, however, are drafted men.

On the other hand the Reserve Army is a part-time army only, men who are carrying on with their civilian occupations and giving up some of their leisure hours for military training, making preparations for a time all Canadians hope will never come, when our own borders may be threatened. The Reserve Army is a voluntary army, made up of men who believe it best to be prepared. Many in the Reserve Army have attempted to enlist in one of the services but found they were not physically fit and could not be accepted. Many more are over the age-limit for active service. Still more are in war work vital to Allied victory, and have been deferred by the active forces. They are preparing for the time when they may join active service.

### THE WORLD SERIES...

"Could be" by the time another early October comes around the ivory industry will be getting back to normal and we will all be taking more interest in such things as the World Series. By then the pressure of the war effort may be getting relieved to the point where we may be able to take time out—as we used to do—to listen to the radio or watch the bulletin boards for the progress of the play.

These six years now since we have been able to do that seem to have been a long time but we recall the pleasant old days when it was possible and have good reason to hope that it will not be another half decade before we are able to do it again.

The restoration of such peaceful pleasures is among the things we are fighting and sacrificing for today. Meanwhile they are the things that continue to be shoved off the front pages of the newspapers where we once used to put them and do not occupy the place in our minds which it is good and fitting that they should be in a happy and peaceful world order which we must deny ourselves until the business of the war is successfully terminated.

It may be too that even now it might be well for some of us to still take a little diversion of time and thought from the pressing exigencies to relax ourselves in this manner.

Well Known Local Boy Listed as Dangerous Casualty

James Colussi, well known Prince Rupert boy, having been born in this city, is listed as having been dangerously wounded in action overseas. He was serving with the Royal Canadian Army Service Corps. Son of Mrs. G. Colussi of Prince Rupert, James Colussi is 23 years of age. He has two brothers—Lino, employed at the local dry dock, and Mike, who is in Britain with the Canadian Forestry Corps. The father and another brother were drowned in a gasboat accident near here six years ago. Before enlisting, James Colussi was in the employ of the Big Bay Lumber Co. sawmill at Georgetown.

### WILL SEEK NEW SEWER

Crisis Reached in Regard to Line Serving Fourth Ave. East

A crisis has been reached in regard to the sewerage service on Fourth ave. E in the area tributary to Cow Bay basin where a private line installed years ago has now reached a state of disrepair where it must be either replaced or abandoned. Accordingly, property owners concerned were called into session at the city council chamber last night with the mayor presiding and it was decided to petition the city under the local improvement plan for a new system which would serve the residences of the area with the outlet down the hill past the isolation hospital to the main city sewer at Third ave. and Cow Bay. At last night's meeting some signatures were attached to the

petition which will be circulated among others concerned. Mayor H. M. Daggett presided over last night's meeting, members of the board of works and the city engineer being present to meet the property owners.

### Wistaria Boy Casualty— HUGH SHELFORD HAS LOST HAND

FRANCOIS LAKE, Oct. 6 — Lance Corporal Hugh Shelford had been posted as "missing" since June, two days after D-Day, but his mother has received a letter from him stating that he was in hospital but not stating where or the nature of his wounds. Since then the War Department has notified his parents, Mr. and Mrs. John Shelford of Wistaria, that Hugh had lost one hand. As the letter was well written and in his well known hand-writing it is assumed that it must be his left hand. Two of his brothers are serving overseas — Sergeant Cyril Shelford with the anti-aircraft in Italy and Leading Seaman John Shelford "on the high seas."

People of the Lakes District are happy to hear that Hughie is still alive as he was one of the most popular of the younger set of the Lakes District. One brother—Miles—is staying at home looking after their farms till the boys return and considers that he lost out when the four brothers pulled straps and he pulled the short one.

### TELEPHONE BY LAND WIRES

The Northwest Telephone Co. it has been learned here, is planning to make its long distance service into Prince Rupert an entirely land line instead of the partial radiophone service which now carries conversations between here and Vancouver and the outside world. The company is endeavouring to secure one of the military wires which were installed in the war emergency. However, these wires are understood to be not yet available.

### LUNCHES ARE ATTRACTIVE

Featured at Nutrition Week Meeting Last Night

The second and last public meeting planned for Nutrition Week took place at Borden Street School last night. In spite of the bad weather, 40 men and women turned out to see Miss Mary Baldwin, Provincial Board of Health nutrition consultant, demonstrate the art of packing a tasty and well balanced lunch pail.

Miss Baldwin opened the meeting by thanking the Nutrition Committee of the Union Board of Health for inviting her to Prince Rupert for Nutrition Week.

During the course of the meeting, the audience learned that, of five groups of foods to be eaten each day, four should appear in the lunch pail. These four are milk or cheese, fruit or a vegetable, one of the protein group—meat, fish, egg—and whole grain bread or other filling food. Three different sandwich fillings were prepared and sandwiches made from these fillings were sampled by the audience. Two that caused particular comment were a vegetable mixture with cabbage, carrot and scrap onion and baked bean sandwich between slices of brown bread spread with mustard butter.

A chocolate syrup, made of one-half cup cocoa, one-third cup sugar, one-quarter teaspoon salt and 1 cup water, was prepared by Miss Baldwin. This was later mixed with re-liquified milk and the resulting chocolate milk sampled. Miss Baldwin pointed out that, if fresh milk were scarce powdered milk could be made to taste just the same by mixing it thoroughly and allowing it to stand for several hours. If it is purchased in bulk, it is cheaper than fresh milk and the nutritive value is the same.

At the close of the meeting Dr. R. G. Knipe, director of the Prince Rupert Health Unit, showed two interesting films.

McQuinn's homer followed a single by Gene Moore in the fourth inning. They were the only hits off Mort Cooper, the Cardinals' ace pitcher and Blix Donnelly.

The National League hammered Denny Galehouse for five hits in the first three innings, loading the bases with only one out in the third. Galehouse then averted the crisis by pitching hitless ball until the eighth frame.

**NEW CHILD FILM STAR**

Plain Peggy Ann Garner Is Movie's Latest Juvenile

HOLLYWOOD, Oct. 6 (AP)—"It was sure there must be a place in Hollywood for a plain little girl with talent," said Peggy Ann Garner's mother as she sat in a dressing room on the set of "A Tree Grows in Brooklyn." It was a searing hot day and as is traditional in films, snow scenes were being made, with the cast in woollens and furs and the set piled high with synthetic snow.

Peggy Ann came in, beads of perspiration on her pert little nose. She tugged at the heavy costume she wears as "Francie," stymied by the back buttons customary in that era. She quickly wriggled her active little body out of the horror and put on a cool gingham jumper dress.

Peggy, whose father is Lieut. W. G. H. Garner of Camp Pino, New York, is a direct, natural sort of child, unspoiled by the adulation given glamor children. She's not pretty in the ordinary sense, but her sensitivity and quick intelligence and the wistful appeal in her round little face, make Peggy Ann attractive beyond the ordinary.

She loves pretty things. Her mother says her eyes filled with tears when she saw her wardrobe as the sum child, Francie. She had had a similar one in every role, in "The Pied Piper," "Jane Eyre," and now "A Tree." She is looking forward to her next, "Nob Hill," because she'll be an heiress, with curls and feminine finery.

**A Heavy Role**

Peggy Ann's role in the story has 367 speeches, 90 more than Jennifer Jones' role as "Bernadette."

When Peggy was three, a stranger passed her parents who had the child on a shopping expedition in New York and asked if she were an actress or a model. "She has a fortune in her face," he said, and walked on. But he had planted an idea. When the child, as a Powers model, began to show she had unusual appeal and acting talent as well, it was decided to give her dramatic training.

Her first professional work, was in stock in New York and Washington as "Europa" in "Mrs. Wiggs of the Cabbage Patch." In 1937 her mother brought her to Hollywood. It was some months before Peggy Ann got a role in "The Thoroughbred," almost a year and a half before "In Name Only," as Carole Lombard's daughter; another year and a half before "Abe Lincoln in Illinois." "The Pied Piper" definitely set her as a dramatic actress of importance.

**BETTER FOOD HER SUBJECT**

Miss Mary Baldwin Is Luncheon Speaker

After setting the tone for a talk on nutrition by polishing off a turkey dinner at their regular luncheon meeting Thursday, local Rotary Club members heard their guest speaker, Miss Mary Baldwin, tell of the work and aims of the nutrition branch of the Provincial Board of Health for which she is traveling consultant.

Miss Baldwin's brief talk was followed by the display of a National Film Board talking picture "Thought for Food," depicting the tremendous agricultural, distributive and scientific effort required to keep Canadians supplied with foods which will maintain a high national health standard.

The B.C. Board of Health became nutrition conscious after a series of Dominion-wide surveys in 1939 which showed that only 40 percent of Canadians were eating proper food. This was largely a result of the depression, Miss Baldwin said.

"Large numbers of men were turned down by the military services because they were not medically fit and poor eating habits over a number of years were responsible," she continued.

In her nutrition work throughout the province Miss Baldwin finds that greatest progress can be made through regular educational channels. However, she suggested that service clubs might get behind the drive by seeing that merchants were not left with health-giving foods on their shelves.

On the basis of a lunch-box survey in city schools last March Miss Baldwin determined that Prince Rupert's average diet was short on whole grain cereals, fruits and vegetables and milk.

"That seems to be the general picture throughout the country," she said.

Miss Baldwin was introduced by Dr. R. G. Knipe, local medical health officer.

During the meeting members approved a \$10 donation to help finance the newly organized joint Rehabilitation Committee.

Guests at the meeting were E. T. Appleywhite, Lt. Dale Johnson of Navy, S. J. Hatchett of Vancouver, and Sergeants R. Maynard and C. Agnew of the Canadian Army. George Mitchell was chairman in the absence of President R. C. St. Clair.

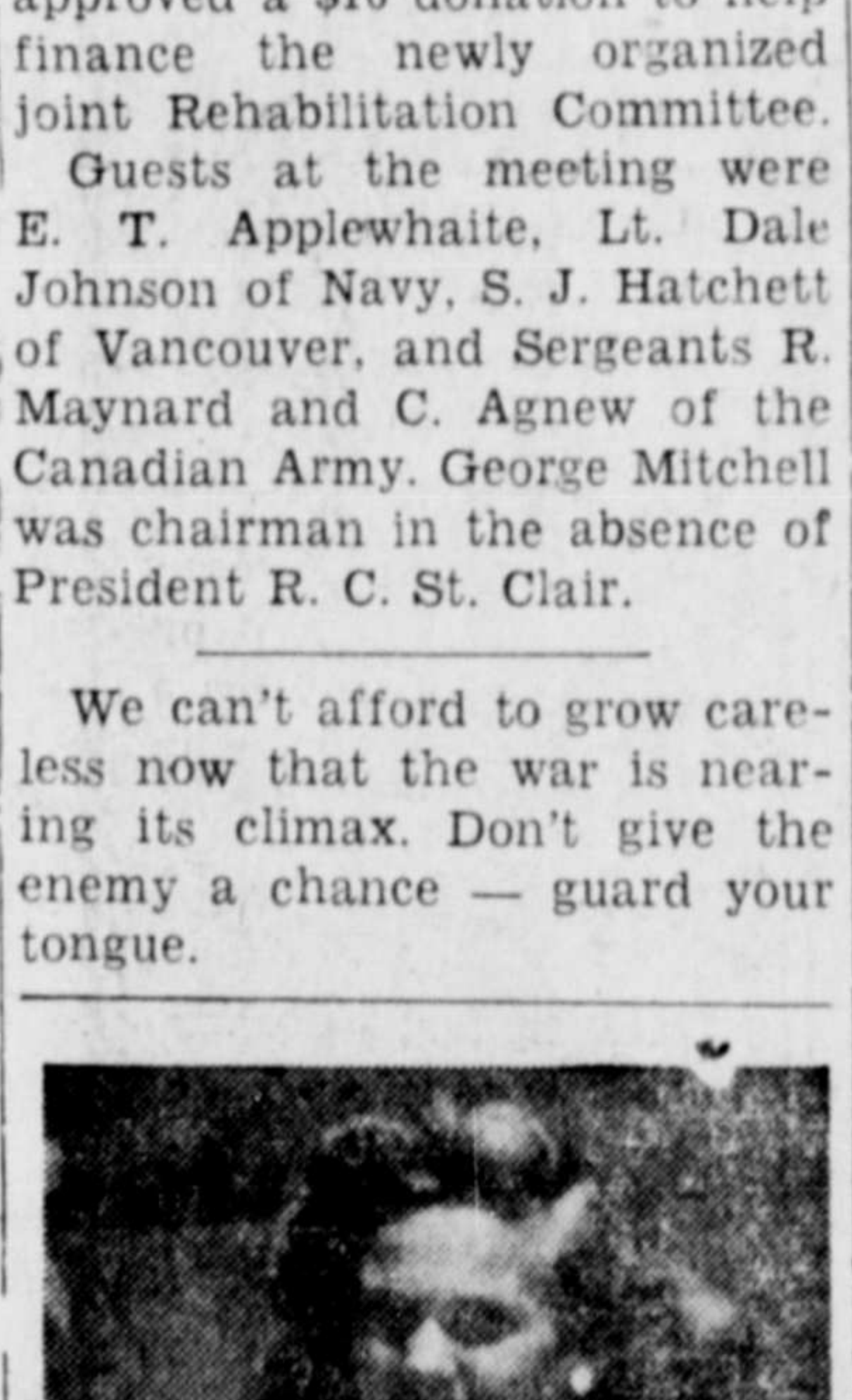
